


ECLIPSES OF 1858.

This year there will be two Eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, February 27th. Eclipse begins at 4h. 20m. ends 6h. 33m. P. M.—As the Moon will not rise until about 5h. 56m., only the ending of this Eclipse will be visible.

II.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, March 15th. Eclipse begins at 5h. 58m. morning. ends 9h. 55m. morning. Central eclipse at 8h. 0m.—This will be a very important Eclipse throughout the whole of England. The Eclipse will be but partial here.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, August 24th, invisible here.
IV.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, September 7th, invisible here.

MORNING AND EVENING STARS OF 1858.

The Planet *Venus* (♀) will be *Morning Star* until March 1st, then *Evening Star* until Dec. 14th; then *Morning Star*. — *Mars* (♂) will be *Morning Star* until May 16th; then *Evening Star* the rest of the year. — *Jupiter* (♃) will be *Evening Star* until May 20th; then *Morning Star* until Dec. 8th; then *Evening Star*. — *Saturn* (♄) will be *Morning Star* until Jan. 15th; then *Evening Star* until July 25th; then *Morning Star* the rest of the year.

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Isaac Woodward, John Wilson, Lieut. Charles Hare, R. N., and John James Robin- R. N., Esquires.

Isaac Woodward, Esquire, Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick, and also of those belonging to Nova Scotia which are partly supported by this Province.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $\frac{3}{4}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed on the west side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin.—A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This Light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark and forty light in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distances by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House. This Light bears from the Light house on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor E. distance 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, about N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, S. S. W. N. W. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W.

2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

2 miles.

NOTE.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Ball. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable, Seal Islands S. and by W. $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and near from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W. distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, (British or American) Both the Buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge, (St. Mary's) E. S. E. easterly.

" Gannet Rock Light E. by S. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. 13 miles.

" Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

" Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

" N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" Little River Head, N. by W.

" Libby Island Light House, (American,) N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the lights.

It is recommended that the Ship's Compasses should be well compared and adjusted (particularly in new ships), before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, or (14 points) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay (South Channel) between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light, (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main Channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights.—Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet—Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The House is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quiddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova-Scotia), in lat. 43, 39, N. long, 66, 8. W. It exhibits a plain revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 135 feet above the level of the sea.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John—passed 3d August, 1848.

Five Shillings per foot, for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the Wharves; and Five Shillings per foot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of Vessels, under and by Virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vessels, the sum of Ten Shillings per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vessels from any mooring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to another Wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred, and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings; for Vessels over Two Hundred and not exceeding Three Hundred Tons, Fifteen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.—From Patridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, Five Shillings per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point LePreau, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point LePreau to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West—of North Channel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS.—(near Saint John.)—The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

AGRICULTURAL.

RURAL LIFE.—The occupations and pleasures of rural life have ever been the themes upon which poets and writers of exuberant imaginations have delighted to dwell, but that there is something more substantial even than in the brilliant and fanciful pictures drawn by these individuals, and that their prototypes have real existence in nature, witness the expressions of pleasure with which the feeble, emaciated, and enervated resident of the city, tearing himself from the murky atmosphere, the noisome smells, and the putrid exhalations of its pent up streets, leaving behind him its excitements, its dissipation, and artificial life, after a long interval finds himself in the diversified scenery of a beautiful and romantic country. His seeing, his hearing, his smelling, his tasting, his touch, all find employment. Every sense is gratified; his whole system, mental and corporeal, seems inspired with new vigor. We cannot add a more forcible illustration of the healthful and agreeable influence of rural pursuits, than by introducing some remarks of an ancient writer, who enters upon the subject with the feelings of one whose whole soul is evidently enlisted in what he describes:

“Moreover, it (husbandry) furnishes us with beautiful flowers and other excellent materials for the ornament and decoration of the temples and altars, affording the richest gayety and most fragrant odors. What science is more agreeable to a studious man; for he finds in it every thing he can have occasion for. Where can we abide with greater pleasure in summer, than near rivers, lakes, springs, woods, groves and fields, where gentle breezes fan the air? Where may a man treat his guests more agreeably, or make more triumphant banquets? What place do servants delight in more? Or, what other is more agreeable to his wife? Where do children covet more to be? or where are friends better received, or better satisfied? There is no science in our mind, more delightful than this, if a man has a convenient substance to put him to work; nor any business more healthful or profitable to a man if he have skill and industry.”

AGRICULTURAL CHEMISTRY.—I feel and know, that merely to know a thing is not enough to secure that we do it, and that only a new generation is fitted to promote the real progress of science. After a few decades, matters will be otherwise. The old, deep rooted errors, always act as obstacles, which are stronger and more powerful than a new truth. That which a man seeks, he can ultimately find only on one road, and that the true one; and if he obstinately follows another path, which must be a wrong one, how can he hope to reach the goal? Let the able and excellent teachers of agricultural chemistry keep up the courage necessary to ultimate success. For man, in reference to mental food, is exactly like a plant; as the plant must receive its food, not concentrated, but infinitely diluted with water if it is to thrive—so it is with the mind of man. An abstract truth only acts upon the senses and feelings when it is presented to them properly diluted, turned on

every side, and inside out, dressed, adorned, painted, and finally it resembles the germinating seed of a tree which the wind or a bird has carried into a cleft of a rock. There lies in it, as in the seed, a wonderful organic force, which gradually conquers all obstacles, as the roots of the seed when it has become a tree can cleave or raise the heaviest rock, and, as the old proverb says, "all without noise;" for that which grows makes no noise.

ON TRANSPLANTING TREES.—The proper season for transplanting varies with different cultivators. Many prefer autumn planting, and the reason they give for their preference is this: when trees are planted in autumn, they say the ground becomes better settled about the roots of the tree, and they are then enabled to throw out fibres in the spring. I greatly prefer spring planting for nearly all varieties of trees, for this reason: if planted in the fall, very soon after setting out, the trees have the heavy fall rains, which renders the loose earth around the tree a perfect mortar, and the wind then blows the tree to and fro, making a circle or halo around the tree externally about three inches from the trunk, all around, which freezes hard at night, and presents in the morning a rocky wall around the tree, and as the hole is about six inches larger than the collar of the tree, it chafes off the bark around at the collar, and unless some manure is placed by it, the frost will extend down around the tree and freeze the small roots. The season for planting on the banks of the Hudson, varies from the first of November to the first of December for autumn planting, and from the first of April to the fifteenth of May for spring planting. I, for many reasons, do all my planting in the spring, except for apple trees, and as they are so very hardy, autumn planting will answer full as well, or perhaps better for that tree.

The following brief rules may be some guide to those who have not had any experience in setting out trees:—1st. Never plant a tree unless the ground has been well pulverized. To plant trees in holes as many persons do, is almost fatal to their growth. 2d. Deep planting is a great error in this country, and more trees die from this than any other cause. They may thrive for a year or two, but soon die, and apparently without any cause. The fibrous or surface roots should not be more than an inch and a half or two inches below the surface of the ground. 3d. Commence planting by taking out the earth to a foot or more in depth, and of a sufficient width to admit all the roots without crowding, bending or breaking them. If the soil is poor, compost, well decayed, rotten manure, wood ashes, or a little lime, (if the tree planted is apple or pear) may be thrown advantageously into the bottom of the hole below the roots. Then fill in among the roots with earth well mixed with fine compost manure, using the hand to scatter it well among the smallest fibres, and do not leave any large holes under the tree to act as miniature cisterns. 4th. Before planting, prune all the roots that have been injured in removal with a sharp knife, but do not cut them off with a dull spade, as many do; shorten such roots as are too long, and take out those that are too much crowded; avoid injuring or cutting any of the small fibres.

WORK SHOPS AND STORMY DAYS.—Every farmer who has boys should provide them a work-shop. It may be a building erected on purpose, or else partitioned off from the carriage-house, corn-house, or other out-building. Let it be neatly made, and not unpleasantly situated, for it should be attractive and not repulsive to those for whom it is intended. It should be tight, and furnished with a small stove, so as to be comfortable in the winter. It should be provided with a work-bench and vice, a shaving horse for using the drawing-knife, and perhaps a small foot-lathe. The two latter are convenient but not essential. The tools should be two or three planes, augers of different sizes, a few chisels, a brace bit, drawing-knife, saw and hammer. A small part of these will answer, and others may be added; the cost of the tools varying from five to twenty-five dollars.

Such a work-shop will afford several important advantages. The greatest is the assistance it will render the cause of *practical education*. The best inheritance any man can leave his children, is, not wealth to support them, but *the ability to help and take care of themselves*.

THE SOURCE OF FAT IN ANIMALS.—During the course of the past year, experiments have been made in France to prove that the fat of animals exceeded the quantity which could be referred to the food they were supplied with. The chief experiment was made on ducks. Some were fed on rice, a substance which contains only a few parts of fat in the thousand. Others were fed on rice with a certain amount of butter added. At the end of the experiment, the first were as lean as when first placed upon the diet; the latter, in a few days, became positively balls of fat. Other experiments were made on pigs. It was found, as the result of several trials, that there was more fat produced than was contained in the food on which they were fed, and that pigs fed six months on potatoes yielded no more fat than was contained in the food they consumed. Food which, given alone, has not the properties of fattening, when mixed with a fatty matter acquires the property to an astonishing degree; and fattening articles of food, which do not contain much fat, always abound with its chemical constituents, the principal of which is azote, and from whence the fat acquired is certainly derived.

ADVICE TO YOUNG FARMERS.—Allow me to say, to young farmers especially: Let us be studious and inquisitive, as well as laborious; let us be simple and frugal in our habits; avoid useless expenditures; leave fine dresses and fast horses, and showy dwellings to those who really need such things to recommend them. Let us ever remember that for health and substantial wealth, for rare-opportunities, for self-improvement, for long life and real independence, farming is the best business in the world.

BRUISED OATS FOR HORSES.—An individual who has their feeding horses on whole and on bruised oats, states, that a horse fed on bruised oats will look and work as well as one fed on double the same quantity of oats not bruised.

MISCELLANEOUS.

LABOUR THE SOURCE OF PROSPERITY.—You should bear constantly in mind that nine-tenths of us are, from the very nature and necessities of the world, born to gain our livelihoods by the sweat of the brow. What reason have we, then, to presume that our children are not to do the same? If they be, as now and then one will be, endowed with extraordinary powers of mind, those powers may have an opportunity of developing themselves; and if they have not that opportunity, the harm is not very great to us or to them. Nor does it hence follow that the descendants of labourers are always to be labourers. The path upwards is steep and long, to be sure. Industry, care, skill, excellence, in the present parent, lay the foundation of a rise, under more favourable circumstances, for the children. The children of these take another rise, and by and by the descendants of the present labourer become gentlemen. This is the natural progress. It is by attempting to reach the top at a single leap that so much misery is produced in the world; and the propensity to make such an attempt has been cherished and encouraged by the strange projects that we have witnessed of late years, for making the labourers virtuous and happy by giving them what is called education. The education which I speak of consists in bringing children up to labour with steadiness, with care, and with skill; to show them how to do as many useful things as possible; to teach them to do all in the best manner; to set them an example in industry, sobriety, cleanliness and neatness; to make all these habitual to them, so that they never shall be liable to fall into the contrary; to let them always see a good living proceeding from labour, and thus to remove from them the temptations to get at the goods of others by violent or fraudulent means.

HOW RAIN IS FORMED.—To understand the philosophy of this phenomenon, essential to the very existence of plants and animals, a few facts derived from observation and a long train of experiments must be remembered. Were the atmosphere everywhere, at all times, at a uniform temperature, we should never have rain, hail, or snow. The water absorbed by it in evaporation from the sea and the earth's surface would descend in an imperceptible vapour, or cease to be absorbed by the air when it was once fully saturated. The absorbing power of the atmosphere, and consequently its capability to retain humidity, is proportionably greater in warm than in cold air. The air near the surface of the earth is warmer than it is in the region of the clouds. The higher we ascend from the earth the colder we find the atmosphere. Hence the perpetual snow on very high mountains in hottest climates. Now, when from continued evaporation the air is highly saturated with vapor, though it be invisible, if its temperature is suddenly reduced by cold currents descending from above, or rushing from a higher to a lower latitude, its capacity to retain moisture is diminished, clouds are formed, and the result is rain. Air condenses

as it cools, and, like a sponge filled with water and compressed, pours out the water which its diminished capacity cannot hold. How singular, yet how simple, is such an arrangement for watering the earth?

THE MIND THE STANDARD.—A visitor going into a free school in New England during the half-yearly examination, noticed two fine looking boys, one of whom had taken the first prize, and the other the second. "Those are two fine looking fellows," said he to the teacher; "I suppose they belong to the highest class of society." "That is not the way we class our boys," said the teacher, "we follow the old maxim of 'handsome is, that handsome does.' The boy who took the first prize is the son of the man who saws my wood; the boy who took the second is the son of a Vice-President of the United States."

EDUCATION.—Of the two, a thorough collegiate education, with advantages of a European tour, and the being taught to read the Bible by a pious mother and there stop, we have no hesitation in our own mind, in choosing the latter for every child of ours, if we had the option of but one of the two, and would feel an infinitely greater confidence that those children, whether boys or girls, would grow up to be independent, useful, and solid members of society. —*Hull's N. Y. Journal of Health.*

A CRUST FOR CORMORANTS.—Doctor Paley happened to be at Cambridge, when Mr. Pitt first made that university a visit after he was prime minister. Some of the heads of houses applied to Dr. Paley to preach in St. Mary's Church; he replied, that he should have no objection to preach, if they did not object to his text. "That," they observed, "must be impossible." But they desired to know the text he would prefer. "I shall preach said he from these pertinent words: 'There is a lad here who has five loaves and two small fishes—but what are they *among so many?*'"

LIGHTNING CONDUCTORS.—There being no dispute about the perfect safety of conductors to life and property, the only questions to be considered are, which are the safest and cheapest? There is no person familiar with the subject who will not say that soft iron rods in one continuous length, projecting to a sufficient height above the highest point of a building, and terminating in a well or cess-pool, or in damp earth, are the best electrical conductors known. Now, instead of erecting a single rod from the centre of the building, and running over the roof, with fancy points and coloured insulators, such as are hawked about and sold at high prices, put up as many as you have chimneys at least, and one at each gable end or high projecting point of every out-building. To do this cheaply, purchase a coil of quarter-inch iron wire, and as many small staples as may be required; saw off as many pieces of bone of proper length and size, with a hole of suitable dimensions for the wire to pass through, and with a ladder and the help of one man, a person of ordinary ingenuity can put up a dozen rods in half a day, at a cost of *one cent a foot*. Who will run the risk of life and property, when perfectly safe conductors can be erected for less than a dollar a piece, including the cost of putting them up?

GLUE IN BONES.—Bones contains from 30 to 36 per cent. of earthy matter, chiefly phosphate of lime, and the remainder is gelatine. When bones are digested in muriatic acid, they become transparent and flexible like leather, the earthy matter is dissolved, and after the acid is all carefully washed away, pieces of glue of the same shape as the bones remain, which are soluble in hot water, and adapted to all the purposes of ordinary glue.

A QUEER 'TRIAL OF SPEED.'—A bet was recently made in France between two farmers about the speed of horses and oxen, with the same load and same distance; the distance travelled was 23 kilometres, (about 12 miles,) a four-horse team was put into a wagon loaded with 10,000 lbs. of beet-root pulp. The oxen were two yoke with the same load. The horses beat them only seven minutes, and would themselves have been beaten had they not been the best in the country. Time 2h. 6m.; 3h. 13m.

MET AT EVERY TURN.—“I say boy, stop that ox.” “I hav’nt got no stopper, sir.” “Well, head him then.” “He’s already headed, sir.” “Confound your impertinence, turn him.” “He’s right side out already, sir.” “Speak to him, you rascal you.” “Good morning, Mr. Ox.”

TO PRESERVE STAIR CARPETS.—Stair Carpets should always have a slip of paper put under them, at and over the edge of every stair, which is the part where they first wear out, in order to lessen the friction of the carpets against the boards beneath. The strips should be within an inch or two as long as the carpet is wide, and about four or five inches in breadth, so as to be a distance from each stair. This simple plan, so easy of execution, will, we know, preserve a stair carpet half as long again as it would last without the strips of paper.

A CURE FOR SORE BACKS OF HORSES.—The best method of curing sore backs, is to dissolve half an ounce of blue vitriol in a pint of water, and daub the injured parts with it four or five times a day.

TO MAKE A SICK HORSE DRINK FREELY.—A horse has a very sweet tooth. When he be unwell and wont drink, mix molasses or coarse brown sugar in the water; he will then drink freely.

TO MAKE COTTAGE PUDDING.—1 pint of flour, 2 teaspoonfuls of cream tartar, 1 teaspoonful soda, 3 teaspoonfuls melted butter, 1 cup of sugar, 1 cup of sweet milk, 1 egg. Mix all together and beat it a little while. Grease a dish, put it in and bake *half an hour*. Turn it out and serve with wine sauce.

DOUGHNUTS.—2 quarts of flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ a tea-cup of butter, 2 cups of sugar, 2 tea-spoonfuls of cream tartar, 1 teaspoonful soda, 2 eggs, and enough sweet milk to mix well.

A NATURAL DENTRIFICE.—The common strawberry is a natural dentrifice, and its juice, without any preparation, dissolves the tartareous incrustations on the teeth, and makes the breath sweet and agreeable.

GREASE SPOTS.—The following method of removing grease and oil spots from silk and other articles, without injury to the colours, is given in the *Journal des Connaissances Usuelles*:—Take the yolk of an egg and put a little of it on the spot, then place over it a piece of white linen, and wet it with boiling water; rub the linen with the hand, and repeat the process three or four times, at each time applying fresh boiling water: the linen is to be then removed, and the part thus treated is to be washed with clean cold water.

CRULLERS.— $\frac{3}{4}$ of a cup of butter, 2 cups sugar, 1 cup sweet milk, 4 eggs, $\frac{1}{4}$ a teaspoonful of soda, a little nutmeg and salt, enough flour to mix well.

CORN CAKE.—1 pint of Indian meal, 1 pint sweet milk, 2 table-spoonfuls of melted butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoonful of cream tartar, 1 teaspoonful of soda, and a small handful of sugar.

GINGER SNAPS.—1 cup butter, 1 cup lard, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups molasses, 1 small tablespoonful saleratus, 1 small tablespoonful ginger; they require considerable flour. Roll them out very thin and bake quickly.

SHREWSBURY CAKE.—Sift 1 pound of sugar, some pounded cinnamon, and a nutmeg grated, into 3 pounds of flour. Add a little rose water to 3 eggs well beaten, mix them with the flour, then pour in as much butter melted as will make it a good thickness to roll out.

GINGER CAKE.—Take 3 lbs. of flour, 1 lb. of sugar, 1 lb. of butter rubbed in very fine, 2 ozs. of ginger, a little nutmeg, a pint of molasses, a gill of cream; make them warm together, and bake them in a slack oven.

GINGERBREAD.—Take $1\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. of flour, $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of butter, well rubbed together; 1 oz. of ginger, a few carraway seed, 24 allspice, 12 cloves, a little cinnamon, 1 pint of molasses. Knead well.

PUFF PASTE.—Take $1\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of flour, and 1 lb. of butter; divide the butter into 4 equal parts; mix $\frac{1}{4}$ th part of the butter with $\frac{3}{4}$ ths of the flour; and work the remainder of the flour and butter in.

ELECTION CAKE.—Take 5 lbs. flour, 2 lbs. sugar, $\frac{3}{4}$ lbs. butter, 6 eggs, yeast, 1 pint of milk, and spice as you please.

SUGAR CAKE.—Take 1 lb. flour, $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. butter, 5 eggs. Mix and drop them on tin, and put sugar sanded on them, just as you put them into the oven, or frost them.

CUP CAKE.—Take 3 cups of sugar, 1 cup of butter, 2 teaspoonfuls of pearlash, 3 eggs, 5 cups of flour; all beaten together with as much spice as you please.

FORMED BY DR. HERSCHELL, AND REVISED BY DR. ADAM CLARKE.

This table and the accompanying remarks are the result of many years actual observation, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the sun and moon, in their several positions respecting the earth, and will by simple inspection shew the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail

Observations.—1. The nearer the time of the moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to *midnight*, the fairer will be the weather during the seven days following.

2. The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

3. The nearer to *midday* or *noon*, the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

4. The space for this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

5. The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e. from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather ; but this is mostly dependent on the *wind*, as is noted in the table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to those periods also.

7. To prognosticate correctly, especially in those cases where the *wind* is concerned, the observer should be in sight of a good *vane*, where the four cardinal points of the heavens are correctly placed.
