

GIANT SKY-SCRAPER

When Completed, Singer Building in New York Will Be Forty-Seven Stories High.

New York, Aug. 26.-Piercing the sky-line of New York, far above all the other sky-scrapers of the down-town district, the lofty Singer building, fast nearing completion, will within the coming week, exceed in height the Washington monument, whose solid shaft of granite rises 555 feet above ground. When the structural workers riveted home the last steel beam on Saturday, before ending their day's work, the steel frame of thirty-six floors of the building had been completed. Eleven more stories remain to be built and when the towering pile of steel and mesonry is finished it will be forty-seven stories high and 612 feet from the sidewalk on Broadway to the pinacle. This giant sky-scraper will be the highest occupied building in the world and will overtop all other exist-

ing is set in solid bedrock, ninety feet below the level of the sidewalk. On the bedrock were built caissons of cement. PURE FOOD ACT.

Will Go Into Effect on September 3rd— Forty Inspectors Will Be Employed.

Ottawa, Aug. 26.—The act "respecting the inspection of meats and canned foods," passed at the last session of parliament, goes into effect on September 3rd, and thenceforth all of the packing and canning establishments of Canada will be under the strictest possible inspection.

Seventy-five thousand dollars have been appropriated to carry out the inspection, and forty men have been trained for the work. The result, it is expected, will be that after meats and provisions exported bearing the words "Canada approved," will carry the highest guarantee of purity and healthfulness, and will command the highest prices in the markets of the world.

The most impressive of the new regulations for the packing of meat are those relating to cleanliness. 

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST hOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any even numbered section of Domin-ion Lands in Manitoba or the Nerthwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent,

Entry by proxy may, however, be made om certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-Agent's office

an application for entry or inspection made personally at any. Sub-Agent by the Sub-Agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail. In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An application for inspection must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of.

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not liable to cancellation, may, subject to approval of Department, relinquish it in favor of father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister, if eligible, but to no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled.
