

Thus in battle after battle she fought by his side as bravely as he; she was his companion in reverse as in victory, bearing without a murmur all the hardships of retreat over wild mountain-passes, through forests, and over swollen rivers. Once when she was captur-ed, she broke away from her guards, swam a wide and turbulent river clinging to the tail of her horse; and, after days of terrible suffering and hairbreadth escapes, came at last in safety to her husband. A Brave Death.

At last Anita's strength gave way under the long and cruel strain, and to his unspeakable grief Garibaldi realized that his loved companion was soon to be taken from him.

It was during Garibaldi's retreat from Rome-which he had brilliantly but vainly tried to defend against the French-that the end came. "My dear Anita," Garibaldi says, "refused to remain behind, in spite of all my entreaties." She struggled bravely as far as La Mandriola when she collapsed, and was carried into a doctor's house. "In laying her down on the hed." he continues. "I thought I saw the death-look in her face. I felt her wrist-there was no pulse. 



ANGLO-FRENCH CONVENTION. PARIS, Nov. 5.

LONDON, Nov. 6. Tralee. Ireland, is fast approaching starvation in consequence of a recent police order forbidding the carrying on of business until two missing policemen are returned by townspeople, says a Times despatch.

A Famous Interpreter.

Basso, Was Well Known in Canadian Courts.

In the death of Michael Basso, the Italian interpreter in the various courts of this country, the City of Toronto, in which he was so long s resident, has sustained a loss, compared with which the demise of many 2. He was a man of sterling purpose conest in all his dealings, of clear inknowing the strong as well as the weak points of human nature, more particularly as exhibited in his fellow-

years the Italian official police court interpreter for Toronto, but his services as translator, during his later rears, were in constant demand in the Courts of Assize and before other triunals all over Ontario. On one occasion he went as far as Winnipeg to assist in an important criminal

In the early part of this century began the vast and irresistible tide of emigration from Europe and into Canada poured the many inhabitants of the regions around the Arno and the Tiber rivers; the restless denizens from under the shadow of the Appenines Mountains and beside the waters of the Adriatic Sea. The Italian nature is proverbially hasty and emotional, and often during the past twenty years juries throughout Canada have been compelled frequently to adjudicate upon the guilt or innocence of exiles from the land of persons who have objections to Cicero and Valentinian, whose sudden outbursts of temper have often prought the impetuous Italian into the criminal dock accused chiefly of rimes which were the result of sud- in the Magistrate's Office from den impulse. In no case did Mr. Basso's qualitie shine clearer than in the course of the famous Capelli trial at Parry Sound about 13 years ago. Indeed domitable persistence of the interpreter that Capelli owed his life. The story is quite without parallel and would furnish abundant foundation for a thrilling novel.

Here are the merest outlines of th Francisco Capelli and a fellow-Italian. both under the influence of liquor. went to a party at the house of a set tler named William Wow. While the merry-makers were dancing, sudden ly the solitary lamp in the room was thrown to the ground and extinguished. In the darkness there were cries and revolver shots. When light was restored. Wow lay dying on the floor. while Capelli and his friend were flourishing smoking revolvers. The two men were tried for murder. As the trial was about to begin, Capelli's comrade, who alone of the two had engaged counsel, represented that his had no lawyer, and it was as ranged that the one laywer should defend both prisoners. The defences of the two men were conflicting, but this did not appear until too late to make any alteration in the arrangement. As a result Capelli was sentenced to the gallows, while his companion escaped with his life. Then commenced fight on behalf of the doomed man, which is without parallel in Canadian judicial history. Behind the struggle which continued all through the summer of 1907 stood the unfaltering

form of Michael Basso. Twice the scaffold was erected within the walls of Parry Sound jail to hang the unfortunate Italian. Twice the ghastly instrument of doom was removed. At Mr. Basso's instance resort was had to the appellate tribunals. At this instance the trial judge became the prisoner's intercessor. A his instance Sir Wilfrid Laurier at the eleventh hour called a Cabinet council and commuted the death penalty. After a tollsome battle lasting for nearly a year, against what seemed o be insuperable obstacles, Mr. Basso's unwearying pertinacity was rewarded, and the prisoner was saved from unjust death upon the gallows.

Mr. Basso's integrity was undoubted. A lawyer in a case in which he was translating evidence, asked for another interpreter as a check upon Mr. Basso. The false and cruel principle followed in those days was that foreigners were proverbially prevaricators. "There is no need for a check," instantly interposed the judge, "Mr Basso is believed before any interpreter who acts in that capacity in any

court of our land." He was well informed both with re gard to Canadian history and the pas vicissitudes of his own unfortu country. He knew Garibaldi and admired him; he had met King Victor Immanuel, and loved him. Many were the incidents he was accustomed to relate of them both.

Mr. Basso had a perfect hatred of every form of cant, sham, imposition and deception.

Members of the British Chambers of Commerce, when you are on a visit, as you are now, in the domain of a great and friendly people, a great re-sponsibility rests upon your shoulders, that you may show to all who come in contact with you what you are really and that those whom you represent here men keenly, anxiously desirous that the relations between the nations should be characterized by fair trading and square dealing, as much in politics and political relations as in trade and in trade relationships.

Then, if I might address you, Mr President and the other members of the American Chambers of Commerce, ments of the British Empire: I desire you have accorded the gentlemen who represent the British Chamber of Com-

For yourselves, we have watched with interest and with sympathy the steps you have taken from time to time help in the reconstitution of the shattered financial and commerciai machinery of Continental Europe. We realize that you who are engaged in great trading and financial operations in America realize fully how great the devastation is, not in the material sense, but in the machinery of credit, the machinery of trade, the machinery of commerce. We' realize how much you have done to re-establish that machinery in Continental Europe.

I have had many opportunities of discussing with one or the other members of your chamber steps which might be taken to help Continental Europe, and I believe that some of those conversations have not been without benefit to those whom it was our primary desire to serve. We are. British and American, representatives of two of the great communities of the world, and I believe that it is of vital importance-to-both our countries -aye, and to the whole world-that there should be a real co-operation between our natoins, a co-operation based upon respect, upon understanding, and upon a recognition of the greatest frankness in our relations one with

MUTUAL TRUSTFULNESS .. NECES-SARV

We cannot gain anything by being enspicious of one another, and we can suffer much harm and a great economic loss if weight and in a position to trust one another absolutely.

In all my dealings, I might say in all my pleasant dealings-for all my ealings have been pleasant with the State Department—I have made it an hvariable rule to be as frank as it is possible for one man to be in dealing with another, and to lay before your representatives all the information which it was in my power to give; and I can say this, that there is no political action that I know of contemplated by the British Government which is designed to have a commercial or trade effect which I have not had per-mission or been instructed to disclose

fully to your Government.

I helieve complets, full, free and frank reciprocity in that interchange of information will do more for the world than any scheme or any attempt to build diplomatic structures which a wind some day may blow away. Frankness, openness, and a real ex-pression of what we aim at—that is what will make friendship possible between us. And yet you have only to look at some of the papers some times to see expressed beliefs that our two governments are not working closely together in these matters.

NO PROTESTS FROM BRITAIN.

I saw it stated in the papers that the British Government has protested one action after another of the United States Government in recent weeks. That is not true. There have been no

I saw it stated in the press that the British Government has desired to sell German ships back to Germany with-I could not understand how it could so-but with, so far as the mind of the writer was able to encisage what was happening, a desire to

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ple in some way the American mercantile marine. That was absolutely untrue. The British Government cannot legally sell any ship that is in British hands. No British subject can sell any ship that is in his hands to Germany or to any German, for under the leadership of the Government an act was passed by the British Parliament making it for a term of years illegal to dispose of the mercan-

tile ships. HOW HARM IS DONE.

These statements appear in the press, and they do harm. They might do much harm if they were not contradicted but far better than con develop such acquaintanceship between one another, such respect, such understanding between our nations, that our ears will be so filled with truth that falsehood will fine no lodging there.

It is therefore with the greatest pleasure and regarding it as a very great honor done by you, members of the American Chamber of Commerce, that I take this opportunity of thank ing you for the entertainment you to my fellow countrymen and to me, have given me of addressing you. thank you.



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
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
