PULSORY EDUCATION IN SCOTLAND. Co cotchmen have lately come out in a new

Correnson Exercation is SCOTLAND.— Sootchmen have lately come out in a new character, and are now prepared to dis-pute with the people of New England States, the honour of having originated a system of compulsory education. Many facts connected with the state of educa-tion in Scotland, which hitherto had re-mained unknown, were brought to light during the debate on the Scotch educa-tion bill. According to the Duke of Ar-gyle an act was passed by a Scotch Par-liament in 1494 imposing the heavy pen-alty of twenty pounds upon parents who failed in certain circumstances to send their children to school, the compulsion being, however, confined to freehold-ers and that only in the case of the eldest sons. Here is the remarkable fact that nearly four centuries ago a stringent com-pulsory rule was applied to a certain sec-tion of the population so as to secure the education of those likely to prove the more influential members of the com-munity, and yet the bill for the adoption of a general compulsory law introduced during the present session of the British Parliament met with much opposition. Sury Worsmr IN BITTAIN.—The uses of Stonehenge among the generations which two thousand years ago peopled the is-lands of Britain have long excited dis-cussion among antiquarians. That the structure was connected with some form of druidical worship has been considered to be beyond reasonable doubts, and a correspondent to the Times offers sugges-tions that the worship was that of the structure was connected with some form of the long structure of the some sugges-tions that the worship was that of the sense of the long st day of the year. June 21, a group of visitor is sure to as-semble at dawn, to watch for surrise. "As the hour approaches," says the writer, "they gather to the circles of Stonchenge, from the centre of which, looking north-east, a block of stone, set some distance from the ruin, is one en as that its top coincidae with the line of the horizon, and, if no mist or cloud prevents, the sum as it rises on this, the morning of the longest day in the year, will be seen coming up exactly over the centre of the stone, known, from this circumstance, as the Pointer. Our group of watchers yesterdey morning numbered some thirty-five, assembled chiefy from the neighbor-ing towns—four of them, however, from London, who had walked from Salisbury through the night for the chance of seeing this interesting proof of the solar arrangement of the circles of Stonehenge. As one who has now on several occasions been present and seen the sim fins come-up over the Pointer and strike its first rays through the central entrance on to the so-called Altar Stone of the mins. To enomend this obvious proof of solar wor-ship in its constructors to those recent theorists who see in Stonehenge only a memorial of a battle or a victory. Let a visitor, also, on any day at noon, look at this Pointer, and see if the huge stone be not set at such a particular inclination as to be like the guonond of a sundial." \$550,000, or about one-third is set apart for drill pay and camp purposes, and all other incidental expenses connected with. The drill and training of the militia, including expenses of drilling 33,000 mean in special brigade camps for sixteen days \$500,000; and for drilling 10,000 addi-tional men in brigade camps for sixteen days, \$50,000. The men, while in camp, should be paid at least \$1 per day with rations. The pay of the volunteers under such an arrangement would amount to only \$528,000 less than one third the whole amount appropriated for 1872.5 for militia purposes. Is it
