THE NEW ARCHEISHOP.—It is announced that Dr. Tait, Lord Bishop of London, has been appointed to the vacant See of Canterbury and the Primacy of England. Dr. Tait was born in Edinburgh, Glasgow and Oxford. While at Oxford as Tutor he was a strenuous opponent of the Tractarian movement, and if he is of the same mind now, his position will give him considerable power in stemming the tide of Ritualism. On the death of Dr. Arnold in 1841, he succeeded him as Head Master of Rugby Grammar School, the position now held by Dr. Temple. In 1850 he accepted from Lord John Russell's Government the Deanery of Carlisle. He there originated and himself conducted nearly every Sunday an additional pulpit service, and in visiting the poor, instructing the ignorant, and superintending charities, worked as hard as a curate. In 1856 he succeeded the late Dr. Bloomfield as Bishop of London. The new Archbishop is thoroughly evangelical, and is strongly opposed to Pusyism on the one hand, and the Broad Churchism of the "Essays and Reviews" style on the other.
