AN OCEAN STEAMER LOST.

The State of Virginia Wrecked Off Sable Island.

NINE LIVES LOST.

The Survivors Safely Brought to Halifax.

HALIFAX, N.S., July 17.—John W. Robson, purser, and John D. Jack, third officer, with nine of the crew of the steamship State of Virginia, arrived here last night from Port Finkerton, on the Atlantic coast via Sherbrooke and New Glasgow. They report their vessel was wrecked on Sable Island on Saturday night last. The State of Virginia is 2,500 tons, owned by the State Steamship Company of Glasgow. THE HAYTIN REVOLUTION.

Quite Partially Restored after Much Loss.

NEW YORK, July 19.—A cable dispatch from Port au Prince to the Haytian Minister, dated 15th, states that quiet has been restored with considerable loss of life on both sides. The fighting in Port au Prince lasted five days and 50 houses were burned. Among those killed were Minister of War, Francois, and ex-Minister of War, Montas, and several other officials. The Haytian Revolution is a struggle for independence from France. It began in 1791 and lasted until 1804. It was led by Toussaint Louverture and other leaders. The revolution resulted in the establishment of the Republic of Haiti.

THE OATLE EXPORT TRADE.
