British Cavalry Regiments to Have Telegraphers

SO THAT NEWS MAY BE SENT

Modern Warfare Has Developed the Necessity for This Move.

Cavalry Engaged in Scouting Will Be Able to Keep Headquarters ments and Perhaps Tangle Up the Enemy's Plans-Knowledge of Telegraphy Indispensable to the Cavalryman of the Future.

London, Feb. 3 .- The English War Dpartment has inaugurated a measure of considfuture every cavalry regiment shall comprise a certain number of trained teleto be accorded to troopers and non-comdissioned officers who have mastered the science of telegraphy, the result will be that in course of time nearly every cavdern warfare cavelry is used almost exclusively for reconnaissance, and the idea is that each trooper shall be sufficiently expert, not only to be enabled to tap the wires, with a view of obtaining valuable Information regarding the enemy, but shall be able to send important news which may be secured. It is known that both Germany and Russ'a keep large bodies of cavalry on either side of their long frontier, with the main purpose of cutting and tapping the enemy's telegraph wire just across the boundary line, for the purpose of interfering with the mobilization, immediately on the outbreak of war. It was seen therefore, that a knowledge of telegraphy is indispensable to the cavalryman of the future, and in view of this fact the new rule inaugurated by the War Department here excites universal approval.

After Blanket Mortgages. John Barr, M.L.A. for Dufferin, Mr. John Barr, M.L.A. for Dufferin, will on Wednesday next introduce an Act to amend the Registry Act, which is aimed specially at the bianket mortgage, of which the farmers are loud in their complaints. The Legislative Assembly has no jurisdiction to legislate with reference to the contents of mortgages and has not the right to say that a mortgage shall be drawn an such a way or shall or shall no contain such and such provisions, as this is the function of the Dominion House.

But the Legislative Assembly has complete furisdiction over the registry laws, and

therein, the payment of any indebtedness or Hability either past, present or future of the mortgagor or any other person other than or in addition to the principal money or stated Hability or indebtedness thereby secured; provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to any covenant, proviso or condition for the payment of taxes upon the nortgaged premises or the premiums of insurance on the buildings thereon.





The gigantic avalanche shot down the mountain side in the canyon of the Grand River, on the western slope of Colorado, and carried the entire train crew and working gang, 33 men in all, into the bottom of the abyss. The engine, caboose and cars were carried down before the slide, and all the shovelers, who were scattered along the track at work, were swept before the mighty weight. Trees, rocks and large blocks of ice, which had been formed on the side of the mountain during the whiter, added to the weight of the avalanche. Cliffs rise at the side of the radway track 100 or 200 feet, while the side of the mountain at the point where the accident occurred rises 2000 feet almost perpendicularly. Special trains were sent to the spot as soon as the intelligence reached the headquarters of the Denver and Rio Grande read. "Owing to the fact that the Company has been in existence but a few months, my remarks in moving the adoption of the report, which is now before you, must necessarily be brief. The statement given covers a period of four months, but the active operations of the Company may be confined to the last three of the four, the first month having been mainly occupied in organization and attention to the details required in preparing a company of this k nd for its active work. I venture to say that these figures will compare favorably with the expenses of any corporation of equal size in any class of business.

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




