SUDDEN DEATH OF ARCHBISHOP O'BRIEN

Had Been Troubled With Indigestion, but No Serious Consequences Were Apprehended--He Expired While Niece Was Getting Him a Glass of Water--His Career--Bishop Casey Much Shocked at the News.

Halifax, N. S., March 9.—(Special).—Most Rev. Cornelius O'Brien, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Halifax, died suddenly at 11 o'clock tonight. For four or five years his grace had been in somewhat poor health, suffering from an affection of the kidneys, but it was apoplexy that proved the immediate cause of death.

This morning the archbishop rose feeling about as usual, but in the afternoon he complained of indigestion, from an acute form of which he was a sufferer. He went to bed and sent for his physician who came and prescribed.

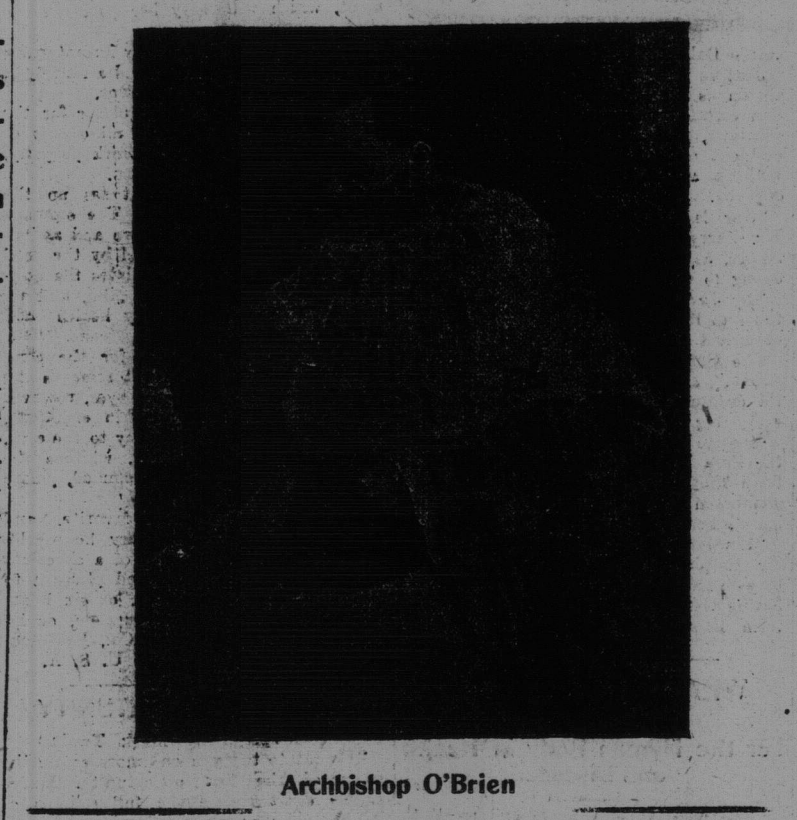
The doctor was called for again at 10 o'clock tonight but saw no reason for thinking it more than indigestion. At 11 o'clock his grace asked his niece, who was in the room, to get a glass of water. She went after and returning in a minute found the prelate dead on his bed.

Archbishop O'Brien was more than an eminent prelate, he was a public spirited citizen, taking a deep interest in all that concerned the progress, stability and welfare of the whole country and the whole empire, and he was also a man of eminent gifts as a writer and as a public speaker.

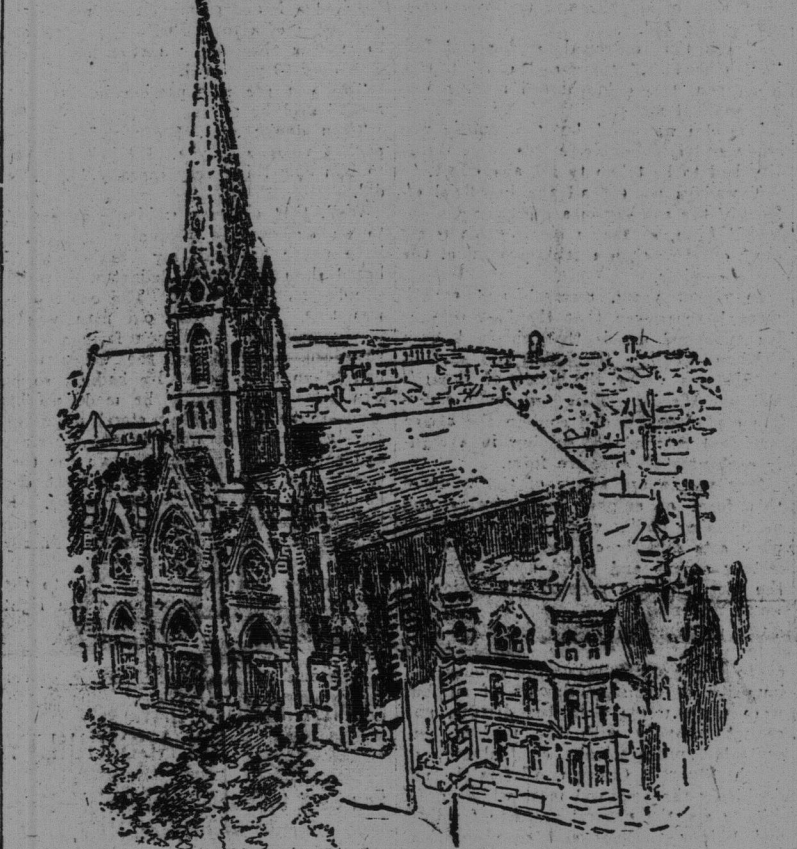
His Grace Archbishop Cornelius O'Brien was born near New Glasgow, P. E. I. on May 4, 1843. His father and mother both came from the County Wexford, Ireland. His first school master was Robert Laird, an elder brother of Hon. David Laird.

He entered St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, P. E. I., in 1861, and was ordained in 1864. He was appointed principal priest of the cathedral, but health failing, he was sent as parish priest to Indian River, where he remained eight years. In 1870 he accompanied the Bishop McIntyre to Rome as his secretary and in the following year a second visit to the Eternal City with Archbishop Hannan, at his special request.

On the demise of the late Archbishop O'Brien was appointed to succeed him as fourth archbishop of Halifax.

NORTH END LIGHTS

Reasons Stated in Favor of Continuance of Civic Ownership.

To the Editor of the Times: Sir—Will you kindly permit me to say a few words concerning the suggested closing of the north end lighting station. Without doubt that establishment has been a success. It has supplied street lights at a moderate cost for some 18 years, and which is of far greater importance to the citizens generally, it has kept down the price of the street lights which the railway company has furnished to the rest of the city.

As an illustration of what unopposed monopoly means, even in this city, the west end will give us a good example. There, the north end municipal plant did not of course, act as a model and as a result, the city pays from \$105 to \$112 per light per year, in that section.

In conclusion, permit me also to remind the citizens through you of another very grave objection to the deal being contemplated at the present time. I refer to the abandoned through deals of the representatives on the council, the late Messrs. Millidge and Christie. Surely it goes without saying that a transaction of such importance should not be consummated with only a partial board, and more especially when the absentees represent that part of the city most vitally interested—the north end.

WILL DINE EARL GREY

NEW YORK, March 10.—Earl Grey, Gov.-General of Canada, has accepted the invitation of the Pilgrims to the dinner which will be given in his honor at the Waldorf-Astoria on Saturday, March 31, and will come down from Ottawa for the occasion with several of his cabinet ministers, according to the Tribune. Secretary of State Root and other members of the administration, as well as Sir Mortimer Deland, the British ambassador, have also promised to attend the dinner, while the president may be present if his engagements permit.

The dinner will be the first public entertainment of a governor general of the Dominion anywhere in the United States. In the absence of Bishop Potter, Morris K. Jessup, one of the vice-presidents of the Pilgrims, will take the chair.

The Discussion Over Amendment to License Act

MR. SKINNER'S SPEECH

He Appeared in the Interests of Liquor Licenses, and Criticized Promoters of New Bill--Rev. Thomas Marshall and L. P. D. Tilley Heard in Reply.

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 10 (Special).—The bill to amend the liquor license act was further discussed pro and con before the members in the executive council chamber yesterday afternoon. C. N. Skinner, K. C., appeared as counsel for the wholesale licensees of St. John, while Rev. Thomas Marshall and L. P. D. Tilley, of St. John, championed the cause of the temperance people.

Mr. Skinner, who opened the discussion, reflected rather severely upon those who are behind the bill. He had no doubt of their sincerity, he said, but they were certainly ill-logical and unreasonable, and seemed to work on the assumption that those engaged in the sale of liquor were criminals. This kind of crusade had been carried on for years, but it was a notorious fact that there is more liquor sold in Canada today than ever before.

All men require stimulating and it is absurd to urge that a temperance man is the only one who can control himself or that a man is not stronger than a barrel of whiskey. He thought the effect of liquor was greatly exaggerated, for as a matter of fact only about five per cent of those who use it become drunkards.

Mr. Tilley in reply, said that it was well understood that the temperance legislation was a delicate matter for any government to touch. He pointed out in reply to Mr. Skinner that the bill was a government bill.

Dr. Pugsley thought the temperance people were broadening out somewhat in their demands. At first they had only asked that the act apply to express companies, now they wanted railways and steamboats included. He thought there was danger of their putting the government in a hole by asking too much.

The premier, if there is any probability that we should know it, I know that there is a feeling that the government is opposed to the temperance party and an anxiety to place us in an awkward position.

None of them were twenty-five, but they had strange and moving tales to tell, when they could be induced to talk of the task of governing alien peoples, of British efforts to put down raid and rapine, fire and feud, battle and bloody vengeance, and the other grim pastimes of the simple pastoral people of the Upper Burma, and the valley and the Irrawaddy. These youths had seen and taken part in the game of Life and Death, where the stakes were the lives of men and the souls were war and peace. Quite as stirring and as thrilling in their way were the stories told by three or four young men who were back on their way from the mission field of the Orient. Barber, chief secretary of the Y. M. C. A. for India, told of the work among the Hindus, the Mohammedans and the Buddhists of Southern India and Ceylon, with quaint tales of native customs, superstitions and life. Galley, the man who has reached more than any other the great literati class of China, told of the passing of the old Middle Kingdom, he said, is even now in the throes of transition, and it rests with the church at home to say whether the new life of the land of Confucius shall be merely the superficial materialism of Japan, or shall be instinct with the spirit of the Gospel. Helm, of Japan, told story after story of the awakening of the British of the East, and of the influence of Japan is already exerting on China and the inner life of the Celestial Kingdom. To hear these young Crusaders of the twentieth century, forgotten from the ends of the earth, telling of how the mysterious East is sloughing in the dead inertia of centuries and is ready and anxiously waiting to be taught, is to realize the opportunity of the church and its responsibility."

JEROME AFTER MUTUAL RESERVE

President Burnham and First and Second Vice-Presidents Indicted

New York, March 9.—Three indictments against officers of the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company were handed down by the grand jury yesterday. Those indicted

are Frederick A. Burnham, president; George D. Eldridge, first vice-president, and George Burnham, Jr., second vice-president. Ever since the legislative insurance investigation ended District Attorney Jerome has been investigating certain transactions of the Mutual Reserve. Recently the officers who were yesterday indicted appeared before the grand jury and made statements concerning those transactions. If, according to a report published yesterday, "Judge" Hamilton returned from Paris at the instigation of District Attorney Jerome and if immunities have been promised him if he tells all he knows, Mr. Jerome refused to say anything about it. It is not believed, however, that Mr. Jerome has promised immunity to Hamilton. It is possible that Mr. Jerome may have had some communication with Mr. Hamilton, either directly or through some of the "Judge's" friends. "Judge" Hamilton is said to have been anxious to find out if he would be made a subpoena if he returned to this country. He was returned to the country. He is believed to have been treated the same as anyone else involved in Mr. Jerome's investigation. It was pointed out that there might be something more than a coincidence in the fact that "Judge" Hamilton returned from Europe on the day that the grand jury began its investigation of political contributions by the insurance companies. Mr. Hamilton may have some knowledge of gifts to political parties by the insurance companies that the grand jury would like to hear.

Hamilton Returns.

New York, March 9.—Unheralded and unannounced, Andrew Hamilton, the long absent legislative agent of the New York Life Insurance Company, slipped into New York Tuesday on the steamship Deutschland, and hastened away to Albany before the news of his arrival had gotten beyond the officers of the company, who alone were in the secret. With no concealment save the signing on the ship's register as H. A. Milton, which differently punctuated and capitalized "Hamilton," the man who knows most about the famous "yellow dog" funds which have never been satisfactorily explained, whose testimony was given by the Armstrong investigating committee, guided into New York like a shadow and so quickly passed on again. To a first direct pier the man who got more than \$1,200,000 from the New York Life "by order of the president," said: "I am here prepared to meet any charge that may be made against me. My hands are clean, and I have no fear of the result. If anybody sees fit to get after me with a gun he will find out that I am armed with a cannon."

FRENCH COSTUMES AT MI-CAREME CARNIVAL

At This Mid-Lent Carnival Many of the Fashions Which Will Govern the Late Spring Season Are Suggested—Much Splendor of Toilette Is Displayed in the Gowns of the Participants, and Rich Poor Alike Are Masqued—Six Fancy Costumes Described in Detail from French Costumer's Own Descriptions. An Unique Innovation is Inky Black Batiste Lingerie—Fine Laces Trim These Sets Which, Were it Not for the Gloom They Suggest, Would Be Wondrously Handsome—Many Summer Gowns are of Black Embroidered Linen

(By Nina Fitch.)

PARIS, Feb. 25.—Paris is preparing for Lent, despite ominous prophecies. Everywhere in the best circles the recent Catholic riots are deplored, and some of the shopkeepers affirm that the division of the state from the church will even affect trade. Grand ladies of piety bent, in fact, have already announced their intention of passing Lent entirely on duty; this, and a further health matter of expediency, to prove their loyalty to the church and disapproval of the new state of things.

On the other hand, preparations are going on for the yearly carnivals, which precede and follow Lent, and brighten the middle of the period of fasting and prayer. The most joyous of these carnivals is undoubtedly that of the mi-careme, the middle of Lent, and is a truly a festival of the lower people, called indeed, Le Carnaval des Bouches (the washerwoman's carnival), the celebration of mi-careme has come to be quite a fashionable hobby. The street pageant, which takes hours to pass along the boulevards, is still made up by the people; but rubbing elbows with pretty landladies, flower-makers, butchers, bakers and what not, safe in her mantle of mask and domino, the duchess may seek jollily and adventure. The immense street crowds are very good natured on these occasions, so that, properly escorted, the lady of the highest degree may fear no danger. At a certain hour the law force everybody to unmask, and when this strikes, like Cinderella from the ball, the grand dame who has been playing at canasta fits to the safety of her own home. While dodging in and out of the crowd, singing and receiving confetti, she is no longer duchess or even madame. Citizeness (citoyenne) is the revolutionary title she most often hears, and let her beware of being too superior in return. Paris is very merry when it plays, but one needs always to look for the turn of the tide.

Even in the most religious circles the mi-careme carnival passes to night and proper, and the masked balls given at this time are sometimes very splendid. The toilettes seen at these, however, are no more magnificent than some of those which appear in the street pageant, for often the beauties in the floats are costumed and jeweled by the most fashionable tradespeople. So it often comes about that a private ball will reproduce faithfully the costume of some beautiful dancer, laundress or girl of the public festival. The ethics of mi-careme is the flinging off of all trammels, and masked luncheons in the Bois, next to the table of one's own cook, may round up the morning.

In the ateliers of Monsieur C., a customer much patronized by stage folk, were found some charming toilettes. "But," said the visitor, "these are for the people. Show me what the grand ladies wear." And so beguiled, the celebrated costumer, who is himself like a merry little figure in a carnival, consented to show some of the costliest visions. And lo! was proven the rumor that madame la duchesse really plays at "canasta" at mi-careme. One little toilette of checked blue silk, with cap and muslin apron, reproduced with charming fidelity the costume of the blanchisseuse de fin, who is a laundress with a shop. Another showed the identical materials—course gingham and longcloth; and there were white baker suits without number, trousers, coat, apron and cap, and all for madame la duchesse. The costume of pierrot, the adored French clown of child story and poetry was immensely represented, but though these snowy suits with their black trimmings were generally of elegant silk or satin, sometimes the coarse sheeting of the genuine thing was used. The costumer laughed when the visitor expressed astonishment. "Why not?" he shrugged. "Did not Marie Antoinette play beguere and milk maid? Besides the real butchers and bakers and washerwomen keep one busy with the other thing—characters in the high world."

This is the elegance of the masque; the mistress turned servant, the servant wearing for one enchanting day the plumage of the high. The six fancy costumes illustrated upon this page are among the most feasible and least expensive of the fancy dresses. For the masque all would be covered with silk or satin dominos; the costume only showing after the hour of unmasking. Materials and colors of these charming dresses are as follows:— In the larger picture are four characters: Scotland, Gosset, Coppee and Pierrot. Skirt and plaid of tartan all in violet, green and yellow, on a pale grey

background; the plaid of the skirt, which is frayed at the ends and forms a deep fringe, smaller than that of the skirt. The bodice is of heather-grey velvet, with an edge and neck bow of gold braid. A real lace collar, long gloves of white glass kid, and a Highland-pocket complete this toilet. The buckle which holds the plaid at the waist is of red and green carapines; the cap red cloth with a grey velvet band.

Gosset: This is the staid figure in the group, and the significance of the character is implied by the varied materials used. The skirt, which is in princess style, is of pink satin, scalloped at the bottom and worked with silver and gold tinsel. Waitress brocade, in shades of blue, is employed for the jaunty jacket, whose sleeves are made by strips of plain blue satin ribbon finished at the cuffs with butterfly fluffs of pink chiffon drawn through brass buckles. The hat is of velvet and silk in pale apple green, with violet and blue feathers, pink roses and blue ribbons. With the toilette a close necklace in sparkling brilliants and flashing ornaments; and, to give color to the old saying, a long wand of enameled green wood is carried tipped with a wreath of pink roses and tied with blue ribbons.

Coppee: The evening gown, "is but a light thing of shreds and patches. Yet with her rose-tipped wand, tied with the twinkling blue, she may overthrow the dignity of empire." Pierrot: This character is not commonly seen in feminine guise, but the novelty and pretensions of the dress warrant the pantomime. Three skirts of shaded rose chiffon, finely killed, are overlaid by a tunic of white silk liberally worked with gold. The wreaths for the hair and corsage are of black roses, and the birds are genuine doves with a gauze mounting of oblique weight. Quiver and arrows are burnished gold.

Pierrot: A very popular carnival character for children is the pretty French clown, whose wistful song every French child knows like A B C. The costume here shown is of coarse white sheeting, with black chenille pom-poms, a coarse muslin neck ruff and a pointed clown's cap. Feet of a very elastic sort is always used for the Pierrot's cap, for this stretchable quality is often provocative of much fun at the carnival, where the pointed cap is sometimes pulled out to incredible lengths. To French children Pierrot is almost true, and they are never so delighted as when they may wear his livery at their fancy dress parties. French Maid: This charming gown is entirely of opera bouffe sort, and without the apron and cap as here shown it might represent any elegant young lady of patch and powder period. The gown is entirely in pale grey Louisiana; the vest in pale blue and gold and the bust and hair bows magenta velvet ribbon. The stockings are also magenta and the grey satin shoes are worked with gold. Twentieth Century Lady: Merely a very elegant costume, with fanciful touches of the present period, is this printed satin liberty—dower colors on a white ground—white chiffon and great pink roses with green leaves are materials of this handsome dress, which would be suitable for any ball wear. Three smaller rows than those used on the dress are worn in the hair, and the necklace of jade and old gold is in antique design. Whether it is because of the church trouble here or not, or whether Lent only inspires them, it is a strange coincidence that the grand houses are just now showing the most beautiful mourning toilettes. All along the rue de la Paix and St. Honoré, which are special streets of the fine clothes, are seen ravishing concepts on devil. Loaded with heavy crepe, the delicately thin materials of the gowns fall with an ideal grace. Nothing seems overworked though everything is trimmed with blue, black, and even even applied embroideries being made of crepe. Empire and princess effects are all present, and there are many long skirt coats and there is not a skirt which does not train. One stunning Spring coat even was a

three-quarter affair, very loose and in Empire style, of a veil-like material, so diaphanous that every line of the figure showed dimly through. There was, however, a loose lining of thin dull silk, which also trimmed the skirt of the coat in deep bands and crossed the bodice effectively. A delicious eccentricity in millinery is the employment of peacock's feathers for mourning hats. Of course they are dyed, the most inky black imaginable; but there is the eye of black all the same and most are hand embroidered and trimmed with real black Valenciennes, and were it not for the gloom of their suggestion they would be wondrously handsome. Many Summer gowns in black linen, conjunction with an immense opacity, the whole effect was very chloody and poetic.

Another unique innovation in black effects of underwear in inky basists. These suitable do they seem for this end use. One hat of shirred tulle, with dull chiffon taffetas edges, showed a specially handsome peacock's feather employed in which are already being shown in great numbers, display band trimmings of let in lace or open needlework. Black and white apparently is to be very fashionable for mourning, even the deepest. One maison displays a black and white long-coat gown of tulle ancienne, which is positively superb. The whole gown is of the white linen richly embroidered in white the black touch being a deep adjustable collar, wide cuffs and pockets of thin taffetas. The trimmings button on, and anything more fetching than the entire get-up cannot be imagined.

THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH AND HIGHER CRITICISM

(The Literary Digest.) In May, 1905, as noted at the time in these columns, a letter was circulated in England which dealt with the attitude of the Anglican church toward "the higher criticism," and which was signed by seventeen hundred clergymen of that church.

The same letter signed by some eighty clergymen and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal church in the United States, is now being circulated in this country, with a foreword stating that the signers "feel that churches in America will mark attentively so carefully prepared an expression of opinion by their brother churchmen abroad upon religious problems whose import is felt not more keenly in England than here."

Among the well-known laymen whose names are on the list are: Prof. Brander Matthews; among the clergymen are the Rt. Rev. Thomas A. Jaggar, D. D., Bishop of Southern Ohio; George Hodges, Dean of the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, Mass.; and the Rev. John P. Peters, Canon of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York.

The present unsettled conditions of the church, which, while due in the main to the general trend of modern thought, specially connects itself for the clergy with the problem of "the Testaments," and it points out and deplores a "tendency to treat the full dictionary of any questions arising out of the Testaments as a body to non-critical views of the New Testament Scriptures, which, as Christian teachers, may now receive authoritative encouragement from the clergy."

The Rev. Algernon S. Crapey, as quoted in The Church Standard (Philadelphia), expresses the application of the document because it "hits the whole matter out of the region of persons who have been and are being misled by the doctrine of the Testaments for larger liberty. He remarks, 'It is now the common trend of the mind of the church to express a fear that the door of ordination should be closed to men who patiently and reverently apply historical methods, and so an increasing number of men both spiritually and intellectually qualified should be lost to the church and the ministry.'"

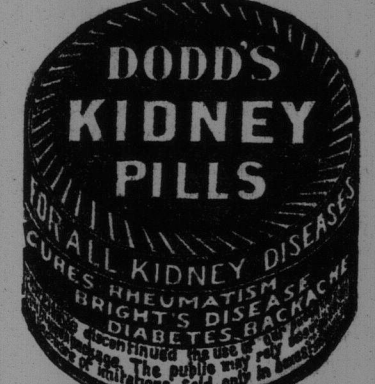

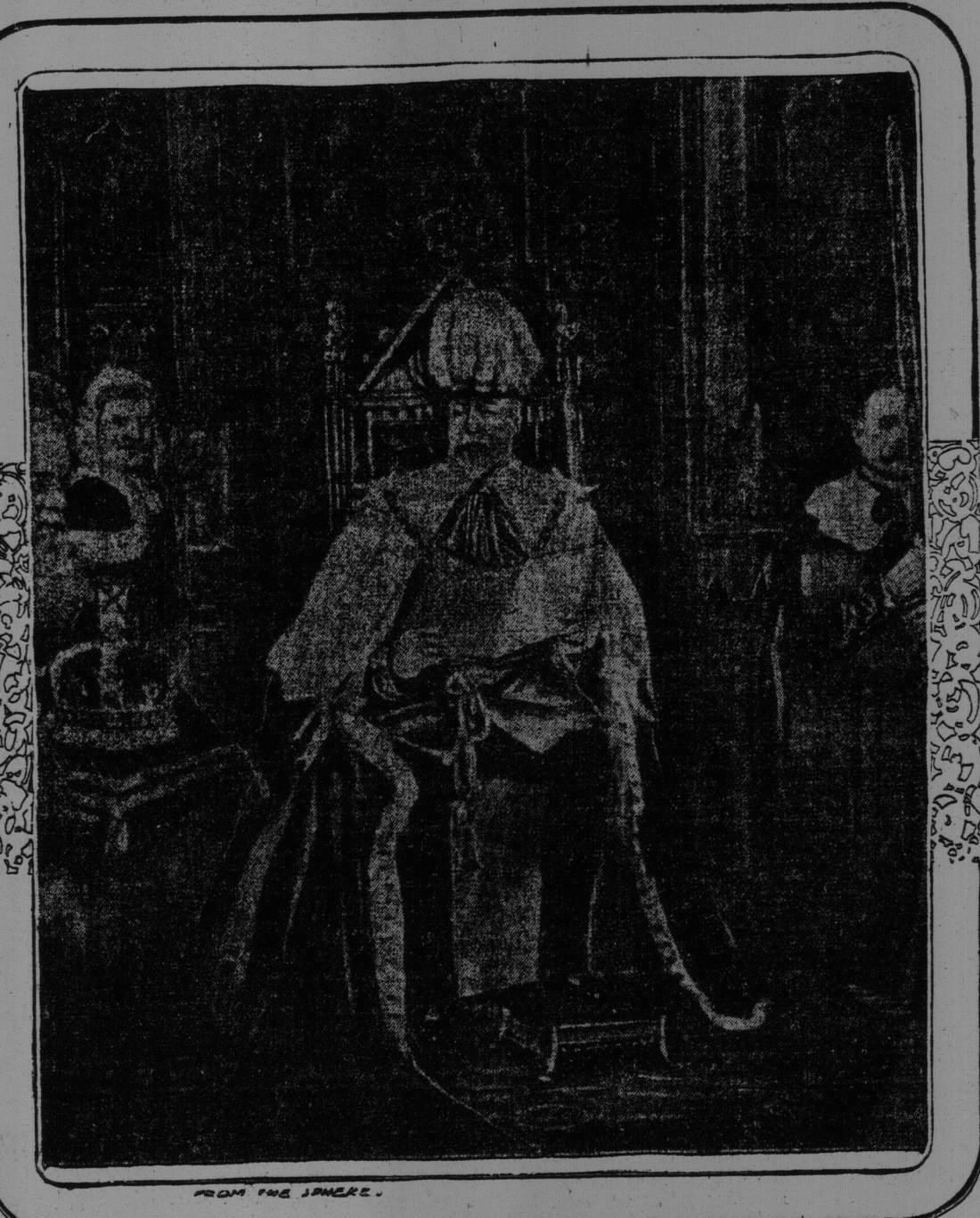

Scene in Court When Bertha Claiche Pleaded Guilty



Bertha Claiche Being Carried out of the Court Room. New York, March 9.—By agreement of District-Attorney Jerome and counsel for the defense Bertha Claiche, charged with the murder of Emil Gerdon on July 8 last, Tuesday withdrew her plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty to manslaughter in the first degree before Judge Davis in the criminal branch of the supreme court. She will be sentenced on March 29. It was finally decided that the plea should be accepted on condition that the girl would reveal to the district-attorney her full knowledge of the relations of policemen with women of the Tenderloin to aid in an investigation to be made by Mr. Jerome in co-operation with Commissioner Bingham. As she answered the formal inquiry of the clerk, the pallid young French woman whose life was at stake uttered a wild cry and fell to the floor. For nearly ten minutes she lay there shrieking and moaning, and then she was carried back to her cell in the Tombs. Twenty years is a maximum penalty for manslaughter in the first degree, but the officiating judge has full discretion to impose any lesser term. In expectation that she will give valuable aid in the investigation of police conditions, the girl's lawyers, Abraham Levy and Otto Roskoff, are confident that she will get no more than five years, if, indeed, she is not sent to a reformatory institution. With the anticipation that Bertha Claiche would take the stand in her behalf the largest crowd that had yet sought admission to the court room gathered.

New York Giants in Practice Work at Memphis, Tenn.

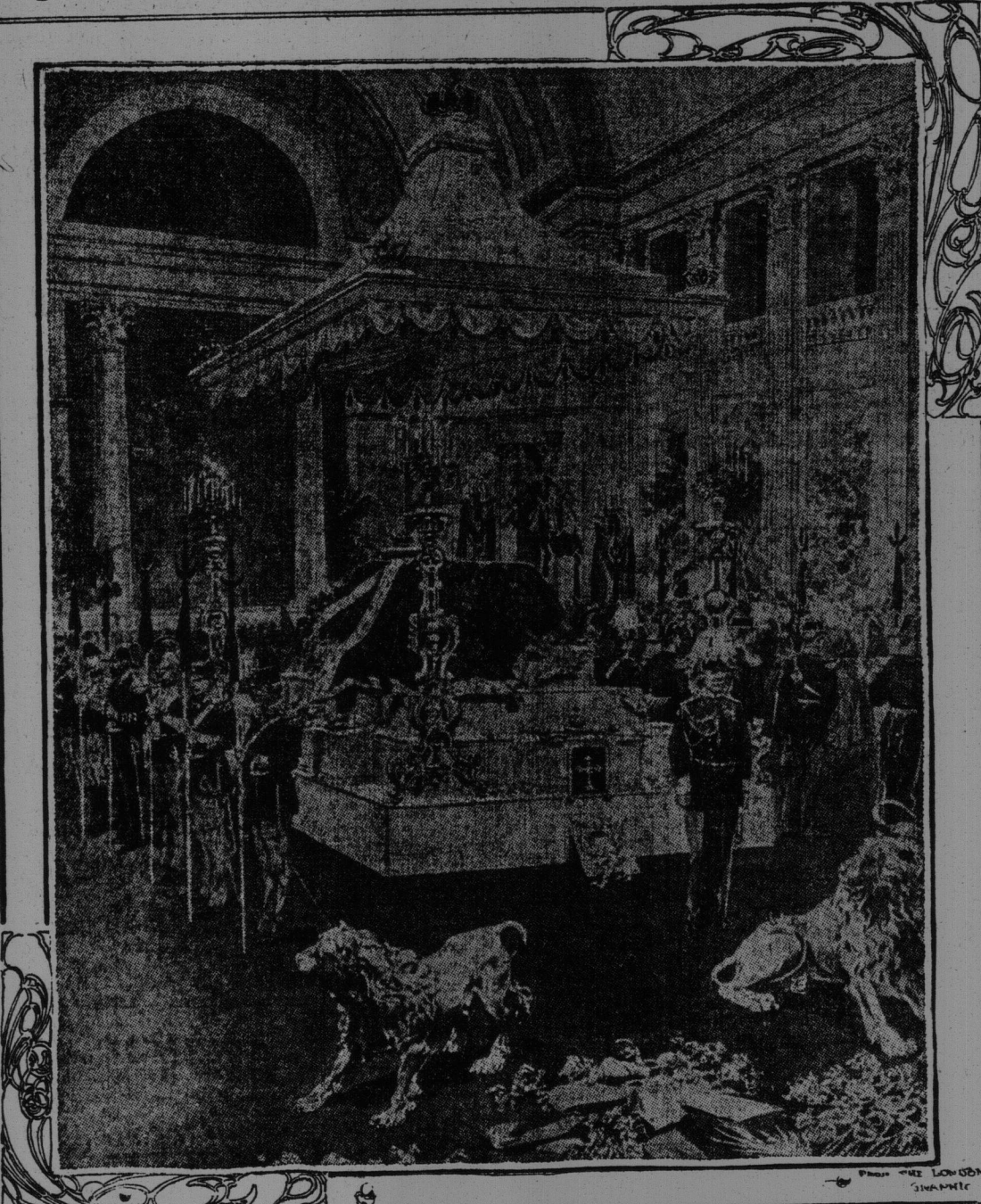


Giants With their Push Ball

King Christian Lying in State in Christianborg Church



The body of King Christian of Denmark was removed from the Amalienborg Castle to the Christianborg church, and there the mourning people were given an opportunity of paying their last respects to their sovereign. The coffin reposed on a white catafalque, beneath a white satin canopy, and upon it rested a crown with the royal insignia. The guard of honor, composed of officers of all branches of the service, stood ranged on three sides, while the foreground of the chapel was filled with masses of flowers and wreaths. At the base of the coffin were the three splendidly carved silver lions, the arms of Denmark, representing the sound and the great and little bells. These lions have been used at the funerals and monuments of the Danish kings since the funeral of Frederick III., in 1671. In the foreground of the chapel a black cloth stretched on the floor was carpeted with wreaths. At each corner of the catafalque a massive silver candelabra threw a yellow light that glittered on the diamonds of the insignia.

PLAN NOW IS FOR TWO NEW BERTHS

Dredging of North Side of New Wharf Will Likely Be Deferred for the Present.

It is understood that the amount of dredging asked for by the recent delegation to Ottawa is considerably less than was originally intended when the new wharf was first under consideration and the idea of dredging the north side of the site has been abandoned.

In consequence the additional wharf accommodation will consist of two berths—500 feet long, now under construction and a second structure 850 feet in length, extending out towards the harbor line, leaving the northern section to be built as soon as opportunity offers.

This revision of the original scheme will, it is estimated, be a point in the city's favor when the matter is finally up for consideration by the dominion authorities as it will reduce the necessary dredging to a considerable extent.

Work has already received the necessary authority from the common council to call tenders for tenders for the second berth and it is likely that some action will be taken at an early date.

In this connection the opinion that the additional wharf could also be ready in time for next winter port season if tenders for its construction were called for, has been expressed.

It is claimed, however, in some quarters that the season is now too far advanced for the city to secure the timber at a reasonable price and that if tenders are to be called for, the material should also be included.

Should it be found possible to complete the dredging and construct the second berth in time it will give ample accommodation for the new C. P. R. steamers, which are 870 feet long and the city will have six berths available on the west side as against four at the present time.

Appleton was represented by John F. Sprague, of Monson. His plea of guilty, throwing himself upon the mercy of the court. His counsel made a strong plea for leniency, calling attention to the fact that the respondent was formerly one of the prominent men and one of the pioneers in the woolen industry of Maine.

The plea for mercy was opposed by County Attorney Durbin. He stated that the violator of the liquor law in Monson was one of the most persistent of his kind, and it was doubtful if he can raise the amount necessary to pay the fine.
