The *Index* is intended to be published weekly, each week's issue during the month being revised and added to, so as to contain the dates of the publication of all news of general public interest of the current month. The first number in each month will form a complete record for the previous month. It is also intended to publish a master index annually.

The dates given in the *Index* are the dates of publication in the newspapers of this continent generally. This, it is thought, will be more convenient than the dates of the occurrences.

The indulgence of subscribers is asked on account of any shortcomings that may be found in the first issue. The progress of the work of classification has shown possibilities for improvement, and any suggestions, tending to make the *Index* more generally useful, will be gratefully received.

In succeeding issues it is intended to include a very complete sporting column, and to devote special attention to the records of utterances by public men.
