





# TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London, Aug. 14.  
Intelligence has been received that bands of armed insurgents have made their appearance in Aragon, at the town of Caspe. A detachment of Spanish troops has been sent in pursuit of the rebels.

A despatch from Cordoba says that a battle took place between the Christians and Turkish troops on the 27th July, in which the Turks were badly beaten.

It is asserted that a new difficulty has arisen between the French Government and the Bey of Tunis.

The Canadian Council has passed an order prohibiting the importation of horned cattle from the United States.

There was a magnificent military display here to night. The National and Imperial Guards were reviewed by the Emperor. Empress, Prince Imperial, and a large number of nobles were also present.

Fifty-two battalions of troops passed in review. The city was only filled with flags. Vast multitudes thronged the streets and the enthusiasm was unbounded. The royal family were loudly cheered. Lord Napier of Magdala was one of the distinguished foreign visitors present.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 15th.  
A special Canadian Agent has been sent to the United States to investigate the cattle disease.

Nearly a million dollars (\$1,000,000) worth of lumber and forest has been burned within the last fortnight in Canada, and the fires are still raging.

London, Aug. 16.  
Later advices from Tipperary, Ireland, say that Landlord, Agent Scully, was not killed as first reported, but was obliged to flee into City to save his life.

Friday he started again upon the same errand accompanied by a large body of well armed police. Upon reaching the hamlets of the tenantry his efforts, to serve the notices were met with derision and threats of the rioters.

The police endeavored to disperse the mob when a fierce fight ensued during which the police fired upon the rioters several times, the shots being returned by some of the crowd.

Several of the mob were wounded as were a number of the police.

Mr. Scully was severely wounded, and the police retired unable to make any arrests at the time.

The City of Limerick is in a high state of excitement and further trouble is apprehended.

New York, Aug. 17.  
Advices, in Australia of July 2nd have been received. The political crisis in Victoria is increased in importance, and is likely to produce great distress in consequence of the Ministry refusing to resign. The Assembly has by a majority of three to one directed the cessation of payment from the Treasury.

Scully was killed in Tipperary, and a Coroner's inquest brought in a verdict of murder, but deprecated the conduct of Scully, and suggested need of new and more laws to prevent a repetition of such scenes.

Ottawa, Aug. 17.  
Vague rumors prevail here as to the assembling of a large force of Fenians in the vicinity of Odenburg.

The men belonging to the rifle brigade at rifle practice near Chelsea, have been called in and orders have been issued to the military to be on the alert.

The commandant here has received orders to have his troops ready and under arms at short notice.

The guards at the Provincial Penitentiary have been doubled.

Timber.—Six cargoes of Deals were sold by auction last week at £7 7s. 6d. to £7 10s. 6d. per standard, and the cargo per "Leure", from Miramichi, was sold yesterday at an average of £7 8s per standard.

The arrivals from British North America during the past three weeks have been 39 vessels, 36,332.

The arrivals up to this period fall considerably short of the previous two years, and though stocks generally are low, yet the demand from the country is so limited, and the confidence of buyers so shaken, that we have to record a declining market for most descriptions of wood.

Spruce Deals appear to be as unsatisfactory as in former years to both importers and dealers; certain it is, that notwithstanding a comparatively bare market, the Trade are afraid to buy, and though present prices are not remunerative to the importers, the market is still drooping.

Daring and Murderous attack by Indians.

The Fort Smith (Ark.) Herald learns that a company of drovers from Texas, while driving a large number of cattle—some seven or eight thousand—from Texas to Kansas, on a route running west of Fort Arbuckle, when about forty miles were slain, and only one of the number—out of forty—escaped. All the rest it is supposed, were killed. The cattle were stampeded and driven off by the Indians.

### The Bazaar

On the 21st inst., promises to be most inviting and it is to be hoped remunerative. The Ladies who have the Bazaar in charge, are sparing no efforts to make it all that could be desired; one of the great attractions to keen appetites will be the Refreshment table, which will be amply supplied; and the other tables will also contain a great variety of useful and ornamental articles, which will be offered for sale—to use a stereotyped trade expression—"at prices which will defy competition." The ladies have been most indefatigable in their efforts to render the Bazaar a success, and we trust that their laudable exertions to raise funds to pay off the debt due on the purchase of the cemetery and to improve the grounds, will be abundantly rewarded.

THE REGATTA.—The Boat for the St. Andrews Crew, mentioned in our last issue, is named the "New Thetis," and was purchased by them, and not as erroneously stated by the St. Stephen Crew. She is intended to be entered for the Regatta races on Friday next 21st inst. While alluding to this fact, we may mention that it is said a St. John crew will take part in the races; and trust it may be so, as they will then see for themselves that our beautiful bay, is the most central and best adapted for racing purposes on the continent. Indeed for the Regatta race it has no superior, and offers facilities for excursions unequalled by any other place. The distance to be run or sailed in a straight line extends from six to twelve miles; and the Bay will accommodate a large number of Steamers, and sailing vessels without any interruption to those who take part in the Regatta. We understand that a number of raceboats and sailing boats are already entered.

The Court is still engaged in the cause of Key vs. Dr. Thomson. Some of the Doctor's witnesses have been examined, but there are five physicians yet to give their testimony, and it is unlikely the cause will go to the Jury before next week, when the Court will rise, as the learned Judge relieved the petit jury from further attendance until November next. This establishes our remarks in last issue, that the cause would occupy the whole sitting of the Court.

COINCIDENCE.—The "Freeman" thinks it was "a curious coincidence" that we should give currency to a "rumor" that Mr. Wetmore is to be elevated to the Bench, while that gentleman was here in the discharge of his duty as Counsel for Dr. Thomson, at the present Circuit Court. Well, we have not the slightest objection to the "coincidence." Perhaps we have facilities for obtaining information, at all events we do not choose to withhold it, when we believe it to emanate from those who should know. It is reported the Hon. Master of Rolls, tendered his resignation which leaves another vacancy on the Bench, and it may turn out that both Mr. Wetmore and Mr. Fisher will ere many weeks be gazetted Judges. But we are positive that there are many in the Province who would be "pleased" to see Mr. Wetmore, where he undoubtedly will be, on the Bench. We may be mistaken, but we are of opinion that the "Freeman," whether intentionally or not, is doing him a service.

Living as we do on the frontier, it occasional happens that we get hold of information, as we did some weeks ago, with reference to the adoption of the Northern route for the Intercolonial Railway, by the British Government, which we are sorry to say has been confirmed by news received this morning. But shall be happy to record the Attorney General's appointment as Judge.

The Pic Nic at Moore's Mills on Thursday last, was, we are informed an agreeable affair. The boat race was well contested, the St. Stephen crew won the race, the St. Andrews boat was about four lengths behind, but the crew nothing daunted will "try again" on the 21st inst., Friday next.

EXCURSION TO WOODSTOCK.—From published bills we notice that there is to be an Excursion to Woodstock by rail over the new branch to that town on Tuesday next 25th inst. The train will leave St. Andrews at 6 o'clock A. M., and return at 5 o'clock, P. M., the fare only one dollar. As the people of Woodstock have paid us more than one visit by railway, in common courtesy the compliment should be returned, and keeping this in view, it is to be hoped that the inhabitants of the Frontier Town will turn out in round numbers, and visit the pleasant town of Woodstock view the splendid farms and crops in its vicinity, and return in the evening refreshed and invigorated by the change of air.

PRECEDENCE.—In the last "Canada Gazette" is a Despatch and Table of Precedence sent out by the British Government for the benefit of the Dominion. After enumerating the Governor General, Sr. Officer, commanding the Troops, Lieut. Governors, it next gives Archbishops and Bishops! The latter may do for the mother country, but in this Province and the others in the Dominion there is no "established Church," and all are on the same footing. The people won't stand any such nonsense—"the rank is but the guinea stamp," they feel—they know, and will govern themselves accordingly.

THE PIC NIC at St. George yesterday, was attended by a large number of people from St. John, St. Andrews, St. Stephen, Eastport and other places. The weather was very fine and the excursionists speak in the highest terms of the affair. The steamers "Empress" from St. John, "Queen" from St. Stephen, and "Tyro" from Eastport, were crowded. About 400 persons were on board the "Empress," which was gallily dressed with flags. Ample preparations were made for the pleasure and accommodation of the visitors, and everything passed off to the satisfaction of those who were able to get on shore. The Catholics of St. George understand how to get up a Pic Nic on a grand scale.

The Plum trees in this vicinity have for some time been withering from a disease, which for the use of a better term is known as the "black knot." The leaves wither and the fruit is blasted. The cause of the disease is said to be a little red insect which in the early spring deposits its ova in the branches, which after a short time produce a black excrecence on the limbs which spreads, and destroys the trees. There appears to be no remedy but to cut the tree down; the removal of the affected branches does not effect a cure. Plums will be very scarce and indeed will be lost altogether in a few years unless a remedy is discovered for this growing disease.

We trust that the Chief Superintendent of Schools, and our educational institutions will survive the recent heavy attack upon them. What a pity the authorities of the University did not give the writer a chair—h!

The death of Emerson Eaton, Esq., of Mill town, St. Stephen, on the 4th inst., is recorded in the Courier. He was an energetic and enterprising man, and reputed the wealthiest inhabitant of the place.

The Concert given by the Methodist Sabbath School Scholars on Wednesday evening last, was well attended, and we understand that the children acquitted themselves very creditably.

Western Extension is proceeding rapidly; a new locomotive arrived from Portland last week, and will be employed in ballasting. Messrs. Brooks and Robinson are pushing on their contract rapidly.

A MAN STUNG TO DEATH BY BEES.—A man named Forsyth was stung to death by bees a few days ago, in Muskegon county, Ohio. He and another man named Tolau were driving some horses through a yard, close to some beehives, and the bees swarmed out upon the horses, Forsyth fought them off with some bushes, when they came at him, attacking him on all sides and singing him furiously. After finally driving them away, with the help of his companion, he lay down on the house porch suffering greatly and soon asked for water, which Tolau proceeded to fetch, but on returning from the well he found Forsyth dead. He was a large and fleshy man.

We understand that the Minister of Customs has under consideration measures to prevent the importation of live stock from the Western States, in view of the pestilence which is said to have appeared among the cattle in Illinois.

The large fish recently caught near Eastport, is known as the "dog shark" and is quite common in the gulf of Mexico.

Rear Admiral J. Smith, chief of the Yards and Docks, Washington, passed through here last week on his way to Houlton.

The Boston Post gives a New York despatch from Montreal as follows:—  
New York, Aug. 10.—A special despatch from Montreal, dated to day says:—"The members of the Nova Scotia Legislature have agreed to employ the constitutional means alone to extricate Nova Scotia from the Dominion, and deprecate rebellion or annexation to the United States. The meaning of this is that they accept the situation. Business in the Local Legislature goes on to day under protest. Mr. Howe accepts the situation unreservedly."

ACQUATIC.—It is at present rumored that the Ward Brothers intend to participate in the Regatta which is to come off at the Eastport Pic Nic on the 10th Sept. The Paris crew intend to be there also, but at present having in no boat they can safely trust themselves in, excepting the old "Harding" to meet such formidable competitors, they wish it to be understood that they can only take part in such regatta and against such rivals, on condition that the Ward Brothers will arrange a match to come off six weeks afterwards, when each party will find the best boat possible.

The civil war in Japan is still in progress and several important battles have recently been fought. The Mikado, who appears to have the best of the contest thus far, has ordered the execution of all native Christians.

Professor Watson of the Detroit University has discovered a new planet. It shines like a star of the tenth magnitude.

An accident which occurred on Saturday on the O. & C. and Allegheney Railroad near Rousseau, Pennsylvania, resulted in the killing of five men and the wounding of twelve or fifteen others. An accident also occurred Saturday on the New York and Boston Shore Line road, by which four persons were injured.

Two dignitaries of the Roman Catholic Church were consecrated at the Cathedral in Baltimore yesterday with great pomp and ceremony.

England promises to remain neutral during the next continental war.
