An act to consolidate and amend the acts respecting the duties of customs. Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and Honse of ommons of Canada, enacts as follows:

1. This act may be cited as The Cus-IN Tariff, 1897.

Subject to the provisions of this act and to the requirements of The the Revised Statutes, as amended, there shall be levied, collected and paid upon all goods enumerated, referred to se not commented. ferred to as not enumerated, in schedule A to this act, the several rates of duties of customs set forth and described in the same schedule and set opposite to each item respectively or Act, chapter thirty-two of Customs charged thereon as not enumerated, when such goods are imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse for consumption therein.

5. Subject to the same provisions and to further conditions contained in schedule B to this act, all goods enumerated in the said schedule B may be imported into Canada or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada without the payment of any duties of customs thereon.

6. The importation into Canada of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in schedule C to this act, is prohibited; and any such goods imported shall thereby become forfeited to the crown and shall be destroyed; and any person importing any such prohibited goods, or causing or per-mitting them to be imported, shall for each offence incur a penalty of two hundred dollars.

7. The whole or part of the duties hereby imposed upon fish and other products of the fisheries may be remitted as respects either the United States or Newfoundland, or both, upon governor proclamation of the which be council, may whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the governments of the United States and Newfoundland, or either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from Canada, in reduction or repeal of the duties in force the said countries respectively.

(a.) All bottles, fl flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, barrels, and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass or any other material capable of holding liquids, and all pack-

(c.) Packages not hereinbefore specified, and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty.;

(d) All such special packages or corerings as are of any use, or apparently designed for use other than in the importation of the goods they contain, shall be subject to the same rate

of duty as would thereon be levied if imported empty or separate from their contents.; (e) Tackages ('nside or outsid') cortaining free goods shall be exempt from duty when the packages are of such a nature that their destruction

With respect to goods imported for manufacturing purposes that are admissible under this act for any speellic purposes at a lower rate of duty than would otherwise be chargeable or exempt from: duty, the importer claiming such exemption from or proportional exemption from duty, shall make and subscribe to the followag affidavit or affirmation before the collector of customs at the port of entry, or before a notary public or a commissioner for taking affidavits:— I, (rame of importer) the undersigned, importer of the mames of the grois or articles, mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (swear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles)

16. Nothing contained in the foregoing going provisions shall affect the French Treaty Act, 1894, or chapter three of the statutes of 1895, intimied An Act respecting Commercial Treaties Affecting Canada.

4. The Controller of Customs may make such regulations as are necessary for carrying out the intention of this section.

13. Whenever the Governor-in-Councll has reason to believe that with regard to any article of commerce there exists any trust, combination, association or agreement of any kind among manufacturers of such article or dealers therein to unduly enhance the price of such article or in any other way to unduly promote the indiantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the Governor-in-Council may commission or empower any judge of the Supreme Court or Exchequer Court of Canada, or of any superior court in any province of Canada, to enquire in a summary way into and report to the Governor-in-Council whether such trust, combinaassociation or agreement Lxists.

2. The judge may compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath and require the production of books and papers, and shall have such other necessary powers as are conferred upon him by the Governor-in-Council for the purposes of such

enquiry.
3. If the judge reports ass that such trest, combination, association agreement exists, and if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumers is facilitated by the duties of customs imposed on a like article, when imported, then the Governor-in-Council shall place such article on the free list, or so reduce the duty on it as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in such article.

19. The following Acts are hereby repealed:—The Customs Tariff, 1894, being chapter thirty-three of the statutes of 1894; chapter twentythree of the statutes of 1835, intituled An Act to amend the Customs Tariff, 1894; and chapter eight of the statutes of 1896, intituled An Act further to Amend the Customs

Tariff, 1894. 20. All Orders in Council and all departmental regulations inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

21. The foregoing provisions of this Act shall be lickd to have come into force on the twenty-third day of April, in the present year one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and to apply and to have applied to all goods: imported or taken out of warehouse for consumption on or after the said day: Provided, that in the case of good swhich were imported for taken warehouse for coasumption, and on which duty was paid, on or after the twenty-third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and minetyseven, in accordance with the rate of duty set forth aspayabio on such the resolutions respecting goods in the duties of customs introduced in the House of Commons on the twentysecond day of the said month, or in any such resolution subsequently introduced in the said House, the dity so paid shall not be affected, nor shall the person paying it be entitled to any refund or be liable to any further payment of duty, by reason of such rate of duty being altered by any resolution introduced subseresolution quently to that in accordance with which such duty was paid and before the passing of this Act.

(a.) Ethyl alcohol, or the substance commonly known as alcohol, hydrated oxide of ethyl or spirits of wine; gin of all kinds, n.e.s.; rum, whiskey and all spirituous or alcoholic liquors, n. o. p.: amyl alcohol or fusel oil, or any substance known as potato spirit or potato oil; methyl alcohol, wood atcohol, wood naphtha, pyroxylic spirit any substance known as wood spirit or methylated spirits, absinthe, arrack or palm spirit, brandy, including artificial brandy and imitations of brandy; cordials and liqueurs of kinds, n. e. c.; mescal, pulque, shrub, shciedam and other schnapps; talia, angostura and similar alcoholic bitters or beverages, two dollars and forty cents per gallon.

(b.) Spirits and strong waters of any kind, mixed with any ingredient or ingredients, as being or known or designated as anodynes, elixirs, essences, extracts, lotions, tinctures or medicines, or medicinal wines—so called or ethereal and spirituous fruit sences, n.e.s., two dollars and forty cents per gallon and thirty per cent ad valorem.

(c) Alcoholic perfumes and perfumed spirits, bay rum, cologne and lavender waters, hair, tooth and skin washes, and other toilet preparations taining spirits of any kind, when in bottles or flasks containing not more than four ounces each, fifty per cent ad valorem

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When in bottles, flasks or packages, containing more than four ounces each, two dollars and forty cents per gallon and forty per cent ad valorem.

(d.) Nitrous ether, sweet spirits of nitre and aromatic spirits of ammonia, two dollars and forty cents per gallon and thirty per cent ad valorem

(e.) Vermouth containing not more than thirty-six per cent, and ginger containing not more than twenty-six per cent of proof spirits, ninety cents per gallon.

If containing more than these percentages respectively of proof spirits, two dollars and forty cents per gal-

lon.

(f.) Medicinal or medicated containing not more than forty per cent of proof spirits, one dollar and

fifty cents per gallon. Champagne and all other sparkling wines in bottles containing each not more than a quart, but more than apint, three dollars and thirty cents bottles; containing per dozen more than a pint each, but more than one-half pint, one dollar and sixty-five cents per dozen bottles; bottles conone-half pint each or less, eighty-two cents per doz'n bottles; bottles containing more than one quart each shall pay in addition to three dollars and thirty cents per dozen bottles, at the rate of one dollar and sixty-five cents per gallon on the quantity in excess o one quart per bottle, the quarts and pints in each case being old case being wine measure: in addition to the above specific duty there shall be an ad valorem duty of thirty per cent.

But any liquors imported under name cf wine and containing more than forty per cent of spirits of the strength of proof shall be rated for duty as unenumerated spirits.

SCHEDULE C.

PROHIBITED GOODS.

Books, printed paper, drawings, paintings, prints, photographs or representations of any kind of a treasonable or seditious, or of an immoral or indecent character.

Reprints of Canadian copyright works, and reprints of British copyright works which have been copyrighted in Canada also.

Coin, base or counterfeit,

Oleomargarine, butterine or other

similar substitute for butter.

Tea aculterated with spurious leaf or with exhausted leaves, or containing so great and admixture of chemical or other deleterious substances as to make it unfit for use.

Goods manufactured or produced wholly or in part by prison labour, or which have been made within or in connection with any prison, Jail or penitentiary, also goods similar in character to those produced in buck institutions, when sold or offered for sale by any person, firm or corporation having a contract for the manufacture of such articles in such institutions or by any agent of such

person, firm or corporation, or when such goods were originally purchased from or transferred by any such contractor.

SCHEDULE D-RECHROCAL TARIFF

On all the products of countries entitled to the bon fits of this Reciprocal Tariff, under the provisions of section sixteen, the duties mentioned in Schedule A shall be reduced as follows:

On and after the twenty-third of April, 1897, until the thirtieth day of June, 1898, inclusive, the reduction shall in every case be one-eighth of the duty mentioned in Schedue A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be seven-eights of the duty mentioned in Schedule A.

On and after the first day of July 1898, the reduction shall in every car be one-fourth of the duty mentione in Schedule A, and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall three-fourths of the duty mentione in Schedule A.

Frowded, however, that these reductions shall not apply to any of the following articles, and that such a ticles shall in all cases be subject the duties mentioned in Schedule viz.—Wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicin s and atticles containing alcohol; sugar, melasses and syrups of all kind, the product of the sugar cane or beet root tobacco, eigars and cir arettes.
