ANNUAL MEETING.

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Society was held in St. Andrew's Church, City of Ottawa, on Tuesday and Wednesday, 14th and 15th April.

There were three sessions—two on Tuesday and one on Wednesday afternoon, the Board of Management meeting on Wednesday morning. The President, Mrs. Ewart, in the chair at all the meetings. There was a large attendance of ladies from the eastern part of Ontario, and a very good representation from other parts of the Province.

The ladies of Ottawa were present in large numbers. Miss Harmon, as their representative, welcomed the Society to Ottawa, and the kind expressions of welcome could only suggest the thoughtful care and attention bestowed upon each guest, or the interested preparations which had been so carefully made for the comfort and convenience of the entire company during their stay in the city.

Letters of greeting were read from the following Ladies' Societies: The Indore Society, Quebec; St. John's and Harbour Grace, Newfoundland; and the North-West and Philadelphia, United States. Representatives were present from the Canadian Woman's Board of Missions and the Woman's Missionary Society, Montreal; from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies of Halifax and Pictou, Nova from the Methodist and Baptist Societies of Ontario; and from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Ottawa.

is with much satisfaction and thankfulness we are able to state that after completing the sum required for the work of the year according to estimate, and providing for past and current expenses, we were able to appropriate an additional \$300.00 for the Trinidad Schools, and \$600.00 for the Indian Schools in the North-West, in view of openings likely to occur there; these grants of money being subject to the approval of the Foreign Mission Committee.

The Public Missionary Meeting held on Tuesday evening excelled any in past years in point of interest and attendance, being in other

respects worthy of the chief city of this Christian Dominion. The next Annual Meeting will be held in London.

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THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

My DEAR FRIENDS,—It is with no little hesitation, and yet also with very great pleasure, that I stand here, in this the capital of our Dominion, to which we have been so cordially welcomed, and before such a gathering of its citizens, and those also who have hastened from all parts of our country to testify to their interest in this Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. We have already devoutly thanked God for permitting us to meet once more in its interests, and also earnestly implored His guidance and blessing on all our deliberations; and it is now my very great privilege to address you. But in view of the fact that the Secretaries and Treasurer, as well as others, have so much that is intensely interesting and delightful to communicate to you, I shall be as brief as possible. Our Heavenly Father has, during the past year, greatly prospered us as a Society. Year after year has witnessed to an increase, till to-day, at the close of our ninth year, we have 14 Presbyterial Societies, 134 Auxiliaries, 24 Mission Bands, and nearly 4,000 members, besides between 500 and 600 of our young people in the Mission Bands, and contributions amounting to \$1,028. Our God has by its means drawn out our very best and holiest affections towards Himself and towards each other; we are no longer strangers, but friends and sisters, one in Jesus Christ, and in strongest desire to so labour that the time may speedily come "when He shall see of the travail of His soul and be satisfied." And we feel too as if something was being done by it towards subduing that intense selfishness in our nature, which leads us to desire and work to have all things comfortable for ourselves and our immediate surroundings, but to sit comparatively easy and indifferent to the surroundings of others. Spurgeon says, "Nothing so enlarges and expands the human soul as an active interest in foreign missions. The idea encompasses the globe, and lifts the thoughts out of the region of selfishness into that of universal benevolence." And I am sure I speak the experience of many before me, as well as my own, when I say "it has been good for us to be active members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society."

This earnest desire to help on the cause of missions amongst the women and children in heathen lands, which has been begotten in us, grown up and become a living principle of our hearts, has not in the least withdrawn our interest either from other missions or from benevolent work amongst those around us, but the reverse. These words of Jesus, "Ye are my witnesses in the world," mean to all such workers so much, that they dare not neglect their homes nor the service of the loving Saviour that surrounds these homes. At the same time, these other words of His, "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you," and then the command, "Go ye into all the world, and pread the Gospel to every creature," come with such force, particularly at the Gospel; when every heathen country is open to the sound of the Gospel; when even the desert, or rather what was a few years ago believed to be a desert, is found to be teeming with millions and millions of people who have never heard the name of Jesus—"that

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name which is above every name "-not to speak of India or China, with which we are more familiar. Just think of that great Congo State, with its thousands of miles of navigable river and branches, and on their banks innumerable villages teeming with inhabitants—these villages alone are said to contain 49,000,000—and beyond its banks, in valleys and on plateaux, into the very heart of Africa, millions more who have never heard of a risen Saviour. Just at this time Bishop Taylor is on his way with a colony of 28 persons to settle on a plateau between the Congo and Zambesi, said to contain several millions, all of whom sit in darkness. The International African Association has established trading settlements along this great river, and with these have gone 60 or 70 missionaries, but what are they among so many, many millions? Can we, dear friends, think for one moment that we have done "what we could" in years gone by to send this blessed Gospel—which we say we prize so much—to these lands? I know I am met with the reply, these doors were not open to the Gospel till lately. But why? Our Saviour gave the command nearly 1,900 years ago. Why did not a Moffatt or a Livingstone, a Judson or a Cary, or other like minded men, rise up many, many years earlier, but that Christians were asleep, and had forgotten that "this Gospel of the blessed God had been," as St. Paul says, "entrusted to them," and so had proved unfaithful to that trust? Now, dear friends, that we do know that all these doors are open-India, China, Africa, Japan, Corea and the isles of the sea—all crying to Christ's followers, "to whom this glorious Gospel has been committed;" now that we do know that men, women and money are needed to send this Gospel into all these dark places, can we remain any longer inactive or indifferent? Let us make mission work the first and deepest interest we have, and, in the words of the Psalmist, say from the depths of our hearts, "God, be merciful unto us and bless us, and cause His face to shine upon us"-not that we may be, in all our surroundings, happy and comfortable, but "that Thy way may be known upon earth, Thy saving health among all nations." Think, too, of Jesus' words after His resurrection: "Thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name, beginning at Jerusalem." O, how little has been done since then. How easily have Christ's followers been satisfied with themselves and their work. This beginning at Jerusalem, what a stumbling block has been made of it to hinder foreign missions. But why? The disciples did not, even in their day, think they would ulfil the Master's command by remaining at Jerusalem or its neighbourhood. No; "they went everywhere preaching the Gospel." Let s also consecrate anew our lives and means to this trust which has

To our young people, while testifying to the very great satisfaction we have had in hearing from time to time that so many of them teaking hold of this work, and in knowing that it is bringing their est affections into sympathy with Christ's command, we still say: lack not your efforts, till not only hundreds but thousands of your

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companions meet week after week and month after month to pray for our missionaries, to work for them, and to tell of and listen to all the good news they send us. It is most cheering, too, to find that so many of our little ones are being drawn into this work, and take a manifest delight in it. They will, I trust, in years to come, far outstrip their parents in an intelligent and appreciative knowledge of the great benefits, both temporal and spiritual, to be derived from an active and

prayerful interest in foreign missions.

Before closing, let me draw your attention to a matter which, if it should become general, would injuriously affect the contributions for foreign work. We hear that in some few churches, when the sum collected during the year for the "Schemes of the Church" (of which foreign missions is one) came to be allocated, the amount contributed by members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society belonging to that church, over and above the sum collected for the schemes, unduly influenced those entrusted with the allocation, so that less on that account was given to the Foreign Mission Scheme. This is, we think, a serious mistake. Our part of the work is for the women and children only, and the other parts of the foreign work will require more, not less, in proportion, if the Foreign Mission Committee are at all to keep pace with the requirements of the foreign field. In organizing Auxiliaries we have always been careful to say, "Do not take from any other organization in your church to give to this," and a note to that effect has been appended to the constitution in all our annual reports; and we would earnestly ask the members of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society to see that the ordinary revenue of their individual churches, as well as the collections for the "Schemes of the Church," do not suffer diminution, while they also prayerfully remember our motto, "The World for Christ."

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FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Dr. A. Pierson, in writing of missions, says: "We are living in the missionary century of the world's history. In apostolic days, the Gospel was flashed through the Roman Empire; to day, there is scarcely a shore untouched by the feet of the evangel, and not a single barbarous tribe is left to sit in the region of the shadow of death."

It is a source of gratitude and satisfaction to the various Woman's Missionary Societies throughout the world, to know that a most successful and recognized agency in modern missions—which have become universal missions—is the work of Christian women. But as one of the wonders of our time, the mission fields in which, as members of the Presbyterian Church, we are interested, have during the past year been passing through times of trial and difficulty almost

In Northern Formosa, where for the past twelve years the light of a noble and successful mission has gladdened the eye, missionary operations are entirely suspended, on account of the war between France In Central India, toleration for the public preaching of the Gospel by our missionaries has not been secured, and there are portentous signs of a change in the relationships existing between England and Russia, the culmination of which may interfere with our The present rising of the French Half-breeds and the Indians in the North-West Territory will also doubtless affect, in a greater or less degree, the work of our missionaries and teachers among the Indians and settlers. The consideration of these things might fill us with discouragement and alarm, were it not for two facts; to wit, God's thoughts are not our thoughts, neither are His ways our ways; and that never before in the world's history was the Church of God so deeply aroused to its duty with regard to the pagan world.

We now proceed to notice the fields more in detail. The Society will remember that our last report announced the completion, at a cost \$3,000, of our

GIRLS' SCHOOL IN FORMOSA.

June 27th, Mrs. Mackay writes in her quaintly expressive manner: I never get tired looking at the Girls' School, it is so pretty; it would be booking in any part of dear Canada. I was so happy seeing it go up. 10th out at night with warm rice to the men who mixed 10th out and put stone above stone. Then I would go back to our house,

and after seeing the children all right, I would go out again and stay with my husband, and A'Hoa till our clothes would be wet with the dew. The men at work would sing songs, being heathen, and we would sing our sweet hymns. Some folks said we were crazy. I don't care what they said. 'Tell dear Canadian ladies that, though, hard worked for four months, now we all feel so glad. Didn't our true God God bless dear Canada, and all the noble ladies who pray for us."

June 7th, Mrs. Jameson writes: "There are now 40 in the school, the youngest almost ten years old. Four are pastor's wives, the rest converts, or children of converts. All but five are Pepohoans from the east coast. Six or seven preachers' wives are yet to come; to be here even for a short time better fits them for companions to those whose ideas of life become so greatly changed during their course of study. The girls have not yet been four months in the school, and 33 can read fairly well. Including Dr. and Mrs. Mackay, six teachers are daily at work, each in turn with different classes. Occasionally Dr.

Mackay is away, but the work goes on."

August 11th .- "I wish you could have seen how the converts seized on your report, and carried it off to look at the picture of the Girls' School. During the hot weather the students are all at their own homes. We cannot be too thankful for the safe return of so many girls. They were committed to Dr. Mackay's care, never before having been far from their own doors. Nearly all were from Rap-tsu-lam (east coast), and when taken back, whole villages ran out to meet them. The look on a mother's face you can imagine. What if one had been missing. Their ages ranged from ten to twenty-five years. Their parents are of those who threw away their idols, and are being taught. When the girls came, they had no idea of where or what Formosa is, much less of lands beyond the sea. They knew, of course nothing of books. However, the minds were there; and through hard toil and perseverance on the part of teachers, your girls carried home their testaments, able to read them in the Chinese language, printed in Roman letters, besides learning something of their own and other countries, and many things around them."

On the 5th August the bombardment of Kelung was commenced by the French. The chapel there had providentially been pulled down for repairs, otherwise it would doubtless have been destroyed, as were several on the west and northern coasts. Later Tamsui was bombarded, and it is estimated that upwards of a thousand shells were One weighing more than thirty pounds smashed poured into it.

On the 11th November news reached us from Hong Kong that, at the request of the Consul, Mrs. Mackay and the children, together with Mr. and Mrs. Jameson, had left Formosa for the main-land at twenty-four hours' notice. Dr. Mackay's sleeplessness, produced by anxiety for converts, chapels, and the work in general, had brough him to the very edge of the grave. Feb. 9th. -Dr. Mackay writes to Dr. Wardrope: "All quiet since I left. Inventories of the chapels have been taken. Imperial Commissioner promises to pay all damages done to chapels, and the Mandarins are held responsible. Mark well that no mission work could be done were I in Formosa, and it is possible that, if among the natives, I might involve them. I confess to being grieved beyond measure because I am shut out, but not for one moment discouraged. From experience, I don't know what that means, and when the door will be opened again, with preachers, students, etc., etc., and all, all, by the mighty power of Jehovah Jesus, I will unfurl the blood-stained banner over wrecked chapels, amongst a scattered people, and in the midst of the powers of darkness, be they French or Chinese, 'so help me God.'" Recent intelligence confirms the report that a widespread and serious outbreak against the native Christians has arisen, two of them having been speared to death by Chinese ruffians. May God send speedy deliverance.

The mission buildings at Tamsui, including the Girls' School, are still, as far as we know, safe, and we can leave them, without undue anxiety, in the hands of God. For our missionaries we do not fear. We admire their faith and courage. Evidently they have heard the voice of Jehovah saying: "Have not I commanded thee? Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed: for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." From what we have experienced of His faithfulness, we believe our missionaries will be covered in the day of battle, and from what our finite minds can perceive of the Divine wisdom through the march of the nations, we know that these wars and revolutions will be used by God as a means to an end, and that though "the kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together against the Lord, and against His anointed," He shall yet receive the heathen for His inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for His possession. Our missionaries have suffered bereavement during the year, Rev. Mr. Straith, of Shelburne, Mrs. Jameson's father, and Mrs. Mackay, the nother of Dr. Mackay, having passed away. We pray that the dorious Gospel, which our missionaries are seeking to spread, will be heir support in these as well as in all other trials, and that they may e comforted in all their tribulation, so that they shall be able to omfort them which are in trouble, by the comfort wherewith they hemselves are comforted of God.

INDIA.

In this field the year has been one of anxiety to our ordained missionaries, caused by the continued opposition of native authority to the preaching of the Gospel. But while this is the case, we cannot be too thankful that, except in one or two instances and for short periods, the work of our lady missionaries has not been subjected to interruption or interference.

THE NEW SCHOOL ROOM

for the use of Miss Rodger, is completed. The building is in the Bazaar, on the compound of the mission church; it is airy, well ventilated, holds fifty children comfortably, and has separate rooms for different classes. The number of Miss Rodger's pupils is about eighty; average attendance, good. An epidemic of measles has affected the attendance during the last few weeks. Twenty Parsee and Bengali girls are studying English, and thirty Hindi girls, Hindi. Many of the twenty studying English can read and write tolerably well, and one has gone as far as fractions in arithmetic. The expectation is, that this school will develop into a high school. Miss Rodger devotes all her time to this school and zenana visiting. The number of houses visited is between forty and fifty. Lately a few women have commenced to learn to read, which is very satisfactory. Miss Rodger says: "New families invite us to their homes from day to day, and they understand that, unless they listen to the reading of the Scriptures, we will not continue our visits. On the whole, there is much to encourage in the work, and we go about from day to day telling the When asking a woman, a 'old, old story, of Jesus and His love.' few days ago if she remembered what I had been reading to her previously, s. eplied: 'It is all in my mind, though I may not be able to tell it to you.' How much is gained when God's Word is heard. In spite of all opposition, many, so many, hear us gladly; indeed, a very decided change has come over the people in this respect within the past few years. It is pleasing to hear of the prospect of the labourers being increased, when there is so much to be done."

Two weighty reasons are presented why such an institution should be established, viz., the fact that our missionaries are now working with unqualified helpers; and if our missionary enterprises in this field are to be successful, it is high time that children were in training for teachers. Also, that if a school of this kind were opened, something might be done to rescue children, who are going to ruin because they are widows. The above proposition, as given in detail in Miss-Rodger's letter, was referred to the Assembly's Foreign Mission Committee.

differs somewhat from that of the other ladies. She has several schools under her charge, in which native teachers are employed. McGregor visits each one daily, for the purpose of giving religious instruction. During the year, these schools, and the zenana visiting under her charge, have been continued as usual, no new scheme of work, or method of imparting instruction, having been introduced. Progress in any direction in Indore is slow, owing to the restriction put upon Christian work; notwithstanding, efforts have been made to raise the standard of education in the schools already in existence, and to secure for these a reasonable amount of toleration. This has been so far successful, that the native authorities have kindly offered a grant for half the expenses incurred; this amount to be paid by the Maharajah's Government. This offer has not yet been accepted, although made unconditionally, as the matter required careful consideration. There is much reason for thankfulness, however, at such an evidence of good-will, and the prospect for the education of girls in Indore is most hopeful at present. The most serious case of interference to the work of education, as carried on in the schools, and which threatened at one time to be very grave, has been satisfactorily and promptly settled by the Prime Minister, who is an enlightened man, and anxious to promote education. No further trouble has ensued.

ZENANA WORK.

Two Bible women, both earnest Christians, are constantly employed this work, and much is hoped from their efforts to do God's work in eathen homes. From 25 to 30 families in Indore city and camp are sited as often as possible; and although no open profession of the influence of the Gospel, as the Word in most cases is gladly take no interest in the things of another world, when she replied,

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"Oh! I do think about Christ, and when I am grinding my corn, I like to sing the hymns I have often heard from you." Six of the principal villages about Indore have been visited at regular intervals, and it is usual for nearly all the temale population to gather to hear the reading of God's Word, and the singing of the Christian hymns. The General Hospital has been visited every week, the patients being pleased to hear, sometimes asking, "Where did you get God's Word? do come and read to us again." One woman, who heard the Gospel read when in the hospital, upon her discharge gathered all her neighbors to listen to the good story of the Bible. Another, who was suffering very much, repeated a line of a Marathi hymn, and said, "I have often thoughtit is true that Jesus is the best friend." Another wept freely while listening, and said, "Do come again; I have never heard God's Word before." Medical electricity has been used in cases of sickness, and has in many instances opened the doors to native homes. The "box" is always welcome as an remedial agent. The Sepoy lines, also, form another centre for zenana work, and the method of gathering large numbers together at some central point is, for some reasons, to be preferred to the ordinary method of visiting from house to house, though this plan is also adopted.

MISS ROSS

is now quite conversant with the language, and is occupied in teaching and zenana visiting. Like Miss Rodger, she takes entire charge of the

school and the instruction given.

During the year an official ordered her school to be closed, and succeeded in breaking it up. His horse died the next day. At once he thought this was a punishment for his unkind action; consequently he allowed the school to be reopened, and there has been no interfer ence since. Miss Ross is much pleased with the proficiency of the children. She has been teaching them to pray; and one little girl told her that she was asking God to help her with her lessons, and He was doing so. Last May this child did not know her letters. Much of Mis Ross' time is given to zenana visiting. One aged woman whom she had visited in the bazaar, said to her some time ago: "Miss Sahib, am so glad that you have shown me the right road. I used to say's down' when I wished you would not; now I say it from my hear and that is the way I pray. I think I am going to heaven, because Jesus died, and why should I be lost?"

We announced in last report that the Mission Council had secured a site for a bungalow for our lady missionaries. However, before the terms of sale were completed, complications arose, and arrangements were not concluded until recently. We are glad now to be able to say that a suitable site for a double bungalow, or two single ones, has been purchased. Estimates are in course of preparation, and it is hoped that the premises will be ready for occupation before the rainy season, commencing in June. This is a matter of thanksgiving, as we are desirous that our ladies shall have every convenience for the prosecution of their work.

The Church has been quickened to a livelier interest in its missionary enterprises by the return from the foreign field of some of our most devoted missionaries: Rev. K. J. Grant, from Trinidad; Rev. Hugh Robertson and Mrs. Robertson, returned previous year from Erromango; and Rev. J. Fraser Campbell and Mrs. Campbell, from Central India. As we have welcomed these faithful workers, and listened to their earnest and eloquent appeals on behalf of the perishing heathen whom they represented, our hearts have been stirred to their very depths. Mrs. Campbell has visited many of our societies during the year, and by her simple unaffected story of her work, has aroused and increased the interest of many of the Christian women of the

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, it is expected, return to India in the early autumn; Mr. Grant returned to Trinidad some months ago; and Mr. and Mrs. Robertson are now en route for Erromango. Rev. W. Scott Whittier, of San Francisco, writes to the Presbyterian Witness: "On Monday, as the sun was sinking, the good ship Australia, for Sidney, passed out of the Golden Gate to the great ocean. from their wretched homes, brought them to the mission, washed them, the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society clothed them, and so our school was opened with fourteen scholars." The children have made progress in speaking and reading English, writing, figures, geography, and the knowledge of the Scriptures. One little girl, whose mother died last summer, attends the school. She cried many days for her mother, for she was left almost an orphan; the father is a worthless man. The poor girl seemed so pleased to go to the school; and now she says she will cry when she has to return to her home, She is a clever girl, and is learning fast. Mr. Mackay says: "I have also a little boy, who was sold some time ago for two pails of potatoes, and the man from whom I got him offered him to me for a good dinner." The mother of another boy who had been three weeks at the school came to see him. She sat and watched him in his class, as he knelt in prayer, and as he lay down in his comfortable bed, and then she began to cry. Mr. Mackay asked her why she wept. "Oh!" she replied, "I weep for joy, because some one loves and cares for my boy." The intention of Mr. Mackay is to keep the school open until the weather grows warm, then gather them together again in the autumn. "I have thus," Mr. Mackay says, "given you some idea of our school. We have met together at the table, in our play, at the school, and at the family altar. At first I pitied them, but I learned to love them, and I trust some of them have learned to love Jesus."

In response to an appeal made by Mr. Mackay for clothing for the Indians on the various reserves where the mission stations of our Church are located, our Society sent to the North-West, in November last, contributions of clothing amounting to the value of \$2,000. The Auxiliaries entered most heartily into this work, and their kindness has been most gratefully received and acknowledged. In a letter recently to hand, Mr. Mackay says: "Again and again I thank the Lord for the interest manifested by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in our work. I have distributed much of the clothing, but still have some in my possession. I could fill many letters were I to give you all the expressions of gratitude which this poor people wish to send. I have seen old men and women lifting up their hands, and, with tears streaming down their dusky cheeks, thanking God for the kindness and sympathy shown them by the good women far away. One chief said, 'Many of us would have perished this winter had we not received timely help, for we were naked.' Another said, 'I am beginning to think differently of Christianity. I used to think Christians our enemies, but now it seems as though they were our only friends.' I may repeat, what you already know, that we are labouring among a people that threatens to become extinct; a people dying for the want of the necessaries of life; living in our country, and in our midst, in misery; and dying without any sure hope for the life to come When I saw their sad condition, I wondered at the little the Church has done for them in the past; but I feel assured from the ready response to our appeal, and from the many expressions of encourage ment from the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, that, if the

Grant, Mrs. Morton and Mrs. Wright. We are also deeply indebted, as in past years, to the Secretary of Halifax, St. Johns, Nfld., and of Kingston Societies,

for the interchange of missionary intelligence.

In looking back over another year of its existence, this Society has thankfully to acknowledge the blessing from above, without which it must labour in vain; and to report some progress made in increased interest and extended effort, which, it may be hoped, will be still more marked in the future. As Mrs. Campbell, previous er marriage, sustained a close relation to this Society in representit in the mission field, it has been with peculiar interest that its

members have, for the first time, made her personal acquaintance, and heard from her lips much that has increased knowledge of the field in

India and their interest in the work.

This interest has also been quickened by perhaps the most interesting event of the year-the departure for Indore of the first female medical missionary sent out by our Church, in the person of a member of this Society. It would have been gratifying to this Society to have had the honour of securing Miss Beatty as its representative to Indore, but her wish to go out as the representative of the Church, not as the representative of any special society, was of course respected, while it was still resolved to do something towards her expenses. Therefore the money on hand at the end of the year was forwarded to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board, with the request that it be paid over to the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (Western Section), the Foreign Mission Board having included Miss Beatty's expenses in the annual estimate submitted to that Society.

This Society was organized on the above date by Mrs. Harvie, Foreign Secretary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, at a meeting, held in St. Andrew's Church, London, for the purpose, comprised of representatives from the four Auxiliaries in the Presbytery, viz.: St. Andrew's Church Auxiliary, London; Vanneck Auxiliary; Proof Line Auxiliary; and King St. Church Auxiliary, London East. The recognition and sanction of the Presbytery having been asked and granted by that body, the Society proceeded to work, and reports with much thankfulness the establishment of five new Auxiliaries during the six months of its existence. These are all in active operation as the result shows, the sum of \$99.85 having been added to the Treasury, and 128 new members to the Society, solely through their efforts. These new Auxiliaries are, Knox Church Auxiliary, St Thomas; Port Stanley Auxiliary; St. Andrew's Church Auxiliary, Thamesford; North Westminster Auxiliary; and Ailsa Craig Auxiliary. From each of our nine Auxiliaries and two Mission Bands we have received, with one exception, encouraging reports. Towards the close of the year a new Auxiliary was organized, under very promising auspices, in the Mill Street Church, Port Hope. The Monthly Leaflet has been regularly received and as regularly distributed. The officers have, in pursuance of their duty, sought, by the dissemination of other missionary literature, and by personal interviews, to awaken interest at a number of new points. A "Missionary Intelligence Drawer" has been established for the circulation of tracts and periodicals among the Auxiliaries. One meeting only has been held, and that the Annual Meeting, which took place at Peterboro', January 16th, 1885. There was a large attendance, A very appropriate and valuable and much interest manifested. address was given by Mrs. Ewart. Some changes in the constitution were effected, and the same officers were reappointed, with the exception of Mrs. Dennistoun, who, owing to the sad bereavement she had so recently sustained, felt compelled to resign her position.

We have, so far, spoken of effort and results that lie upon the surface. Of the heartfelt prayers uttered, the loving sympathy expressed, and the service consecrated, we say nothing. In God's own time the full record shall stand revealed. The motives as well as the deeds shall be brought to light, and all estimated at their true value.

These societies furnish an outlet for much power that has long lain latent in our midst. Let us see to it that the opportunity thus afforded is not neglected. Let the potency of the still small voice of womanly love, and sympathy, and prayer, be felt in the penetrating, far-reaching influence that woman alone can exercise, and that woman most of all, in whose heart "the love of God is shed abroad by the Holy Ghost."

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NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The work of the year in all its departments having now been laid before you, it is fitting we should acknowledge that your cordial cooperation and unfailing helpfulness have made it possible for us to present such a report, and have largely contributed to render our responsible duties pleasant and profitable.

We have kept you so fully informed from time to time of all points of interest that have come up for consideration, that very little remains

You will readily understand that this has been a busy year. On looking at the record we find that each month has been full of work. In July alone no new Society was reported; during the other months the number has sometimes risen to seven and thirteen.

Sometimes the Foreign Mission Committee would inform us of ladies offering themselves or having been accepted for foreign work, and at another time we have taken leave of a little band of missionaries, or have received kindly greetings and valuable information from others

just returned.

These facts, and others with which you are familiar, fully warrant us in stating that the general tendency has been in the direction of progress. In no year since we began, in 1876, has there been such marked activity; so many distinct centres of operation; so tew halfhearted ones who forsake the work; or such an intelligent apprecia-

tion of the kind of work likely to be useful.

The work is simply finding its way into the congregational and presbyterial life of the Church. As one instance among many showing this, you will pardon another reference to the hearty and generous response which came to our appeal in October, for clothing for our own Indians, around whom at this moment such anxious interest gathers. The note came to us late in the season, and was hurriedly sent out; but the response was so general and so abundant, that it was necessary to say, "It is enough;" the season is too far advanced to send any

Our ladies are now also beginning to understand that we occupy a different position from Ladies' Societies generally. These are either local associations doing congregational work of various kinds, or undenominational societies for general Christian work, such as the promotion of temperance, and the management of charitable institutions, etc. In some essential particulars this Society differs from these.

under the direction and control of the General Assembly of our Church, acting through its Foreign Mission Committee, who consider that our orderly and loyal co-operation with them is of some assistance. And the necessity for such an organization as ours seems to have arisen in this way: The Foreign Mission Committee, in seeking to prosecute this work among our own Indians and in distant heathen lands, find that it is absolutely necessary to reach the women and children if they would leaven society, and therefore they select and send out properly qualified women as Teachers, or as Teacher and Healer, who begin with the simplest forms of instruction, sowing the seed early and constantly; and for a variety of reasons, some of them arising from the peculiar customs of these countries, the Missionary Teachers succeed where other means would fail. So the Foreign Mission Committee lay this work ready to our hands, and ask us, "Can you, without neglecting other duties, over and above all money raised for the Schemes of the Church, undertake to provide money sufficient to maintain those Teachers, secure homes for them, and buildings in which they can do their work, and thus set free the general fund to forward the preaching of the Gospel?" And we, who hear of the great need and sorrow of our heathen sisters who know not Christ, and can picture to ourselves little children who have never heard of a Saviour -we are trying to answer that question in the affirmative.

And what does this simple raising of money for such a purpose bring with it? It has brought to us many things. To work for the good of others—to do something to make them better and happier and bring them near to God—exercises the good that is in us, and helps ourselves. It has brought to us a deeper interest in the spread of the Gospel, a more intelligent grasp of all the Schemes of the Church, a better acquaintance with each other, and the peculiar

blessing of "those who serve."

The Annual Statement and Estimates which we receive from the Foreign Mission Committee have been helpful to us, because it is always pleasant to have a special object to work for; and now every member of our large Society who brings in her contribution, every young girl in our Mission Bands who gives of the work of her hands or her savings, may feel that she has a special interest in, and a strong claim upon, every one of our lady missionaries and schools, and every woman and child instructed there, and that her mite, along with all the other mites, supports this work in its various branches.

The foreign work may be summed up as follows:

One girls' school in Formosa.

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Three schools for our own Indians in the North-West. Six schools under the care of our ladies in Central India.

Six native teachers assisting in these schools. Two Bible women.

General missionary work in zenanas, villages and hospitals. One medical missionary.

Three lady missionary teachers.

One lady ready for the work now in England, and one lady in Canada receiving medical education.

Donation for Trinidad schools.

The estimates in your possession show that for these purposes \$8,530.00 is required, so that after providing for last year's expenses and reserving something for current expenses, we are for the first time in our history the proud possessors of a surplus-ready for an open

The sum of \$10,380.54, which we are able to present before you to-day has a most interesting history; even the sums paid to secure life memberships are not without their own little story; but the bulk of the money has been carefully gathered in small sums from many different places, and if its tale were told, as some of us could tell it, it would be found as truly touching as any narrative of self-sacrifice can be. The greater part of the story is only known to the givers and to Him for whose sake it is offered. It has not come from the rich, but from those who must carefully consider ways and means-from the young and from the very poor, who are needy themselves, but who are ready to share their scanty means with others.

Surely our Heavenly Father has not brought all this before us without laying upon us the responsibility of marking and profiting by the lessons which it teaches. If patient industry and honest endeayour have accomplished what we now see, we may well contemplate the future fearlessly. With one object in view, united and happy in our work, let us not stumble at difficulties. Some of these have been removed for us this year; local interests have made way for the benefit of the whole; that generous "self-forgetting," which is all-powerful, is not unknown among us; in numbers we are stronger than before; let us seek to be strong in patience, in humility, in faith and in prayer.

The year, which has given us so many blessings, has also brought some changes. Again we miss faces once so familiar and so true. In the sight of those who remain, the landmarks are one by one disappearing; the present is our time for work, the resting-time approaches. "Be not slothful, but followers of them who through faith and patience inherit the promises."

OF THE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

(WESTERN SECTION.)

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Society shall be called "THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA" (Western Section), and its central point of operation shall be the City of Toronto.

ARTICLE 2.—Its object shall be to aid the Foreign Missionary Committee and Board of Missions, by promoting its work among the women and children of heathen lands, and for this purpose it shall receive and disburse all money which shall be contributed to the Society, subject to the action of that Committee or Board, in the appointment of missionaries supported by the Society, and fixing their salaries and locations. For the furtherance of this end it shall endeavour to organize similar Associations throughout the Church, and these Associations shall bear the name of "Auxiliary Societies to the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church in Canada," and shall report their work to this Society at such times as the By-laws may direct.

ARTICLE 3.—Each person paying one dollar annually, through an Auxiliary or direct to the Treasury, shall become a member of this Society. The payment of twenty-five dollars by one person, at one time, shall constitute a life membership.

ARTICLE 4.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of thirty-six Managers, including the President, four Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, two Corresponding Secretaries, and a Treasurer. They shall be elected from the members of the Society annually, by the members who are present at the Annual Meeting. They shall have power to elect non-resident Vice-Presidents, and to appoint corresponding members when the objects of the Society shall be promoted thereby; they shall also have authority to fill vacancies occurring in their body during the year.

ARTICLE 5.—There shall be an Executive Committee, composed of the officers and four other Managers, to be elected annually. This Committee shall have power to transact such business as may require attention in the intervals between the stated meetings of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum.
