



The Montreal Gazette says: "Des-patches from Halitax state that the naged C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple Newport News, U.S.A., where she will be permanently repaired. In view of the fact that Halifax was supposed to have one of the best graving docks on the con tinent, this has caused considerable sur-prise among Montreal shipping people. The fault is not with the C. P. R. au-The fault is not with the C. P. R. authorities, for while the vessel was in Halifax harbor they advertised for tenders, and not a single offer was forthcoming from either a Halifax firm or any Canadian one. Sending the vessel to a United States port for repairs was, therefore, inevitable.

"It is claimed at Halifax that the reason there were no tenders was that there was no efficient equipment at Halifax, and not enough men there to do the work. It is estimated that the repairs to the vessel will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000, and will give work to about 200 men for two or three months. The loss to Canadian industry is, therefore, apparent."







The police authorities had sent instructions from the Nova Scotia city to hold the pair. The girl was given over into the hands of the State Board of Charity and Balfe was later in the day taken to Long wharf, where he will be held pending the sailing of the Halifax again today, when he will be deported, simply on the ground of his being an "undesirable alien."


