Politicians Considering Effect of Announcement of No Increase of Federal Subsidy.

Montreal, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—People of all political parties were rubbing their eyes to-day over the aimost stupifying effect of Hon. L. P. Brodeur's speech at St. Hilaire, the occasion having been evidently chosen by Sir Wilfrid Laurier to inform the people of this province thru his minister of marine that the increased subsidy policy of Hon. Mr. Gouin had few friends at Ottawa. Those who attended the meeting are of the opinion that Mr. Girard, M.L.A. for the County of Rouville, knew pretty well what was going to happen when he gave his federal colleague so nice an opportunity to hand out Sir Wilfrid Laurier's disappointing message to the Province of Quebec.

There can be little doubt now that the several interviews which took place recently at Quebec between the prime minister of the province and

place recently at Quebec between the prime minister of the province and the leader of the federal cabinet were fraught with the most serious consequences to the Liberal party; that Hon. Lomer Gouin as good as gave notice that the moment of the parting of the ways had arrived, and that the utterances of Hon. L. P. Brodeur at St. Hilaire constitute the Ottawa government's emphatiq answer.

One thing is sure—that little accident which befell the finance minister down in Queen's and Shelburne the other day constitutes one more good excuse that nothing can be done towards getting a conference together before the November session, and consequently no legislation can be matured in the matter during the coming meeting of parliament.

Here is what the minister of finarine and fisheries said in reply to some observations by the local member for Rouville. Speaking to those of his friends of the Liberal party who are agitating for better terms, the minister asked them to beware of what might follow. Many of the fathers of confederation, its chief author even, would have preferred a legislative union to provincial autonomy. This opinion the speaker declared is by no means dead in this country, and let us fear lest the demands of the provinces do not awaken it. Let us fear that an amendment to the constitution to readjust the federal subsidy might constitute a precedent or justification in this country of Efiglish law in fato readjust the federal subsidy might constitute a precedent or justification in this country of English law in favor of those who would like hothing better than to ask for this other amendment to the constitution, viz., the transformation of the federal system into one of legislative union. All short-sightedness must be avoided for the assaults which will be directed against provincial autonomy during the next 25 or 40 years are greatly to be feared. Let us, therefore, dread, concluded Hon. Mr. Brodeur. all that may have a tendency to weaken this right so dearly acquired.
