PREMIER DRURY.

Premier Drury of Ontario did not have to wait long for evidence that whatever the secretary of the U. F. O. may say against his view, there is a large body of public opinion which approves of his declaration that the farmers' party should broaden out.

HON. A. L. SIFTON.

Hon. A. L. Sifton, whose death is announced, was much better known in the west than in the eastern provinces. Going with his parents to Manitoba in 1865 he grew up in the west. He began the practice of law in Brandon, and was a member of its first city council.

In an address before the Rotary Club of Ottawa one of the signers to this letter asserted that "there are certain elements in the country districts at the present time regarding their own interests to the detriment of all industries other than agriculture."

"We do not want class legislation," he stated. "There must be co-operation between the farm and the city rather than the feeling of antipathy toward the agriculturists that would inevitably result from a purely farmers' legislation."

A STIFF INDICEMENT.

The New York World is not surprised that Canadians are disposed to resent the proposed high tariff against Canadian products, and describes the policy of the American high tariff advocates in this regard as "stiff idiology."

"Next to the United Kingdom, Canada, of all other countries in the world, is our best customer. We exported to the Dominion last fiscal year more than \$90,000,000 worth of merchandise."

This morning's news intimates that Mr. Drury and Secretary Morrison of the U. F. O. are not as far apart as at first appeared. If so the matter will not prove serious. The public, however, will welcome the premier's broader policy because it lessens the probability of a struggle of class interests in politics.

There was a heavy decline in furs at the sales in New York yesterday. The range was from 45 to 75 per cent below the prices at the April sales last year. A drop in the cost of living would be more generally welcomed, but it also is coming.

SEEK MATERIAL IN CANADA FOR THE CORK REBUILDING WORK.

Ottawa, Jan. 21.—Plans made to rebuild Cork's burned areas have resulted in the Irish International Trading Corporation Limited, of Cork, seeking materials in Canada. The trade and commerce department has received a letter from that corporation asking to be put in touch with Canadian firms which can supply building material for reconstruction purposes.

A report that the Canadian government is to spend \$25,000,000 towards building houses for returned soldiers was denied yesterday.

**BOUND TO GET
MAN SHE LOVES**

Canadian Girl in Court in Philadelphia

Story of Pursuit Half Way Round the World is Told by Wm. Zinzer — Even Took Airship Flight to Reach Him.

Philadelphia, Jan. 21.—Madly in love with a Philadelphia business man, who failed to return her passion, Miss Beatrice Herbert twenty-nine years old of Montreal, chased him half way round the world, partly by airship. The pursuit ended yesterday before Magistrate Cleary.

After the object of her pursuit, William Zinzer, had told his story, the defendant, who was charged with breach of the peace and disorderly conduct, was held in \$1,000 bail for further hearing on next Thursday. At that time it is expected papers for her deportation to Canada will have arrived here.

According to Dr. John Eagen, a police surgeon, Miss Herbert is perfectly sane — "that is, if anybody deeply in love," he said, "can be called sane."

Zinzer, who is about 25 years of age, told the magistrate that when conducting a party of tourists on a trip to the Orient on a trans-Pacific liner last March, the woman annoyed him so by her actions in pressing her attentions towards him that he had to move his seat at the table and change his state room. On his arrival in Japan, he said, he thought he was rid of the ardent wooer, but when Hong Kong was reached she bobbed up again.

On the return trip to Honolulu, he said, Miss Herbert was discovered as a stowaway on his ship. The captain turned her over to the authorities in

It cost me \$100, but it was well worth ten times that price to be near my loved one."

Rev. J. S. L. Foster.

News of the death of the Rev. James Lorenzo Stuart Foster, son-in-law of His Grace Archbishop Worrell, and for the last two years rector of St. John's church, Oaklands (Cal.), has been received with deep regret by his many friends. Mr. Foster was in the prime of life, and recently entered a hospital for a slight operation. He did not survive the operations, however, and died in the hospital. Mr. Foster was educated at King's College, Windsor, and at St. Peter's school in Charlottetown. For nearly eighteen years he was rector of the Anglican parish at Hubbards (N. S.) Two years ago he was invited to St. John's church, Oakland, and accepted the invitation.

Mr. Foster's wife, was Miss Grace Worrell. She died a year ago last August, and two little girls survive them, Lottie, aged seven, and Betty, aged six. Mrs. N. R. DesBrisay, of St. John's, is a sister-in-law.

Daniel McDonald, a well-known merchant of Dalhousie, died at his home after a week's illness from pneumonia. He was seventy-six years of age, and is survived by his wife. His funeral is to be held this afternoon.



ASTRONOMER WINS HONOR. Prof. Russell of Princeton to Get Britain's Greatest Medal.

Princeton, Jan. 21.—Henry Norris Russell, Professor of Astronomy at Princeton University, has received a medal from London from the Astronomer Royal, informing him that the gold medal of the Royal Astronomical Society has been awarded to him. This is the greatest honor that can be given to any astronomer, for it is awarded to that man whose achievements and career entitles him to be called the foremost astronomer of the year throughout the world.

Professor Russell's most notable achievement is known as the "Russell theory of stellar evolution," a theory that was advanced by the late Sir Norman Lockyer, a distinguished English astronomer. It was resurrected by Professor Russell some ten years ago, and while regarded as radical then is now generally accepted.

The work of Professor Michelson of the University of Chicago in determining the enormous size of the star Betelgeuse is the logical result of the theory and was predicted by Professor Russell several months ago, in common with Professor Eddington of Cambridge England.

Princeton granted a leave of absence to Professor Russell, and he will sail for London on the Carmania on January 29. The gold medal will be given to him at the annual February meeting of the Royal Astronomical Society.

The Alberta United Farmers' convention in Edmonton yesterday endorsed the leadership of Hon. T. A. Cresser.

The fishery committee of Gloucester, Mass., has sent a delegation to Washington to urge a duty on all fish.

What Professor Flamm hopes to do with the new invention in Germany, which conditions as they are, is not apparent, but it is announced that he already has obtained patents on his invention in Great Britain, Italy and Holland, and that he had made application in Washington for a patent.

Press comment on the new invention is in the tone of "Oh, that it might have come four years earlier."

FRENCH JUDGES LEAVE BENCH BY WHOLESALE. Paris, Jan. 21.—Paris prisons are crowded with criminals awaiting trial, while more than half of the courts are closed owing to wholesale resignation by judges as a protest against their inadequate pay.

Justices of the French court say that their salaries are \$2 a month smaller than those of prison guards. A common court judge is paid only \$30 monthly. A recent examination for judges brought forth only two applicants against a needed 77.

TRADE OPENINGS IN EAST INDIES

Report From Canada's New Commercial Commissioner—Some Things We Could Sell There.

(Special to The Times.)
Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 21.—H. R. Poussette, Canada's new commissioner of commerce, has just returned after a trip of investigation to India to see what the trade conditions and opportunities there for Canada might be. He found the prospects for a lucrative business with India, Malaya, Dutch East Indies and Ceylon excellent. India gives Canada no preference in food stuffs, nor does Ceylon, but a step has been reached the taking stage in the latter place.

India especially presents an excellent market for foodstuffs, hardware, certain classes of iron and steel goods, motor cars, motor trucks and all kinds of paper. Some demand is apparent for women wire fencing, and the boot and shoe trade could find a more or less restricted market in India.

With regard to trade conditions in India, Mr. Poussette reports a trade depression at present as a result of over-shipment of goods over-bought at the high value of the rupee. Last year the rupee was worth two shillings and eight pence to two shillings and ten pence in English money. This year it is down to one shilling and five pence. Nevertheless it would be a good time for Canada to do business with India, as connections would be with strong companies whose trade would be valuable in better times.

Poussette, who was born in Moortown, Ont., in 1872 and educated in Sarat, Copper Canada College, Royal Military College and School of Practical Science, has travelled for a long time on his own initiative and in the interests of Canadian trade. He went to South Africa in 1901 as an expert witness in the African constabulary. He was public prosecutor until 1903 for the Orange River Colony government. In 1909 he joined the Canadian Trade and Commerce department as trade commissioner at Durban and later at Delagoa Bay and the Argentine Republic, visiting other South American countries from time to time. He went to the front in 1914, remaining to the end of the war. In 1919 he was an inspector of trading agencies to China, Japan and Vladivostok. Later he was sent to India on the mission from which he has just returned, to take up his new duties as commissioner of commerce.

GERMANY MUST BE DISARMED

That is Declaration of French Policy — Reparation Demands Must Be Complied With.

Paris, Jan. 21.—That the prime purpose of the Briand ministry in directing the government of the nation will be to obtain real security for France through the disarmament of Germany, was declared in the new ministry's statement of policy presented to the chamber of deputies yesterday.

"We have a treaty of peace with Germany," the ministerial declaration read, "but we have not real peace as yet — a peace which will solidly establish France's essential rights and assure her security. We shall obtain that security only if Germany is disarmed. That is for us the vital question, marking out for the government its first and most sacred duty. We shall not fail in it."

Reparation comes next in the government programme. On this the declaration says: "The reconstruction of our ravaged soil, our destroyed industries and the equilibrium of our finances are possible only if Germany executes the reparation clauses of the treaty of Versailles. To this end our allies will give us their support. Unless the trifling quantity of war is repaired, a resumption of normal relations and commercial exchange will remain impossible."

Paris, Jan. 21.—Aristide Briand, the new president of the council of the French republic, replied to interpellations in the chamber of deputies today. The new cabinet's declaration of policy seemed to have been a disappointment to many, and real interest centred around today's debate, which preceded a vote of confidence. There seemed but little doubt that the ministry would be endorsed.

Deputy Forgetot made a strong impression in the chamber yesterday when he insisted the ministry's declaration was not sufficiently explicit, and demanded more information. This view is shared by most newspapers of this city.

The Figaro, one of the critics of the new cabinet, says the declaration contained "only elementary truths," and that "a strange timidity paralyzed the premier's pen when he came to setting forth a plan, or even a method in default of a plan."

The Echo de Paris found the declaration "quite lacking in the necessary clearness on certain essential points." "To judge it at its true value and with impartiality," the newspaper continued, "we must wait for the supplementary explanations which Mr. Briand will give this afternoon."

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Driven away from the city hall in Montreal yesterday by the police, a crowd of 150 jobless men walked into Child's restaurant, McGill street, and demanded a free meal. They acted in an orderly manner, and the manager, B. L. Bennett, acceded to their request. L. D. Morris, chief accountant for the Nova Scotia highways board, at the investigation in Halifax yesterday, said that he had refused to issue a check for the full amount of a statement rendered by the Nova Sales Company of St. John, N. B., on the ground that the item of customs charges on twelve Mack trucks, purchased in the U. S., was not accompanied by a copy of the customs clearance papers. It was said that the alleged customs charges were nearly \$8,000 in excess of the actual charges.

At the annual meeting of the Sackville Board of Trades, yesterday, H. Berman was elected president.

The officers of the Carleton Light Infantry held a banquet at the Masonic Hall, Annapolis, last night, the first for many years in Victoria country. Lieut. Colonel Kennedy, officer commanding, was in the chair. The usual toasts were proposed and responded to. N. J. Woolton was toast master.

Ernest, John and Caleb Harrison and William Smith appeared before Judge Stevens at Moncton, yesterday, on charges of theft from several stores in Albert county, also stealing two packages of meekers from the C. N. R. flag station at Forest Glen. John Harrison pleaded not guilty to the two charges against him, but the other men pleaded guilty to some of the charges. They were remanded until Monday, when sentences will be passed.

ROBBERS AT LITTLE RIVER

Dock Street Break. A break was made last night into the stores of Robertson, Foster & Smith, Messrs. Linton & Sinclair, and Remington Typewriting Company, but nothing was taken, and it is the belief that money only was sought. The offenders entered the store of Robertson, Foster & Smith from Nelson street by breaking a pane of glass in a warehouse window. The other places were reached from within. There was no damage done except a pane of one of the doors was cut so as to allow them to turn the key in the door on the other side. The police are investigating the matter.

POLICEMAN'S EVIDENCE IN HUMPHREY CASE

The evidence of Policeman Thomas was taken in the police court this morning at the resumption of a case against Herbert Humphrey, charged with an assault on George Grayley and the policeman a few days ago. The policeman said when the accused was brought into the guard room he was very abusive and caught Sergeant Scott by the throat. The accused was brought to the guard room later for identification and before he was put back in the cell the witness said he and Detective Saunders attempted to search him for concealed weapons. The witness said he struck him on the jaw and in the mouth knocking two teeth out. He said the force of the second blow knocked his head against a stone wall. He said Detective Saunders put the accused in the cell but there was no violence used by either of them. The case was postponed until next week.

Theodore Saunders of Gondola Point, was charged with attack upon a Bothe woman while on a moving tram on January 6. He pleaded not guilty. Leonard Dryden was reported by inspectors Journey and Henderson on allegation of having liquor in his licensed pool room. A deposit of \$200 for appearance this afternoon was made. W. M. Ryan appeared for the prosecution and Scott E. Morrell for the defence.

One man charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and was remanded to jail.

C. P. R. STARTS TO REDUCE STAFFS

Men to Be Laid Off Where Business is Slack

Four From Bay Shore; Shorter Hours at McAdam—Grain Movement and Other Matters.

The commencement of a gradual reduction in the working staff of the Canadian Pacific railway over practically all the New Brunswick district was announced by J. M. Woodman, the general superintendent of this district, this morning. He could not say to what proportion the staff would be reduced, as it differed in each section, the extent of the cut being governed by the amount of business being transacted. Providing the business conditions remained as at present, however, the reduction would be less than fifty per cent. at the outside. A shortening of the working time in the shops at McAdam was also reported. Practically the only section not affected by the staff reduction is that in the north of the province—the Woodstock section. Here Mr. Woodman said the traffic was about the same as last year. The mechanical staff at McAdam was being put on a forty-hour week instead of forty-four, and the staff in the round house in that place was being reduced by twelve. Seven men were being allowed to go from the Brownville shops, and four from Bay Shore.

The Ocean Traffic. Asked if a report that the C. P. O. S. had planned removing all the freight steamers from the ocean route and restricting the carriage of freight to the passenger boats, Mr. Woodman said he had heard nothing of it, but understood that some of the freighters were being laid up on the other side of the ocean.

Regarding the grain situation he said the elevators here were full and the movement of wheat from Fort William and Port McNichol had been restricted to about fifty cars a day. At the present time there are between 6,000,000 and 6,000,000 bushels between here and lake ports, about 1,500,000 of which is in elevators at St. John and a like amount on the rails between here and Megantic.

He said there was no indication of an immediate improvement of conditions, nor would there be any until both the cost of commodities and the cost of labor resumed a more normal level.

Regarding the estimates of the cost of new work to be done in this district for 1921, Mr. Woodman said that he would not have that information for some time. He did not expect that the business conditions would be improved to a great extent. He had asked for considerable work to be done, but was in doubt as to what amount would be possible under the circumstances.
