

A week or ten days ago, judging from applications and enquiries received, the C. P. R. officials here thought that the full five thousand men could be secured, but now that will go from these province, while it is possible that the number may fall as low as twenty-five hundred.

The reason is that the men are simply not in the country. During past years so many have gone to the States and the Northwest that the country is depleted. Last year there were thirty-two hundred in the western excursions, so that this year the total will be considerably smaller.

The excursion will leave St. John on Saturday next. Special trains will bring to this point the men from Cape Breon and Eastern Nova Scotian points, others from the Valley counties will come over on the regular trip of the Prince Rupert on Saturday, the str. Northumberland will make a special trip from Summerside to Point du Chene on Saturday night, and the Island contingent will land here on Sun day forenoon. The men from I. C. R. points in New Brunswick will be brought in on the regular trains, while those from C. P. R. stations will join the excursion trains on the way west. There will be no shortage of cars. Sixty passenger coaches have been sent from Montreal to St. John. Why the Sky Is Blue. Did it every strike you to inquire why the sky is so delicately blue? It isn't that the gas we call air is in itself blue. So far as we know it is quite transparent and absolutely colorless. No, the

blue comes from reflected light. Air is never pure. You couldn't live n it if it were. Countless millions of tiny particles, chiefly of water, are always suspended in it, and these arrest the free passage of light. Each particle has a double reflection, one internal, the other external, and so the reflected rays suffer what is called "interference" and

You will notice that the sky appears much bluer if you look straight up than if you look across toward the horizon. The reason is that in the first instance you are naturally looking through a much thinner layer of air than in the
