TWO CHILDREN, EACH FOUR YEARS OLD, WERE DROWNED IN SWANSEA MARSH WHILE PLAYING TOGETHER

Little Girl Attempted to Save Her Chum When the Thin Ice Broke But She Also Sank and the Two Bodies Were Found Together, With Only the Girl's Hand Showing Above the Ice-Albert Prosser and Bessie Morton Had Been Playmates Since They Could Toddle and Wandered Away From Their Homes to Slide on the Ice Pond Nearby.

One tiny hand protruding from a hole in the ice led to the discovery of the lifeless bodies of Albert Samuel Prosser, aged four, and Bessie Morton, also four years, in a pond at Swansea at 4.45 yesterday

When taken from the water the bodies were quite cold, showing that life had been extinct for at least 30 minutes. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, M.L.A., of Mimico, worked until late in the evening in an attempt to restore the two children to life, but his efforts were of no avail.

The position of the bodies when they were located would indicate that the little girl lost her life attempting to save the boy. It was only her arm that could be seen above the water, and her other hand was resting on Albert's. He was lying about two feet under water.

It is thought that the two children had gone on to the pond to slide. The boy ran ahead, stampng with his foot to test the ice. The ice gave way and he went thru. To all appearances Bessie ran forward and held out her hand to him. But he was too heavy for her. The ice broke again and they

The pond itself is in a deep gully. The western side is the only way the gully can be entered with safety. Here Southport street borders the pond, separating it from the main marsh to the west, known

The boy and girl reached the pond by Southport street. There is a thicket growing around it, and only one clear entrance to the ice is afforded. This is directly behind the home of D. Walkes whose yard extends to the water.

NO ONE HEARD ANY CRIES. Altho there are fully a dozen houses within a stone throw of where the drowning occurred, no one heard any cries or saw the accident. There was a concert being given in the village school to close it, preparatory to the Christmas holidays. Nearly every house in the vicinity was locked up while the parents attended the concert to hear their children recite or sing.

Bessie and Albert were too young to attend school, so they had been sent out to play. They were seen at Sylvester's grocery store on Windermere avenue about 4 o'clock. They then disappeared. When the girl did not appear as usual at her home and dusk was coming on, the mother became

She sent Arthur, the son, aged 12, to look for his sister. Arthur met Dawson Hawke and Ernest Ford, and asked them to help him.

After wandering about for some time the boys ran across footprints in the light fall of snow. These led from Southport street to the pond. Upon following them they came to the edge of the pond and saw the girl's hand relead shows the less. Drowned at Swansea

Young Hawke and Ford tried to walk out on the ice, but fell in. They then ran to the home of William Carr, nearby, and notified Carr and Sam McClennan. With the aid of a fence board and a pike pole, Carr, assisted by McClennan, was able to reach the two bodies. Before he got them ashore he was forced to wade up to his neck in ice and water. BODIES CARRIED TO HOMES.

Both the boy and girl were carried to the home of Mrs. Browning, a few yards away. When it was found there was no chance of restoring them the bodies were taken to the homes of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Prosser, Windermere avenue, and Mr. and Mrs. Immanuel Morton.

The result of the tragedy will be a double funeral on Saturday, and the children will likely be laid to rest side by side.

Ever since they could toddle, Bessle and Albert had been playmates. Defects in the little girl's speech and hearing had caused the parents a great deal of worry, as well as expense. Just lately her power of speech returned and she also could hear well. But during the time when she could not do either of these things the little boy seemed to be the only

person she could understand.

Sir James whitney, who was in England during the previous sitting of the committee, gave his views during a general discussion on taxation, in vigorous terms he classed the Howell-Elis amendments as entirely unnecessary. He was positively opposed to the principles of the oills. They suggested a narum-scarum remedy for a disease which did not exist in the province. "Until we need a change let us stay as we are," said he. "There is no necessity for such single tax legislation."

Tax reform received a blow below the beit yesterday. The two bills introduced by N. W. Rowall, leader of the opposition, and J. A. Ellis, cornservative M.L.A. for Otlaws, were rejected by the special tax committee frees bills aimed at a radical revision committee, by a vote of 20 to 7, decided that the proposed legislation was unsuitable, or, in other words, the pre
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committee in 1910, and that that committee was correct in disapproving of proposals made similar to those in bills 117 and 118, presented by Mr. Rowell and Mr. Ellis, and that the provisions of those bills should not be recommended to the house for adoption.

Raise Income Minimum.

Raise Income Minimum.

"The committee would recommend that section 39 of the act, providing for the special assessment of farm lands in town and villages, should be repealed, as perhaps having served its purpose, and also for the reason that it is found that its provisions have not been interpreted in accordance with the intention.

"Your committee would further re-commend that the exemption of in-come derived from personal earnings be increased at least from \$1200 to \$1500, and from \$900 to \$1200 in the case of a householder or the head of a family."

case of a householder or the head of a family."

By the latter two paragraphs of the resolution it will be seen that reformers have scored a slight win.

Need Proper Assessors.

Sir James spoke for about a half-hour against a revision of the Assessment Act, as proposed. "In my humble opinion, admitting everything that is contained in the two bills, you still have to prove the necessity for a change of the Assessment Act as it now stands. If municipalities get proper assessors no amendment to the act whatever is necessary. I would suggest that elaborate explanations of the act should be sent to every assessor in the province, and after a time if the act does not work out satisfactorily, it would be up to the government of Ontario to change it. There is one statute on the statute books with which no fault can be found, and that is the Assessment Act."

Asked Same Questions

Asked Some Questions.

The premier wanted to know where the single tax policy-had worked out satisfactorily. "What is there in this new system that we should have it?" he asked. "Why not wait to see how it works in other places? Is it not better to use our own wit than to folbetter to use our own wit than to fol-low every doctrine proposed by any Tom, Dick or Harry on the contin-ent?" He said that the single tax system was not poison, but the class of papers that took it up did not ex-press the sentiment of the people. Because new communities had accept-Because new communities had accepted it there was no reason why Ontario should gallop over the proposition and accept it holus-bolus. Sir James was very much amused at the predictions of certain newspapers, while he was away, that tax reform had, scored a great victory already, the whole matter of the new "progressive" legislation being settled.

If the Assessment Act was not working out satisfactorily to all classes it was not the fault of the act, but it was due to inefficient officials. All that was necessary was the ap-pointment of capable assessors by

Favor Local Option.

Additional information was heard by the committee during the morning session. Ernest Drury of the Dominion Grange said that the present system was a hardship to progressive farmers. He believed that the general public was opposed to the taxation of improvements. Fifty-five out of 165 township clerks in Ontario, in reply to a circular sent out by the Grange, said that land values were assessed higher than improvements. This fact showed a general evasion of the act and a large amount of local option existed. Mr. Drury urged the local option policy, it being his belief that the matter should be largely left to the discretion of local judges. The farming community would wel-come local option in matters relating to faxation. There was no reason why a farmer should be penalized for im-

Would Be Beneficial.

Arthur Roebuck of Halleybury said there was no doubt that the farmers of New Ontario were solid for local option. If northern townships had sentenced to 18 months in the Centra lo a! option land he'd by speculators Prison. General Baden-Powell makes it perfectly plain that far from encouraging "militarism," the boy scouts have been estalished to destroy racial animosity. "Every scout is a brother of every other scout, whatever may be the one of the fundamental axioms. Far from encouraging animosity either among classes or nations, the boy secuts, if the intention of their founder is observed, are taught the duty of practical comradeship, or universal comradeship and sympathy. It may be true that this movement, which so strongly appeals to boy instincts, is capable of misuse, but that possibility should not encourage opposition, but rather insistence that its primal purpose shall be observed.

General Baden-Powell says emphatically to those who see in the boy scout movement only a form of military cadet service, made attractive under another name and with a sporting uniform, that if they would look into the methods they would see that military training is particularly avoided. "In principle," he writes, "our aim is far higher than to make soldiers-It is to make citizens. We avoid military drill because it tends to make boys part of a machine, whereas our aim is to develop the individuality and responsibility of each lad. Military discipline is a fear of punishment, put on with the uniform and dropped the moment parade is over. The boy scouts' discipline is a sense of duty which he need only read the small selection from sir!"



PREVENTIBLE FIRES COST AMERICA \$500 A MINUTE

Secretary Wentworth of National Fire Prevention Association Delivers Forceful Address at C.M.A. Dinner--A Fire Prevention Association Soon to Be Formed in Toronto.

The total destruction from unnecessary fires in Canada and the United States amounts to \$500 a minute and the loss affets every citizen at the rate of over \$3 per head annually. This and many other interesting facts in connection with fire waste were citied by Franklin H. Wentworth of Boston, secretary of the National Fire Prevention Association of the United States, in the course of a very forceful address before a representative gathering of business men at McConkey's last night. The function was a dinner given by the Toronto board of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, at which were present: Mayor Hocken, representing the city; President Somets and others representing the board of trade; representatives of the Credit Men's Association, local Fire Underwriters' Association, and the different Ratepayers' Associations of the city. That the question of more efficient fire protection is a live one in Toronto was evidenced by the unusually large turn out and it was hinted by U. A. Shapley, who seconded a vote of thanks to the speaker, moved by R. S. Gourlay, that a meeting will soon be called of all interested in the matter to effect the organization of a fire prevention association in this city.

He told of the terrible waste from preventible fires on this continent, and by able arguments showed that the immense money loss incurred was borne by even the least important citizen in a way which he could not help but feel as burdensome. He gave statistics to prove that the annual fire loss per head in the six largest European countries is but 33 cents, while in the United States it is \$3, and in Canada \$3.27. The remarkable difference in the losses suffered in Europe and America he attributed almost entirely to the pronounced advancement of the people in the old lands along the line of fire prevention. 



WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—(Can. Press.)—J. Pierpont Morgan today told the money trust investigating committee of the house "that all the money in Christendom and all the money in Christendom and all the banks in Christendom" could not form a monoply that would control money.

Mr. Morgan disclaimed any knowledge that he wielded a vast power in modern finance and declared emphatically that he sought no such power.

Britain Must Increase Her Reserves of Gold

Sir Edward Holden Says Extremely Small National Reserve Would Place Empire in Grave Position Should Emergencies Arise-Gold Supplies Should Increase

With Credit.

The Bank of England has the power of increasing the national reserve of gold £14,000,000 by re-transferring to the banking department securities to that amount, now in the issue department, against which notes are issued, which would give a reserve of £49, 000,000 of gold, instead of an average of £35,000,000. While joint stock banks have been of immense service, the extension of that class of banking has brought the check largely into use, and it is the check which has prevented an increase in the amount of Bank of England notes, and a consequent increase in amount of gold in the national reserve. Therefore those banks should hold, as a part of their reserve, some at least of the gold they have prevented from being accumu-The Bank of England has the power

How to Add \$170,000,000.

A short act should be passed compelling bankers to state in balance sheets the amount of gold held in reserves. Then at least £20,000,000 of gold reserves. 
