All England Excited by the Agitation in the Church.
HARCOURT MAY LEAD.
And the Question Threatens to Become a Live Issue in Parliament.
Her Majesty is Much Worried and is Said to Have Instructed Lord Salisbury to Take No Action Without the Consent of the Bishops-The Spiritual Peers Agree to Ask That Ecclesiastical Courts Be Revived for Trying Such Troubles as the Present Kenist Fight.
London, Feb. 3.-The anti-Ritualistic excitement is spreading to an alarming extent throughout Great Britain. The question threatens to become a prominent issue in Parliament. Already a large Protestant party is being formed of members of the House of Commons. Among them are many Liberals who have no harbors been identified with ecclesiastical questions.
Sir William Vernon-Harcourt will, in all probability, become the leader of this new party. He has been asked to abandon his projected visit to the Continent and to remain in London to lead the anti-Ritualists, whose rise may mark a new and potent position against the Government.
That the agitation against the "mass and emotional" services, started by Kenist, has carried on by now Protestant leaders, has now come to a pass demanding settlement is recognized by the most conservative churchmen.
The Times, Spectator and other prominent dailies, carry in big black letters the headline, "Crisis in the Church of England." Last week the Bishops met at Lambeth Palace and grappled with the problem. The Bishops, however, have not yet issued a manifesto.
The conference resulted in an agreement to present a bill to Parliament for a revival of the Church courts, which would mean that disputes must be brought first before the Diocesan Court, consisting of the Bishop assisted by a theological and a legal adviser. An appeal therefrom would be possible to the Provincial Court, consisting of the Archbishop and six assistants, and, as a last resort, to five lay judges appointed by the Crown.
Meanwhile Queen Victoria is deeply concerned over the Ritualistic dispute, and she has instructed Lord Salisbury to take the most prudent course. She has also instructed the Government and the Bishops before any legislation is attempted.
It is believed that Sir William Vernon-Harcourt will lead the crusade, the High Church practices will be abolished in three-fourths of the churches of England.
SHAREHOLDERS ASSIGN.
B. O. E. Could Not Make Money Out of the Shaftesbury Hall Building
Owing to Competition.
Two hundred members of the Sons of England were singing doleful tunes last evening and blessing alternately Massey Hall and Street Commissioner Jones. The reason for all this bother was the assignment yesterday to Assignee A. J. Pattison of Shaftesbury Hall, the property which is being the root of Major Robinson's "Blow." The liabilities are in the neighborhood of \$50,000. Against this, the assignee, O. E. Hall, has the Don, valued at some \$100,000, and the value of the Queen and James Hall, and various pictures, one heap of rubbish, all contributing to the good name of the hall.
Considerable indignation was expressed that though it was hitting other halls so hard, the Massey Hall trustees were declining execution on Monday. That Massey Hall was built, Shaftesbury Hall was the largest and most popular music and lecture chamber in the city.

Strikers at Panama Decline to accept an Advance in Silver for Their Wages.
A BRITISH WAR SHIP ASKED FOR

Lives of Inoffensive Foreigners at Colon Are in Danger-Serious Crisis Not Unlikely.
Colon, Feb. 3.-At Panama the steamship strikers who were engaged by the month, had petitioned the Governor to enforce the payment of their wages up to the date of the beginning of the strike, these having been held on the plea of breach of contract.
A conference was held at the Governor's residence yesterday, attended by agents of the steamship company and the Panama Railroad, and it was agreed to increase the wages 25 cents in silver per day, as well as to make the payment of arrears asked for in the petition. Nevertheless the strike continues, the strikers demanding a dollar in gold.

British Warship Wanted.
Kingston, Jamaica, Feb. 3.-The British Consul at Colon, Colombia, it is reported here to-night, has cabled the Governor-in-Chief and Captain-General of Jamaica, Sir Augustus Henning, requesting that a British man-of-war be detached to Colon to protect British subjects and property there. This appeal tends to confirm previous reports that the lives of inoffensive foreign residents are endangered through the actions of the strikers, and through threatened retaliatory efforts of the dockmen and railway employees which yesterday threatened to precipitate a sanguinary crisis.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY

Communications Between Points on the British Coast Carried on by Wireless Telegraphy.
London, Feb. 3.-Marconi's system of wireless telegraphy is proving very successful on the British coast. Operators have been at work every day this week. They are stationed on the South Foreland Lightship and the Goodwin Lightship. The operators report that questions and answers are exchanged almost as quickly as in ordinary conversation.
One of the most important points established is that the current is not affected by stormy weather, so that great advantages will result in cases of shipwreck.

THE PEOPLE GOT EXCITED

Because Fire Threatened to Destroy Lord Macaulay's Birthplace.
London, Feb. 3.-There were exciting scenes to-day at a fire which occurred at 467 Long-street, recently named a Murray, as it was formerly the birthplace of Lord Macaulay, the historian, at 467 Long-street, Leicestershire. The village of Long-street, which is situated on the banks of the Trent, is one of the most beautiful in the county. The house, which was built by Lord Macaulay's father, was a fine specimen of the architecture of the time. It was destroyed by fire on the night of the 2nd inst. The fire broke out at about 10 o'clock, and spread rapidly. The house was almost entirely destroyed. The fire was caused by a gas lamp which had been left burning in a room which was not used for some time. The fire was extinguished by the fire brigade, but the damage was extensive. The house was insured for £10,000. The insurance company is expected to pay the amount of the loss.

The Junta says that it will fight against the Americans and will not be intimidated by their superior numbers and arms. The statement is a clear challenge to the American government and its policy in the Philippines.



YANKEES HAVE SECURED IT.

English Syndicate Beaten Out in the Race for Control of Cuban Railways.
CANADIAN CAPITALISTS IN IT.
All of Which Probably Means That Mr. William McKenna Will Get His Crumb.
Havana, Feb. 3.-The control of the existing railway system of Cuba has been secured to the New York syndicate, which includes Canadian capitalists. Following the purchase of the Sagua Railroad, the line from Calbarren, in Santa Clara Province, has been bought. Its capital stock is \$2,300,000, and there is no bonded indebtedness. A meeting of stockholders has been called for Feb. 18, when the formal transfer to the new owners will be made. The same syndicate has also secured the Matanzas and Sabana Railways, which runs through the sugar producing districts of Matanzas Province. The capital stock is \$5,000,000. A meeting of stockholders will be held March 6. The Cienfuegos and Villa Clara is also in process of absorption. The syndicate is valued at \$8,000,000. The English capitalists who control what is known as the United Railways of Havana were defeated in the race for control. It was reported that J. Henry Schroder and James Underwood of London. The United Railways capitalists sought a concession with a view to selling interests, but a conference was refused. The owners of the systems lately purchased expect to secure the United Railways, or else build their own line into Havana. The same syndicate has purchased for \$1,500,000 the Havana line of existing vessels, which has had a monopoly of the north coast trade.

THE JOHN EATON FIRE CASES

Judgments Entered in New York Against Insurance Companies for Over \$27,000.
New York, Feb. 3.-Judgments amounting to over \$27,000 were entered to-day in favor of Homer E. Dudley of Buffalo against several fire insurance companies of this city. The judgments were transferred from the records in Buffalo, where they were taken by default. The judgments were assigned to Homer E. Dudley by the John Eaton Company, Limited, of Toronto, and contested by the companies on the ground of fraud. The attorneys said that recording of the judgments here was a mere formality and that the cases would be reopened to be tried on their merits.

Mr. Hague is present at Leiswood, N.J., and it is said that he will assist in capacity of an advisor.

BRITISH CAVALRY REGIMENTS TO HAVE TELEGRAPHERS

SO THAT NEWS MAY BE SENT
Modern Warfare Has Developed the Necessity for This Move.
Cavalry Engaged in Scouting Will Be Able to Keep Headquarters Posted as to the Enemy's Movements and Perhaps Tangle up the Enemy's Plans-Knowledge of Telegraphy Indispensable to the Cavalryman of the Future.
London, Feb. 3.-The English War Department has inaugurated a measure of considerable importance. It provides that in future every cavalry regiment shall comprise a certain number of trained telegraphers, and, inasmuch as increased pay and brighter prospects of promotion are to be accorded to troopers and non-commissioned officers who have mastered the science of telegraphy, the result will be that in course of time nearly every cavalryman will know how to telegraph. In modern warfare cavalry is used almost exclusively for reconnaissance, and the idea is that each trooper shall be sufficiently expert, not only to be enabled to tap the enemy's telegraphs, but also to be able to send important news which will be secured. It is known that both Germany and Russia keep large bodies of cavalry on either side of their long frontier, with the main purpose of cutting and tapping the enemy's telegraphs. It is well known therefore, that a knowledge of telegraphy is indispensable to the cavalryman of the future, and in view of this the new rule inaugurated by the War Department here excites universal approval.

BABY WEIGHS A POUND.

Birth of an Infant That is the Size of an Incandescent Globe.
Mishawaka, Ind., Feb. 3.-There was born to the wife of Noble Adams in this city the smallest infant ever reported in North America. The child is about the size of an incandescent globe. It weighs one pound. The physician, an old practitioner, says it will live.

The Bank of Toronto has leased the ground floor of the Auditorium, at the corner of Queen and James-streets, from Mr. Alex. Manning, and will open a branch there at an early date, and the Standard Bank is now negotiating with Mr. Philip Jamieson for a portion of his handsome store at the corner of Yonge and Queen-streets. All these banking establishments are on the business track, as laid out by The World.

RADIAL RAILWAY SCHEME.

An Appeal Will Be Made to the Legislature for the Control of Electric Railway Franchises.

YORK COUNTY COUNCIL YESTERDAY.

The Matter of Paying \$100 to Sutton Left Over Till June—Must Show Fees and Mileage.

Electric railway matters occupied the attention of the York County Council yesterday; and beyond speaking to a resolution proposed by Messrs. Ley and High-

which did not carry—to rescind the motion instructing the Legislative Committee to petition the Local Legislature for the control of electric railway franchises in the county, no action was taken.

Mr. Evans, whose amendments seem to leave a strong impression upon the Council, said that it was not of much importance to the County Council whether they owned the street railway franchises or not. The possibility of some similar legislation prohibiting a railway from passing through it, thus depriving a municipality of its franchises and privileges, which they desired, made it imperative that some body other than minor municipalities should have charge of these matters.

Disavored Joint Control. The Warden suggested that joint committees of the County Council and the various municipalities should deal with franchises; but the majority of the Council rather disavored this idea. Messrs. Ley and High favored the townships and villages regulating the franchises or suit themselves, independent of the County Council, the county being considered where the right to cross county bridges was required.

FEED YOUR BOYS THIS WAY

Prof. Robertson Delivers an Up-to-Date Lecture to the Women of Toronto.

RIGHT SORT OF FOOD FOR PEOPLE

To Give Them Brains and Sound Structures—The Good and the Bad Estates.

Fully 300 women met in the theatre of the Normal School yesterday afternoon to hear Prof. Robertson of Ottawa lecture on "Food."

Miss Carter, president of the Local Council of Women, introduced him to the audience, and the lecturer took his seat on the wall, and went right to work.

The Struggle for Food. Half the struggle of life was the struggle for food, and it was worse to become more so as time went on, said the professor.

He had found among mothers a lamentable ignorance of what to feed a boy between the years of 3 and 10. There were many women who knew how to feed calves, but were ignorant of the feeding of boys.

He had made experiments in feeding calves and knew that a boy should be fed in a similar way.

What Food is. Food was substance conveying energy, taken to sustain life, furnish energy, repair and provide for the growth of the body. A boy's definition of whole some food was "food that tastes nasty."

Water was the vehicle of the body for carrying foods around. Albuminoids, fats, carbohydrates and minerals composed the body, and foods containing these should be used. Food must contain a sufficient proportion of albuminoids, which in a boy weighing 148 pounds made up 90 pounds.

He dwelt upon the question of the soil, and declared the success of all crops depended upon the work of minute microbes; and the better the process of tilting, the better the man in the end. The cure of the material body was the first foundation of a good boy.

The Kinds of Food. Few housewives asked if they prepared a meal, how much would be required to do a given work? A man working all day in an office needed as good food as a wood chopper, and the latter needed the best of food in the most easily digested form.

He dwelt upon the question of the soil, and declared the success of all crops depended upon the work of minute microbes; and the better the process of tilting, the better the man in the end. The cure of the material body was the first foundation of a good boy.

Beef and Potatoes. Beef and potatoes made a well balanced food. The potatoes should be well cooked—a low temperature for a long time—leave more nutriment than the best.

Milk was as digestible. It was well balanced, and contained all the elements of life. The bones, and gave something that no other food seemed to give.

In the bank list, Dominion was strong, 100 shares selling for 27 1/2, Ontario was easier, declining to 125, Canadian General Electric were erratic, selling up two points to 150 in the morning, and receding to 147 1/2 in the afternoon. C.P.R. floated up on the late board, being picked up freely around 80 1/2. Cable and Richelieu brought fractionally improved prices before the close. War Eagle declined 3 points, and Cariboo advanced over 2.

Cable from London to Messrs. A. E. Ames & Co., to-day gives the following quotations: Grand Trunk bonds, 81 1/2; Grand Trunk firsts, 70 1/2, closing at 71, and Grand Trunk seconds, 67, closing at 67 1/2.

Dun's Weekly Trade Review. Montreal trade advices continue of favorable tenor. A heavy fall of snow in some parts of this province, New Brunswick, as well as Eastern Ontario, is no doubt detrimental to trade and the circulation of money, but business as a whole is of a satisfactory character, and a marked degree of confidence and cheerfulness is notable in trade and financial circles. The 4th is quite a heavy day for payments in dry lines, and there is a general anticipation that the day will pass off well, based upon the comparatively few applications for cheques that have been received up to the moment of writing. Orders in the above named lines are coming in very well, and the renewed failures as compared with similar seasons of recent years, are of a very satisfactory character. The advance noted in Campbellford flannels last week is confirmed, and the same class of goods have fallen into line. Cable advice has been received this week of a material advance in values held in report, some moderate improvement in the demand, perhaps induced by the discussion of a possible duty on value held in report. Sugar refiners have reduced prices of cream and bright coffee sugars ten cents a cental, but low grade sugars are unchanged. The notable feature in the heavy metal trade is the remarkable advance in metal in and copper, which continues jumping up so continually that local dealers hardly know what to quote. The leather market shows a very strong feeling in sole, for which good demand is reported, both local and Eastern. No advance has yet been established, as was thought probable, but belief is professed that such has not to come short. The leather trade is in a satisfactory condition, and the leather association discussed the desirability of compulsory inspection at their meeting last week, but it was decided to take no action in the matter. Borrowers of call money reported a decline in rates to 4 1/2 per cent, and profess to look for a 4 per cent. rate next week. The movement for January has been very satisfactory, and the confidence that has existed for some time continues. The leading stocks, with an upward tendency. Cottons, woollens and metals are in a satisfactory trade. More paper falls due on that date than on any other month in the year, but as far as merchants can foresee the payments will be good. The force for spring goods has been numerous and very satisfactory. The report of the winter has also been received. There has been a fair trade in wool, and the wool firm. Canned vegetables very firm. Hardware and metals in good demand. The leather trade is in a satisfactory shape, and hides are firm. A little rally in wheat is noted early in the week, but has since petered out. Coarse grains steady. Dressed hogs are a trifle firmer, and the good demand. Cattle in good demand, with prices of exporters higher than for many months. Sales of choice stock as high as \$6 per pound. Money is easy with rates unchanged.

Liverpool Lower-Heavy Argentine Shipments a Bearer Factor - Clearances Good - Corn Markets on Both Sides of the Water Depreciated-Local Grain, Produce and Live Stock Markets - Notes and Gossip.

Friday Evening, Feb. 3. Liverpool wheat was heavy to-day. Spot declined 1d to 1 1/2d per cent, and futures 1/2d for the day.
