THE ORANGE FREE STATE

Said to Have Planted a Battery of Artillery Close to the Natal Border.

MORE STEAMERS REQUISITIONED

Wild Rumors of Wires Cut—Johannesburg is Quiet—Complaints That Britain is Slow.

The Bavarian Corvill.

FREE STATE ARTILLERY.

Has Been Placed at Volksrust, Close to the Natal Border, and a Hospital Marquee.

London, Oct. 2.—A despatch from Cape Town says a hospital received there today from Charlestown, Natal, announces that 80 members of the Orange Free State artillery with six guns have arrived at Volksrust, a point in the Transvaal, close to the Natal border, and that a marquee had been erected by the hospital authorities.

The officials at Charlestown have received a telegram from the Colonial Secretary in answer to an inquiry, instructing them to remain absolutely quiet, and to offer no assistance. No women have been left in Volksrust and the natives are leaving Charlestown. The officials still remain but are ready to leave at a moment's notice.

General Joubert, the Vice-President of the South African Republic, and Commander-in-Chief of the Transvaal forces, has arrived at Volksrust, and his presence there will probably have a calming effect.

Johannesburg is Quiet.

The advices from Johannesburg say no commencing took place there Saturday. They add that many of the Boers are anxious to leave and that many of the young men are forming corps of civilian police and are acting in conjunction with the Merchants' Association. The town is quiet. The merchants continue to announce that British subjects under a permit will be allowed to remain and that consular letters and passports will be accepted if the persons presenting them are of good character.

BUSY AT WAR OFFICE.

But No Exceptional Activity in the Other Government Offices.

In London, Oct. 2.—No confirmation is obtainable from any source of the report contained in a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company that the Boers have captured Dundee.



BACK FROM THE ZINC MINES

Mr. Tom Kiteley Has Located Good Properties in the Region North of Rossport.

SAYS ZENITH IS A SPLENDID MINE.

Negotiations Are at Present Under Way for the Sale of That Good Property.

Tom Kiteley, brother of Hiram Kiteley, of the firm of Currie & Kiteley, returned to Toronto yesterday from an exploration trip to the zinc region north of Rossport, on the north shore of Lake Superior. He was with a party for the past three months prospecting for zinc, and in conversation with The World yesterday he said he had located some good properties around the Zenith zinc mine. Asked regarding the Zenith, he said it enjoys the reputation of being the only grass root mine in Ontario. It was purchased about a year ago by a syndicate, including Mr. Beamer of Ottawa. The other gentlemen were Belgians. They put a small gang of miners to work on the property during January, February and March. The ore was sacked and hauled out with sleds, and the results were very promising. It was shipped to Belgium for treatment. It netted \$22 a ton, and the results of the three months' work showed a gross return of \$73,000.

Negotiations are at present under way for the sale of the property for \$200,000, but Mr. Kiteley could not say whether the deal would go through. There is already over a quarter of a million dollars of ore in sight from the work of last winter. A number of expert zinc miners from the In. Mo. have been sent to the property in general will, in a few years, be a great zinc-mining country that Joplin, as the ore of Ontario occur in the form of veins or lodes, while in Missouri they are in blanket form, and are soon exhausted. The Zenith has an ore body varying from six to eight feet in thickness, and is wide all pure zinc blende, and nets about \$22 a ton, after paying all charges.

Has Some Good Properties. Mr. Kiteley thinks he has secured some of the best properties in the district, and several of them are showing rich results from the surface. He was out there with James Stevenson, an old western miner, with thorough knowledge of zinc mines, and Ed. Parker of Toronto.

A Real Gold Brick. The Berth mine is located about 30 miles from Sharbot, Ontario, on the K.N.P. Railway. It is owned and controlled by a Detroit syndicate, and has a large development for one year. The world was yesterday shown a brick valued at \$1700, which was taken out in the morning run. This will be rather surprising to a majority of Canadians, who are not aware that there is a mine so close to our own doors. None of this stock has been sold in Canada, as it has been a close corporation. This showing would seem to prove that properties practically at our own doors are as valuable as those thousands of miles away, and are far easier to work. There is a 15-stamp mill on this property, and it will be running night and day in the near future. There is plenty of water and fuel for developing. They expect to take out a brick of this same value about every week. The brick will be on view in S. J. Sharp's office for a short time.

Hillside Claim. Extinct from The Spokesman-Review, Sept. 23. Work on the Hillside claim is progressing rapidly. The ledge is proving to be fully as large as was expected. It has been stripped until it is now assumed that it is from 40 to 60 feet in width. The walls have been defined, and are said to be solid. Manager H. L. Percy believes that when fully opened it will be the largest body of ore in the camp, and James H. Harvey, late manager of the Republic mine, expressed a similar view of the matter. Some of the ore carries fair values, and all of it carries some. The values are as great as has been the rule in this camp on the surface. The recent work has been devoted to determining the width of the ledge in the shaft, and the work presented with all possible speed. The position of the claim is such that it can be worked cheaply, and the ore can be handled as cheap as or cheaper than any other in the camp. It will take but a few dollars to make a good road to it from the town of Republic.
