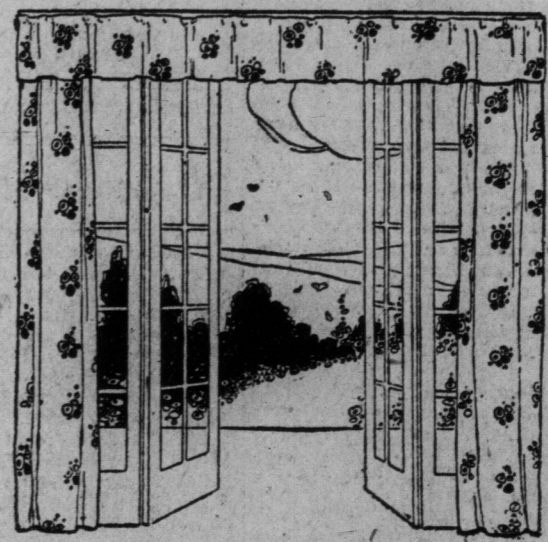

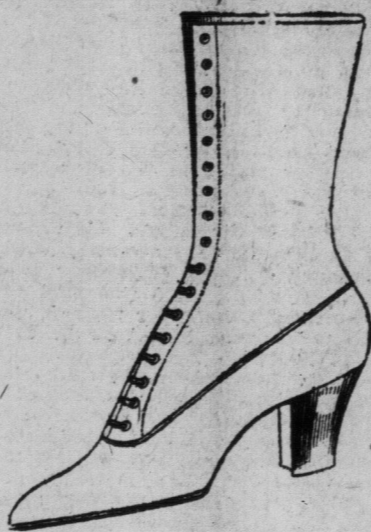

OLYMPIC ON WAY WITH MANY TROOPS

Over Two Thousand for Toronto, Including Hundred and Sixteenth Battalion.

London, March 18.—The White Star liner, Olympic, resumed work as a Canadian transport today, when she left Southampton carrying five thousand soldiers belonging to the 3rd Canadian division.

The composition of the contingent on the Olympic follows: Twenty-five officers, 615 other ranks of the 52nd Battalion, and some small details for Port Arthur; 89 officers, 2,069 others of the 16th Battalion, the 3rd Machine Gun Battalion, Engineers and details; 2 officers and 26 others, 2nd Mounted Rifles for Victoria; 2 officers and 35 others, 2nd Mounted, Revolver; 10 officers, 315 others, 2nd Mounted and Engineers, Vancouver; 10 officers, 235 others, 8th Field Ambulance, Calgary; 1 officer, 40 others, details for Regina; 3 officers, 50 others, 39th Battalion, Medicine Hat; 3 officers, 110 details, Winnipeg; 14 officers, 352 Engineers and details, and Divisional Ammunition Column, for Ottawa; 3 officers, 115 details, Kingston; 23 officers, 570 others, 36th Battalion, Halifax; 4 officers, 15 details, St. John's; 3 officers, 130 others, 45th Battalion, Kingston; 9 officers and 300 others, Engineers, London.

A BIG DECREASE IN CANADA'S TRADE

For Eleven Months of Present Fiscal Year It Declined by \$351,095,293.

Ottawa, March 18.—That the total of Canadian trade for the 1918-19 fiscal year, which ends on March 31, will be considerably lower than the previous year, is indicated by the trade summary for the first eleven months, issued by the customs department. This statement shows that for the eleven months of the present fiscal year ending February 28, there was a decrease in the total trade of Canada amounting to \$351,095,293, as compared with a similar period last year.

do that. They left everything to the Union administration. However, he issued the warning that "if there is to be a change that violates the historic principles of the Conservative party, then there will be a cautious and there will be a state funeral of some kind."

Mr. Currie said he did not have the statement with him, but during the reciprocity campaign, Mr. Wood was preaching the doctrine of annexation to the United States. He was an American and he thought he had all the Americans in the west with him, but he had been mistaken.

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Mahar's Denial.

Mr. Currie rejoined that the grain growers of Nova Scotia had been denied the price fixed. "You had better come in and be a good national policy man," said he.

Resources of Ontario. Turning to the province of Quebec, Col. Currie referred to the iron deposits which needed attention. The province of Ontario, he said, had the cheapest power in the world. She also had tremendous resources in silver and iron, and the latter industry required assistance to aid in its expansion.

Alberta had twelve and a half per cent. of the coal of the world, and Germany, with four and a half per cent. of the world's supply, had built an empire on it. Agriculture was only one of the eggs in the basket of the west.

Toucing upon the profits made by the farmers of the west, Col. Currie said the grain growers' elevators had paid 44 1/2 per cent. dividend last year, and no manufacturers could do this.

PROPORTION OF FOOD TO GERMANY IS FIXED

French Government Is Prepared to Furnish Material for Palm Oil. Paris, March 18.—The British government has indicated that immediately upon the transfer of German merchant shipping to the allies it will be able to deliver the following quantities of foodstuffs to Germany, the figures being in tons: Bacon, 30,000; condensed milk, 10,000; vegetable oils, 20,000; margarine, 2,000; drippings, 2,000; rice, 35,000; and barley or rye flour, 10,000. This makes a total of 174,000 tons. The French government is ready to furnish raw materials which will produce 15,000 tons of palm oil for Europe 40,000 tons of cereals and flour. Of these, 10,000 tons of foodstuffs will be shipped for the relief of European food agencies. The relief of European food agencies, in this amount is pledged for the food of three million people and cannot be diverted. Payments for the food will be made by the Germans in gold or equivalent securities.

GOOD BUYING OF MINING STOCKS

Floor trading was again on a considerable scale, and the market, as a whole, showing strength and confidence. The tone of the market was manifestly firm. While exceeded in extent of turnover by the market for silver, it is probable that the course of Davidson was followed by market followers in general with more interest than that of any other number of shareholders who have been looking over the property during the past few days, were in the market yesterday, with buying of several kinds of evidence that they found conditions at the mine to their liking. At 7 1/2, the stock yesterday equalled the high point of last November, and in the afternoon, Davidson's price advanced to 10 1/2. The opinion is expressed that Davidson has the earmarks of developing into an important producer, and yesterday's transaction, and yesterday's price, evidenced a wide demand for the shares. Wasapika advanced a point to 52, closing at this level, which is equal to the record price attained in the sweeping upward movement late last fall. Good buying from New York is from day to day. Keora was traded to the extent of more than 18,000 shares closing at 20, a net gain of 4 cents. Large buying orders from the north around 20 were reported. Dome Lake was given strong support, selling up to 27 1/2, and closing at 27, a gain of half cent. For the day, Odd lots of Davidson changed hands at 10 1/2, the highest price for some time, and close to the record quotation for the stock. Davidson, at 10 1/2, Baldwin at 34 1/2, Hollinger at 8.20, and Kirkland Lake at 8.50, held their ground, but Davidson at 17 1/2, Porcupine Crown at 28, and West Dome at 24, were each off 1/4, the fairly large transactions recouping mostly floor trading. Porcupine indicating that the proposed plan of reorganization, involving the pooling of a stock for 18 months, is given a fair representation. Adams, in which transactions reached 41,000 shares, was the most active stock on the board. 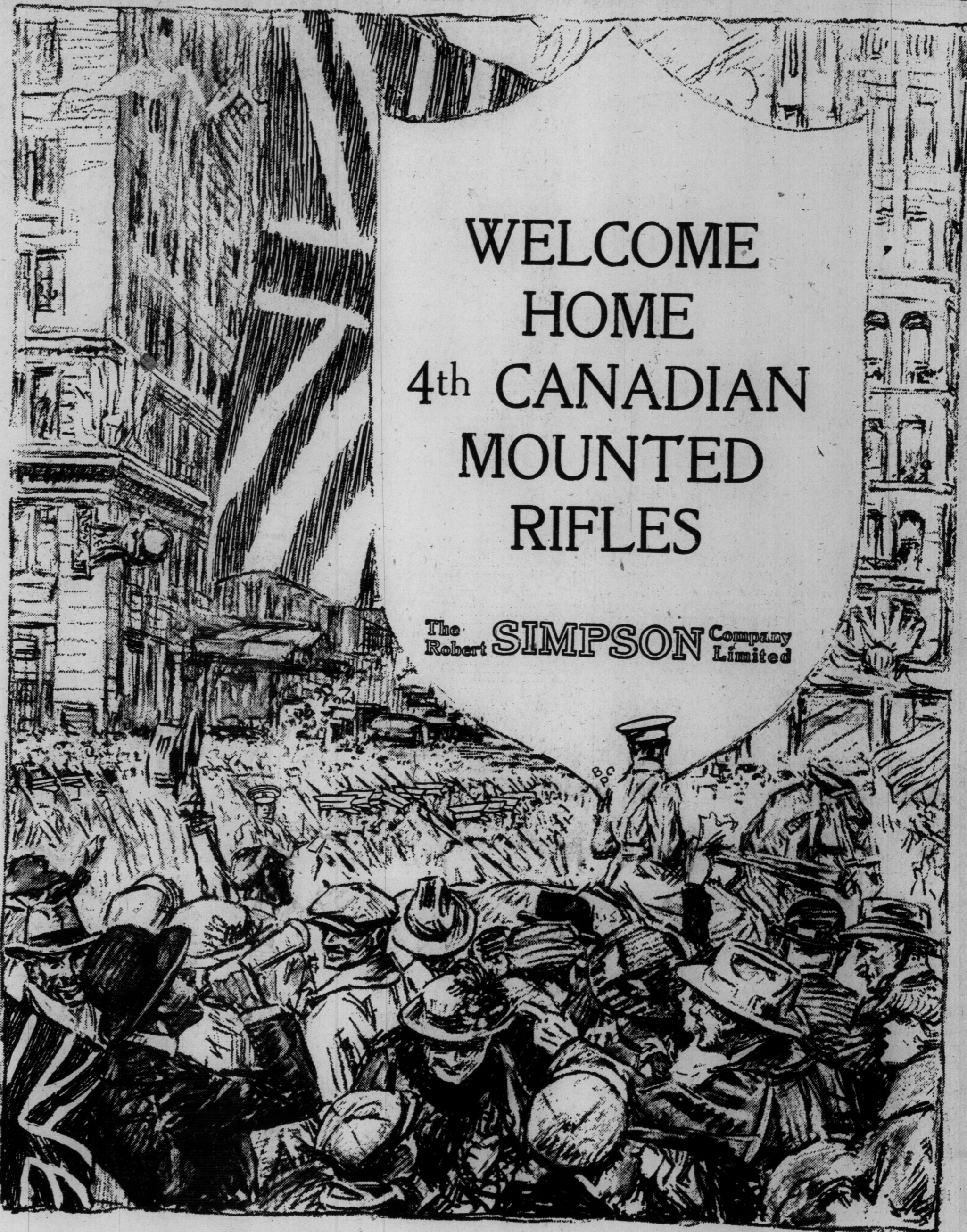
