Buffalo, May 19.—Justice Woodward, Assistant District Attorney Penny and the attaches of the Criminal Term room of the Supreme Court were treated to a surprise this morning when a prisoner was arraigned for the crime of grand larceny. The prisoner had given the name of William J. Stewart. He said he was willing to change his plea of not guilty to the crime of grand larceny in the first degree and to pleas guilty to grand larceny in the second. Stewart was discovered by the police in the act of stealing an overcoat and some other clothing from a boarding house.

"What degree of education have you received?" asked Mr. Penny, while the fellow's record was being taken. "I was educated at Toronto University. I am a bachelor of arts."

Stewart looked ashy faced, half starved and his clothing was ragged. Attorney Frederic Pomeroy made an earnest plea for leniency. He said Stewart was the son of respected and wealthy parents in Toronto. The boy had married when quite young, and his domestic life was not happy. He had drifted from bad to worse, and finally came here to reform. He did not succeed and one night fell into the hands of the police for robbing a boarding house of clothing.
