THE PRICE OF FLOUR

Editor Times:

Sir,—Could you tell me the cause of this sharp advance in the price of flour, now when the outlook is so promising for an abundant harvest in our own northwest. Don't you think there should be a government regulation of things of this kind. It should not be left to a combine to advance the poor mar's actual necessity at will, for no other reason than their own personal gain.

The bakers of the city are adverse to advancing the price of bread until necessity compels them. In this age of high prices the bakers feel that it is hard, considering the price of butter, lard, eggs and fruit used in cake and pastry, that twenty cents a barrel should be added to their other expenses for no reason whatever. If merchants sold those grades of flour at a fair profit for the past year, why this advance now when the new wheat is about to be placed on the market?
