

(By HAROLD BALFOUR.) There is great art in crashing y n such a way that the pilot rema chief shock of impact. To crash scientifically when occasion demands is an accomplishment of every ex-

Except in cases where a mishap, or pilot's error, has put the machine out of control at such a height that a terrible accident is bound to occur, an airman has time for the realisation that he is bound to crash within the space of the next second or so. The actions of that second may decide An engine failure at a low height over a wood means a certain crash,

but if the pilot does the right thing there is no reason for serious harm. An Air Force pilot whom I knew was once flying over the New Forest when his engine stopped. Choosing the densest part of the forest that he could see, he glided down and "stall-ed" his machine about four feet above the topmost branches. When a machine stalls it will "pancake," which means that it drops downwards on an even keel. In this case so gently and skilfully did the pilot arrange his crash that the branches of the trees formed a cushion for his landing and a bed for the machine.

The stranded pilot dared not move from his seat in case of dislodging the aeroplane from its strange perch. After he had been missing for some hours an aerial search party set out to find him. 

The answer is found springs. Briefly, every spring has spring leaves when they are deflected. The latter is the resistance ofmetal becomes "fatigued," and thus may be considered as something beyond the owner's control. Friction resistance, however, vaires widely, always tending toward higher limits. If the springs are allowed to become rusty, if dirt and foreign matter is allowed to work in between the leaves the resistance from fric-tion may equal anywhere from 10 to 20 per cent. of the force necessary to compress the springs. Thus if a wheel goes into a hole with such force that the respective spring is deflected by a force equal to 700 pounds, anywhere from 70 to 210 pounds will be required to take care of the frictional resistance, and the cupants of the car will experience he sensation of having had the par-

Bamboo furniture that has been in se some time without any other atention than dusting may be greatly improved if treated as follows:

Add a handful of common salt to a pail of warm water and wash the furiture very thoroughly, using a nail ush so as to reach all the crevices. As soon as the water becomes at all discolored replace it with fresh. Then eave the furniture to dry, but avoid lacing it in the sun.
