

Hamilton, Ont., Sept. 22—Welcomed by Sir Wm. Hearst, premier of Ontario, Hon. G. D. Robertson, minister of labor and Mayor C. G. All delegates agree that the congress just started will be the most important in the history of Canadian organized labor. Probably the most important ters on the order paper are the eight hour day minimum wages, collective bargaining and the policy of the congress regarding the one big union. Questions under consideration at the industrial conference in Ottawa will again be taken up by the labor delegates.
