



### HEALTH MANUAL FOR SCHOOLS

Distribution of Insulin Reported on at Health Bureau Meeting.

The New Brunswick Bureau of Health was in session here all day yesterday at the Health Centre with Dr. G. G. Melvin, chief medical health officer of the province, presiding. The quarterly session was not concluded until after midnight.

At the afternoon session Dr. Desmond reported that the smallpox in Westmorland had come from the Fraser Lumber Co., camp and recommended that the costs be fixed on the Fraser Company. He said that 520 people were vaccinated in Restigouche during this outbreak.

bits outbreak.

Dr. H. L. Abramson, reporting on the insulin clinics under the auspices of the Department of Health, said that up to the end of May 31,000 units of insulin had been distributed free, and since that time increasing amounts had

been distributed.

He also reported on a new method of determining the disease.

Reports were heard from H. D. Morris, of Chatham, secretary for Northumberland and Mrs. Wheeler, of Fredericton, secretary for York.

Miss H. Meiklejohn, director of Public Health Nursing service, reported that conditions were much the same. There were no new nurses. St. Andrews had decided to affiliate with the Department of Health and to put a nurse's services at the disposal of the department for school purposes if a subsidy of \$100 was paid.

Dr. LeBlanc, Moneton, inspected 265 schools; vaccinated 3,265; inspected 6,646 pupils; out of 55 defects in Salisbury school 44 had been remedied; vaccination was a bone of contention in Kent county; 95 per cent of vaccinations were effective.

Dr. Melvin reported that short directions for the care of arms after vaccination had been prepared for distribution to children and parents.

He expressed the greatest commendation of the work of the late Dr. J. A. McCarthy. His work at the Health Centre was a monument to his ability.
