



Dear Sir,—Would you give me space in your valuable paper to say a few words about the Strike at Grand Falls. In one of your issues a few days ago I noticed an article put in by the Work-man's Committee that talked a lot about patriotism. Well the question is are the Grand Falls workers so very patriotic, at least in some respects. In the first place the Union that is back-ing them in the strike, and to which most of them belong, is an American and not a British Union. In other words pay high fees to this union the most of

which goes out of the country.

Last year the A.N.D. Co., Ltd., paid out in wages alone, at Grand Falls, Millertown, Badger and Botwood at least \$130,000 per month which means about \$1,560,000 for a year. Now if the strike lests six months the company. strike lasts six months the company will possibly not be able to get their wood off the river with the fall floods, and therefore will not be able to restart before the spring. The loss to the

people of this country will therefore be two thirds of \$1,560,000, that is allowing for the wage reduction of one third. The country will therefore lose over a million dollars. Can the country in its present sate of afford this? As stated by the committee the

as stated by the committee the labouring man gets thout \$54 per month. A certain person (a married man with family) told me that he had lived at Grand Falls about a year and a half ago, when prices were just as high if not higher, for less than \$54 W. K. BUCKLEY, Mfg. Chemist, per month, but as he said he did not indulge in many luxuries. The trouble in Grand Falls is that pretty near everybody there has been living right up to the "hilt" when times were flush, and now when depression has come they feel it keenly. Durham miners are also of the same way of thinking, although they were expected to vote for the owners' terms. Lancashire shows a two-thirds majority against the owners' offer, and Scottish miners are nearly solid against the terms.







Some of them are married men with families at home, who told of only coming to North Sydney about a week ago to seek amployment in the Cape Breton collieries or at any work, even at any price, but were unsuccessful. Asked why they left Newfoundland they said conditions were unbearable, but they would rather starve among their own people than among strangers. In some cases the applicants admitted to the Immigration official that they misrepresented the facts when passing through, so anxious were they to obtain work in this country. The men will be sent back on the steamer Kyle tonight.

According to Melville Chater, who is on a tour of inspection for the Near East Relief, madness is still regarded by Turks, Ahmeanians and other as 6 evidence of the presence of an evil spirit, and exorcisms and darkness are the means taken to drive him away.
In a little village of Greek populathe means taken to drive him away. tion, near Talas, where Mr. Chater and a party of relief workers were being entertained, "the Greek Bishop, Nicholas," writes Mr. Chater, "showing us some dungeon-like vaults under the chapel, in which vaults the early Christians held service during periods of persecution. These pitch-black vaults are now employed by neighbor-

ing Turks as a lunatic asylum. "When an evil spirit enters into some one he or she is let down through a barred grating into the vaults and loaded with heavy chaims, which I saw there. The devil is thus exorcised by pitch darkness, chains, bread and water diet and prayers until the situation pecomes too uncomfortable for him and he forsakes the affected person.

"The Bishop assured me that this unholy, unscientific and unsanitary method of dealing with temporarily deranged persons is still in force, and strange as it may seem, the mental disturbance is often cleared up in twentyfour hours." Camphor From Formosa

Practically all the camphor in the world comes from Formosa. An average camphor tree 12 feet in circumferphor at present prices to bring its owner \$7.500. The camphor laurel is but one of a number of trees which grow together. They grow wild; in old days some as big as 40 feet in circumference were found, but these soon fell to the axes of the wasteful pioneer amphor-gatherers, and now they must e sought in the jungles. Camphor gathering is not a simple task. Apart from the labor of scouting for trees cutting them down, and extracting the camphor, in many parts of Formosa the camphor workers perform their labors under armed guard. For the thick woods sometimes swarm with unseen but deadly head-hunters. Even with the efficient protection supplied by the Japanese-who now control the island, and who have made camphor Government monopoly—workers now and then fall at their work. When a camphor tree is felled every bit of the wood is preserved and reduced to chips. These chips are placed in a retort above water which is kept boiling by a fire built beneath. The vapor which rises contains the camphor which is condensed into the solid



Caleb Robbins, representing men outside the city where the men were paid with the joint money of the city and the East End district, also sued, and Henry Duffitt, sued on behalf of the men, under John Dempsey foreman, to whom the letter was not read and who were unaware of the notice to reduce. These are three of the cases. The fourth is by Caleb Robbins for work performed by certain of the men on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The points which determined Judge Morris's judgment are very simple, although a great deal of evidence was taken which helped to elucidate the facts of the case. "Had the Council the right to reduce the wages of the men working in the city with the Council's money." The judgment was "It had." "Was the notice to the men notice to the foremen." The judge decided it was, and on deciding those two points in favor of the Council dismissed the case. body knows that I must do the absurd or wrong thing, that it is the correct thing for reporters and others to ridicule and abuse me whenever they get the chance. The only person I congratulated was Mr. Carter, who so alily pleaded the Council's case, and won it as I knew it would win it. I told the men so a week ago. I told Mr. Whitty so Thursday night. These cases had to be brought. They are only the preliminary steps in a movement that will settle questions of great moment. I purposely brought my weakest case first, for if we won on that the others would follow. It might be just as well for me to give you the facts, which I shall do briefly. The Premier, while Mr. Gosling was absent from the city, induced the Council to spend its own money in relief work. He, through guaranteeing a loan of \$150,000, enabled the Council to get the money from the Royal Bank. In addition to that the East and West End districts through their representatives coontri-

abled the Council to get the money from the Royal Bank. In addition to that the East and West End districts through their representatives coontributed \$10,000 each for work outside the city, on condition that the Council spent a similar amount and spent it at the regular rate of pay, the regular employees of the Council, doing similar work, received, namely three dollars and thirty cants for a day of ten hours. The foreman were to receive two cents an hour more than the men. The men worked two or three weeks at three-thirty. On the 24th the foremen and timekeepers received a circular letter addressed "Sir," notifying them that commencing the 26th, the rate of wages would be \$2.50 per day. Some of the foremen told their men, some did not. The men as a whole, acting on my advice, objected, and notified the Council that they worked under protest. I also notified the Council. They put in their time sheets at three-thirty. They were not accepted. They finally accepted two-fifty under protest. Whitty was paid for the six days, commencing May 26th, four-eighty less than he would have been had he been paid at three-thirty rate. The others also were paid so much less. 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
