### MORGAN BUYS THE MOST VALUABLE LOT IN NEW YORK

Re-organization, to Cope With Estimated Wall Street Skyscraper
Strike Situation—More OperSite is Worth Nine Million

Lawrence Mass., Feb. 20—With a new city marshal at the head of the local police a reorganization of the force began today and the effort will be made to render the department capable of dealing with the situation that has developed as a result of the strike of textile mill operatives.

The new city marshal, Captain John J. Sullivan, succeeds James T. O'Sullivan, who was retired yesterday by order of the commissioner of public safety. Although the department is to be reorganized thoroughly the militia will not be withdrawn from the city for the present, but may be reduced soon. The mill officials said today that more operatives reported for work today than at any time since the strike began.

New York, Feb. 2—The firm of J. P. Morgan & Co, will soon begin work on a new skyscraper office building to replace their present headquarters at the corner of Wall and Nassau streets.

It is said that the firm has just completed the purchase of property with a front-age of 83 feet in Wall street and 113 feet in Broad street which has heretofore been in the hands of the Drexels. The plot is considered the most valuable piece of its size in New York.

Real estate men estimate its market value at nearly \$1,000 a square foot. At \$1,000 a square foot it would be worth about \$9,000,000. Anthony Drexel bought a part of it in 1872 for \$250,000.



### PASSING IT ON TO

THE CONSUMER

He is the Only One Who Cannot Get Away From Consequences of High Cost of Living

(Toronto Mail & Empire)

Happy is the man whose place in the economic chain is such that he is able to pass on to somebody else the burden of the increased cost of living! This is amother way of saying that happy ought everyone to be but the ultimate consumer. If miners strike and force their employers to increase their wages, it is an easy matter to add twenty-five or fifty cents to the price of a ton of coal at the pit mouth and thus oblige the wholesaler to pay the increase. The wholesaler, on his part, passes the increase along to the retailer, and advances the price at least commensurately. The retailer must in turn indemnify himself for the advance he had to pay.

The consumer stands at the end of the line. He cannot flinch from the burden. He has either to pay the dollar in cash or spend a dollar's worth of his time in giving closer attention to firing the furnace and sifting the ashes. In any event, the wage increase is taken out of him. So it happens with the increased price of food. American restaurant keepers and hotel proprietors are advancing the price of potatoes five cents a portion, because they have to pay about fifty cents or a dollar a bag more than formerly.

At five cents a portion potatoes are charged for at the rate of \$5 or \$6 a bushel. In Toronto hotels, guests are required to pay from 10 cents to 25 cents an order for potatoes, according to the way they are prepared. They pay for beefsteak at a rate that would amount to \$700 or \$800 for a steer. They pay for eggs at the rate of \$2 a pound. For an extremely modest meal, consisting of soup, a small steak, potatoes, one other vegetable and a cup of coffee, one will be rudely parted from about \$1.50 in any first-class grill-room.






