BABY FARMING IN TORONTO

THE DEATH OF TWO BABIES WITHIN THREE WEEKS—HOW DOMESTIC CAN GET RID OF ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN—SOME UNWILLING TESTIMONY AS TO PURCHASE OF DRUGS—A DOCTOR FOUND OUT TO APPEAR TO-NIGHT.

Sudden Deaths of Two Babies Within Three Weeks—How Domestic Can Get Rid of Illegitimate Children—Some Unwilling Testimony as to Purchase of Drugs—A Doctor Found Out to Appear to-Night.

Coroner Pickering last night commenced the inquiry into the death of a mother and child, Pearl Rodde, who died at the residence of Mrs. Annie Costello, 250 River-street.

Dr. Costello testified that she had lived at 250 River-street for a short time also at 384 Sumach-street, 434 Parliament-street, 82 Walton-street and at 93 Hayter-street. While living at the latter place, in November, 1895, she had taken out a license for a baby farm. This license expired Dec. 31.

At the conclusion of Mrs. Costello's evidence, her lawyer, Mr. Arnold, wished to ask her some questions, but the coroner refused the privilege.

Coroner Powell said he was notified by Dr. Shattworth that a child had died at a baby farm and that Dr. Taylor, who has just written on his council examination into the case of the child, he (Powell) then issued the burial certificate.
