Special arrangements had been made with one of the state court judges and the bill was at once rushed to the city council and filed. The council then agreed that the company should be allowed to continue the operation of its lines until the bill is passed on by the state supreme court. Such is the present position of this remarkable conflict between public right and private interest, and further developments will be watched with keen attention by the supporters of municipal ownership everywhere throughout the continent. Chicago having once set its hand to the plow is not in the habit of turning back, and the final victory of public ownership in that city is a foregone conclusion.
