Held in the City of Nelson, B. C., April 7th to 10th, 1893.

Meeting called to order 10 a. m. by President G. F. Dougherty. After a short discussion it was decided to adjourn until 1 p. m., until the Rossland delegates should arrive.

1.30 p. m., meeting opened in the hall, President Dougherty in the chair.

It was moved that the request be granted at any time they present themselves.

Moved that we adjourn until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, for the purpose of giving the several committees time to prepare their reports.

The President then read his report, and the same was referred to the committee on President's address.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

To the Officers and Members of District A. Legion  
No. 6, W. F. of M.:

Brothers:—The time has arrived when I am in duty bound to render to you an account of my stewardship. Deeply conscious of the honor you conferred upon me in selecting me as your President, and realizing the responsibility accompanying the honor, I promised you to discharge the duties of my office to the best of my ability. This I have done, and while I may not have done so in a manner pleasing to all, I assure you that any errors made were not intentional. I was scarcely inducted into office when a calamity such as we never heard of before befell one of our boys. 110 of our co-workers lost their lives in the twinkling of an eye. Devotion and sorrow was brought to many homes because of the virtue and grace of a few millionaires who in their desire to fill their coffers so overthrew our world's prominent educational institutions at the expense of many lives. I relied largely upon the feelings of the explosion to direct the remainder of my action. In losing Brothers Bullock & Dill, I suffered losses beyond my comprehension. I turned to possibility, and opened upon him the belief for the good and welfare of the organization at large, and this district in particular. Since our last convention we have been suffering from strict dependence. Last Friday after the explosion at Worcester, Mass., we were invited by the Greyhound Bus Co. of Company, and with a new Manager came most welcome. The first offering of Mr. J.

H. Tonkin was to violate the time-honored custom of 8 hours from bank to bank. This caused a strike which lasted several weeks, and which practically paralyzed the industries of the Province, more particularly in the Boundary country. Hundreds of our brothers were thrown out of employment, and compelled to seek employment elsewhere, thus causing the Unions a set back, from which they had scarcely recovered when another one took place. The former strike was conducted by our worthy President, Charles Mooyer, assisted by our worthy brother J. A. Baker. All hail to the one who so valiantly defended the right of their fellow workers, and who yielded only when they became fully convinced of the futility of prolonging the battle.

During the year the depression of the lead and copper markets had a most disastrous effect on the industries of the southern part of the province, and I can see no relief until such time as the government will take the matter in hand and operate smelting and refining plants in the interests of the people. The Mine Owner's Association seem to be satisfied with their solution of the problem, and while it may afford temporary relief, I fail to see where it will become permanent. In the matter of compulsory arbitration, it is becoming apparent every day that some form of arbitration will have to be enforced for the future welfare of this province, and no better illustration could be had than the late strike at Fernie, the effects of which are being felt all over the metalliferous districts. In this case had there been a law to cover the point, Mr. Tonkin would have been compelled to meet his men and had he done so the strike could have been averted.

### IN RE THE FERNIE STRIKE.

On the 9th day of February I received a telegram from Fernie stating that they were on strike.

and requesting my presence. I proceeded to Fernie and found that the Union, although in very poor shape financially and numerically, had succeeded in completely tying up the whole valley, in which condition it remained until the agreement was duly signed and delivered. In making the settlement I had no hesitancy in recommending its acceptance. Not as what we wanted, but as the best we could accomplish, and while 28 men at Coal Creek suffered a reduction, the gains obtained benefited several hundred men; in short, it was a benefit to the many at the expense of the few. It appears that some dissatisfaction exists at this time, but I cannot see that there is any person to blame but Fernie Union, they knowing the majority that they had to overcome refusing to take a vote, left no other course open but that of declaring the strike off.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the valuable assistance rendered by my colleagues on the executive board. They have ever been ready and willing to render whatever assistance that they could for the benefit of our fellow workers, and for the guidance of your humble servant.

In the past my aim has been to do the greatest good to the greatest number, and I will assure you that whatever my position may be in the future my aim will be to take my fellow workers from the level of the slave to that to which by right they should aspire.

It is unnecessary for me to remind you that our expenses during the last few months have been somewhat heavy on account of two trips to Fernie and one to Nelson, when your executive officers met to consult in connection with the disastrous explosion, and also in connection with the late strike.

There are present 19 locals of the Western Federation in British Columbia, all of which are or have been on the books of the District Association No. 6. Nine of these are in good standing, and three of them have been voted for by members.

present. The total membership of those in good standing is 1,921. Five are in arrears, with a membership of 100.

Owing to the complicated condition of affairs at Fernie the executive board thought fit to establish a separate Association in the Crow's Nest Valley, known as the District Association No. 7, and included Fernie, Morrissey and Michell; this is regarded as subsidiary to District Association No. 6.

I would recommend that this Association endeavor to formulate some plan whereby we could furnish our proportion of the taxes to support the Trade and Labor Congress of Canada, believing it to be to the interest of organized labor to have its representative stationed at Ottawa during Parliamentary sittings. I cannot see why we should expect to enjoy the advantages accruing from the efforts of the laborer of the representative of that body unless we are willing to bear our share of the burden. I would recommend and strongly urge that the per capita tax be raised from the present rate of 10 cents per member per quarter to 12 1/2 cents per member.

In conclusion, Brother members - while heartily thanking you for the confidence you have reposed in me, I wish to tell you the position of honor and responsibility to which you say fit to elect me.

resolution that the same be referred to the committee on resolutions. Amendment carried.

Moved that this convention adopt a form of compulsory arbitration. Bro. J. C. Tyree and P. R. McDonald addressed the convention at great length on said motion. Bro. Villeneuve made some very interesting remarks on the subject. The President then called Bro. McDonald to the chair and took the floor in opposition to compulsory arbitration, advocating conciliation rather than compulsion.

Bro. A. J. McDonald addressed the convention, advocating more intelligence to be used at the ballot box, which would obviate arbitration.

Motion lost.

Moved that the Chair appoint a legislation committee, and that portion of the President's address relating to arbitration be referred to them, and they be instructed to bring in a resolution on the same and it to be considered by the delegates as a whole.

The Chair appointed the following brothers on said committee: P. R. McDonald, M. P. McFarrows, Howard Thompson, M. Delaney and C. H. Towne.

Moved that the Chair appoint a pre-convention committee that their recommendation be given to the pres.

Committee on resolution report as follows:

We, your committee on resolution recommend the following resolution for your consideration:

Whereas the working of the Eight Hour Law has improved both safety and economical in its application to metalliferous mining and

Whereas underground work is both dangerous and costly, and in view of the fact that a large proportion of the workers of the Province are underground workers and

Whereas, eight hours should be the maximum work day in all underground working ;

Therefore, be it Resolved, by District Association No. 6, in convention assembled, That the Provincial Government be urged to amend the Eight-Hour Law as applied to metalliferous mines to apply to all underground working :

And be it further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Premier of British Columbia, and also to our representatives, John Houston, Smith Curtis and R. F. Green.

The same was adopted as read.

Moved, that in view of the ambiguous construction of the word underground, in the metalliferous laws, the Secretary-Treasurer of the District Association write the Attorney General for a proper translation of the said law. Carried.

The delegation of Clergymen being announced, it was decided to take a recess to give the gentlemen an opportunity to address the convention. Rev. Mr. Reid quoted the proposed law. Rev. Mr. Robson, Rev. Mr. Graham and Mr. Black dwelt at length on the advisability of observing the Lord's Day, and urged the convention to take steps in the matter. Mr. Black extended an invitation to the members of the convention to attend the mock parliament that was to be held that night under the auspices of the Success Club. After the gentlemen retired it was decided to leave the matter with the local .

Moved that we adjourn till 1.30 p.m.

The convention resumed at 1.40 p.m.

#### Resolution from the Sandon Union

To the Members of the Western Federation of Miners:

Dear Sirs and Brothers: At the regular meet-

in of this Union held on December 20th, 1902, the following motion received the unanimous consent of the organization:

"Moved, seconded, and carried, that a committee of three be appointed to prepare and present to the locals of District No. 6, resolutions with a view towards securing their assistance in making representations to the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners that it is the earnest wish of the Unions in this district that the printing of all Union supplies for the district be done in the Province of British Columbia.

In view of the fact that we can procure from local source for \$90.00 per 1000 precisely the same card that under existing arrangements is costing us \$67.60 per 1000, we think it not only right and expedient, but in the interest of our membership imperative, that action along the lines indicated should be taken to insure the matter being laid before the next annual convention of the Western Federation of Miners.

Another material argument in favor of this course is that, since we ourselves object to the importation of alien labor, it is not only inconsistent in us, but wrong, if we fail to support the lead pointed out, where the latter object to the importation of pointed out, the furnishing of cards provides them with a means of livelihood.

And at the same meeting the foregoing motion was adopted.

"Moved, seconded, and carried, That the matter be referred to the expression of opinion from the locals of District No. 6 on the advisability of pressing the right of election in the matter of the right to represent each district on the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners be left in the hands of the foregoing committee.

Heretofore it has been customary for the convention as a body to nominate and elect the member who shall represent each district, on the executive committee.

This method we believe to be in many cases haphazard, and a method that often fails in providing the district with the man most calculated to maintain their undivided support. A large majority of the convention, however conscious they may be, can have but a superficial knowledge of the man they select to represent the district outside of their own, and the prominence of any delegate during a convention is no warranty that the same man is the best qualified to represent his district.

Now if you see this matter in the same light as we do, we would ask you to advise us on the subject. Any suggestion or amendment you may be pleased to offer we will gladly receive.

Should this movement receive the support of a sufficient majority of the miners of District No. 6 we will take steps to have the matter presented to the local, through the District Executive, with the view of having the same placed in the hands of the delegates from this district for united presentation to the next annual convention of the Western Federation of Miners.

We, your committee on constitutionality having  
acted upon as follows:

Article 1st. Be amended as follows:

Section 1. The officer of the Association shall be elected by the Full Hall. Vice President and Secretary Treasurer. Adopted.

Section 2. The officer of the Association shall be elected by the Full Hall and confirmed by a majority of votes cast. Adopted.

Section 3. The annual dues of the Association shall be held on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of the second

month prior to the annual convention of the Western Federation of Miners. Adopted.

Article 3. That section 3 be amended as follows: Insert after the word "this" in the sixth line on page 6: "Notify the Secretaries of all local Unions their per capita tax is due at the end of each quarter." Adopted.

Add section 5: The executive board shall prepare a list of all subjects that in their judgment should come before the annual convention, and submit same to all locals in their jurisdiction at least thirty days prior to date of convention. Adopted.

Article 4. Section 2 to be amended as follows: Strike out June 1st and insert July 1st. Adopted.

Article 7. Section 4 to be amended by changing date April 2nd, 1901 to April 7th, 1903. Adopted.

Re Bro. Dely's proposed amendment in reference to settlement of tribes. Your committee cannot recommend the adoption of same, for the following reasons:

1. If it were compulsory that any proposed terms of settlement of any difficulty had to be submitted to all localts of the district for a referendum vote, much valuable time would be lost, and even after receiving the approval of the district localts it would then have to be submitted to the executive of the W. F. M. for their approval.

2. In a district such as No. 6, where a number of localts would be situated at a considerable distance from the seat of the trouble, the outlying Unions could not be well enough informed of existing conditions to render an intelligent vote thereon.

3. In our opinion the matter is already provided for in the W. F. M. constitution. Adopted.

Bros. McDonald and Villeneuve presented the grievance of the Rossland Union.

On motion this matter took the same course.

Bro. Thompson presented the grievances of the Sandon Union.

On motion they were also referred to the proper committee.

Bro. McAndrew presented the grievance of the Kaslo Union.

It was disposed of in like manner as previous grievances.

#### REPORT OF GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE.

To the Officers and Members of District Association  
No. 6 Convention:

Brothers: We, your committee on grievances, beg to report as follows:

Re Complaint of the Rossland Union. Your committee would recommend that the Rossland Miners' Union should submit to the locals of this district through the medium of the District Association, a full statement of their case, together with an itemized account of the expenditures of money received from the W. F. of M. after the strike was declared off. We would further recommend that the Association urge the locals of the district to give the matter their best attention and consideration so that delegations representing such Unions at the W. F. of M. convention may, when the matter is brought up at said convention be able to see justice given Rossland Miners' Union.

Re Kaslo Complaint. We, your committee, believing the statement made by Bro. M. P. McAndrew of Kaslo Miners' Union, No. 69, on the floor of this convention yesterday, we consider that at the last convention of District Association No. 6, held at

Kamloops, that the Kaslo Miners' Union, No. 69, was mildly criticized by that convention. We would recommend to this convention that the executive of District Association No. 6 notify each local to that effect.

In re the Matter of the Sandon Union, No. 84, -- wherein they complain of the companies compelling the married men to board at the mine boarding houses. We would recommend that this convention disapprove of this method, in view of the fact that it interferes with the rights of all men; it also interferes with the business interest of the municipalities.

Therefore I in Resolution further be it resolved that the same be adopted and sent to the Board of Trade for consideration for the best welfare of all the miners in their charge. That the Province of Quebec grant and endeavor to the said Board the power of appointing one or more inspectors.

Recommendations re - Secretary-Treasurer's report:

Clause 1. We do not recommend at this time affiliating with the Trades and Labor Congress. First, because, owing to the depression in the country and so many of our members unemployed, that arrangement at this time would be very unpopular, and we believe the dues payment would have to be levied to meet any additional expense. Secondly, a great many of the locals are already represented in the different Trade and Labor Councils, which in turn are affiliated with the Trade Congress.

Clause 2. It is requested by this committee why the recommendation of the Secretary should be approved in raising the per capita tax from 10 cents to 12 1/2 cents, as there is a balance on hand of about \$300, which, we believe, with the additional payment of the delinquent locals, would leave a good balance to our credit.

Expense bill of the retiring officer were read, and on motion, the same were allowed.

There being no further business to come before the house, the President declared the 35th annual convention of District Association No. 6 adjourned, sine die.
