DISPUTE ON

Mr. Ellsworth Refuses to Allow Improvements—Other Business.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall, Thursday evening, His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Currie, Belle Isle, Ingram, Bisset, Jamieson, Matthews and Devereaux. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Communications were read as follows:—

From D. A. Stewart in answer to the Clerk's letter re Fire Bylaws stating that so far as he knew all his workmen were observing the said by-laws. Letter placed on file.

American Bank Note Co., wrote asking for payment of \$11.00 as they had made an error in charging excise tax on invoice for June. Account ordered paid.

Chas. A. Killam again wrote in reference to damage done by water backing up through the sewer into his cellar. The matter was referred to the Water & Sewerage Committee.

W. H. Wallace wrote asking a refund of toll tax for 1917-18-19-20 as he was over prescribed age. Referred to Assessment & Appeals Committee.

J. A. Fournier and Valmore Soudreau asking for reduction in assessment on account of errors in valuation. Referred to Assessment & Appeals Committee.

W. H. Rodgers asked for reduction of assessment on account of over assessment in Income Tax and John Devereaux asked for reduction because he had no income except government pension.

Both were referred to the Assessment and Appeals Committee.

Various departmental accounts were ordered paid.

The Assessment & Appeals Committee reported recommendation that Valmore Soudreau's assessment be reduced \$500.00 and Jas. Fournier's \$500.00. Report adopted.

On recommendation of the Police & Licensing Committee, P. Orr was given a license for two pool tables.

Coun. Devereaux reported progress re license for dance halls, etc. The secretary was out of town but would return Monday.

Coun. Devereaux asked for an extension of time. Extension granted.

Coun. Currie reported that Mr. Shephard of P. E. Shephard & Co., had requested the town engineer to give him the grade for their new building on Water Street. This had been given as near as it was possible but as it seemed that every building already erected had used a different level it was hard to give this. Mr. Shephard had asked to have the Council give him a guarantee that level would not be changed, but had refused to do so for the Council. It would let the town in for damages in case something should arise which would make a change necessary.

The matter of opening up Beaver Street was discussed and Coun. Ingram requested to have necessary deeds made out. The matter of procuring deeds for streets on the O'Leary property was also discussed and the Public Property & Streets Committee was authorized to interview Mr. Fred O'Leary in the matter.

The matter of a refund of a portion of the license fee paid by the Fireman for the Royal Exposition Shows was taken up.

The Clerk explained that the Firemen had paid \$150.00 for six days performance. The show was running only two days when closed and they asked for refund of \$100.00.

The refund was ordered paid.

The Clerk reported that he had interviewed Mr. Ellsworth in reference to jacking sidewalk on Mill Street and he had positively refused to allow any improvements to be made. He said he certainly had a deed to this street.

Coun. Currie explained that Mr. Ellsworth's rights were for a fifty foot right of way, whereas the owners of the property had laid out a street sixty-six feet wide. If thought advisable the sidewalk and light poles could be erected upon this sixteen feet. The town could get deeds of this sixteen feet.

Coun. Jamieson suggested that a committee be appointed to interview Mr. Ellsworth and go into the whole matter.

Coun. Belle Isle moved that the Chairman of the Public Property & Streets Committee be authorized to interview Mr. Ellsworth, and report to next meeting. Carried.

The council then adjourned.

STRONG CANDIDATES CHOSEN

BY RESTIGOUCHE SUPPORTERS

Most Enthusiastic Convention Held Here Tuesday, Same A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P. and Ex-Warden John C. McLean as Standard Bearers.

One of the most enthusiastic and largely attended conventions ever held in Restigouche was that of the friends of the present administration which convened in the Municipal Hall Tuesday afternoon in response to a call issued by the President, Mr. John Harquail. Representatives were present from every parish, their being an unusually large number from Grimmer.

At three o'clock Mr. Harquail called the meeting to order, explained its object and asked that a chairman and secretary be appointed.

Mr. John Harquail was appointed chairman and Mr. M. A. Kelly secretary.

Mr. Harquail said that he would much prefer some one else in the chair, but if it was the will of the meeting, he would do the best he could. He then called upon Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works.

Mr. Veniot was received with great applause and addressed the meeting in English and French.

He congratulated the County of Restigouche on having such a large and representative convention, especially because of the late bad weather and the fact that the farmers had to sacrifice their work on such a fine day, to attend. The attendance also showed that the people of Restigouche were taking a greater interest in matters of public interest which was indeed a good sign and showed renewed interest in things.

He was not present to take part in the convention proper, but as this is really the opening of the campaign, to speak very briefly upon the work of the government.

The choice of the candidates rests entirely with the electors. He declared he had no objection to the selection of the province and prospects were never brighter for a victory. The leader of the Opposition, Hon. James Murray, is to-day disowned by his own party. A new convention of the followers of the Opposition has been called for the 23rd to choose a new leader.

On Saturday last at a meeting of the Opposition party of York County, Dr. W. Crockett, who was the leader of the party for that county absolutely refused to become a candidate. He no longer had confidence in the party he had been associated with for a lifetime.

There were many former supporters of the Mr. May-Baxter administration who to-day refuse to follow either of these gentlemen.

It may be asked why we brought the election on in such short notice. The answer was that the government wanted the campaign fought when the people could tell the difference between the two parties. Since 1917 when the campaign was fought in the bitter winter months, the government had given us a clear twenty-four days instead of twenty-one as called for.

Mr. Veniot spoke at some length upon the road policy of the government and roads as they were to-day. He made the interesting statement that he had been able to have the Dominion government agree to the proposed Campbellton-St. Leonard highway as a trunk road, and it would thus have the Dominion government assistance.

He also spoke of the Hydro Electric Commission which is developing the water powers of the province and preventing them from falling into the control of private corporations.

Encouragement of the great farming industry has also received the attention of the government. The present administration had no quarrel with the farmers. They welcomed any farmer candidate who might be elected. He asked any farmer to point out in what particular the government had failed to help them during the past three years. They had done everything possible to help and foster the great farming industry. In 1918 when seed grain was held up by the western dealers the government had appealed to Ottawa and the Dominion had commandeered thirty or forty cars of seed grain which were sold to the New Brunswick farmers at absolute cost and charges, which was a great help to the farmers. Then the government had made it possible for any farmer to restock his farm by procuring through the banks advance at very reasonable rates.

When fertilizer was almost impossible to obtain the government had erected a most modern plant for the crushing of lime stone and that produced could now be procured several dollars a ton less than formerly.

He drew attention to what the government was doing to foster the prosperity of the province. The opposition now say that the big lumber interests have the government by the throat, but this is not so. The opposition wanted the stumpage raised to 7.50, while some of the farmers suggested 10.00 as a fair rate, but the government after taking all matters into consideration thought 5.00 was a fair rate and fixed it so. While perhaps the southern counties, where they have few obstacles to overcome in lumbering, could pay the higher rate they felt that on the North Shore where the most of the lumbering was done, was very differently situated. They had to haul their supplies great distances and drive their logs at heavy expenses.

The government was anxious to deal fairly with every class. The opposition forgot to tell the people that they bled the lumbermen white and put the money into their own pockets instead of the government treasury and that a former premier had gone and is now afraid to show himself.

In closing he hoped that whatever candidates were chosen that they would have the unanimous endorsement of the convention and that every man present would roll up a tremendous majority in favor of the government candidates.—Applause.

Mr. Veniot addressed the meeting in French.

Hon. Wm. Currie was then called upon. He spoke briefly in reference to the government and its policy and thought their had a progressive policy and which he felt sure the people would endorse at the polls on the 9th of October.

With regard to the county of Restigouche, he thought that the people would admit that the roads had been greatly improved and much other good work done by the present government.

Mr. Currie spoke at length in reference to the Murchie charges, as that was the first opportunity he had of making a statement in public.

He thanked the electors for their generous support in the past and assured all that he would cheerfully abide by the choice of the convention.

Mr. LeBlanc made a very eloquent address in French which was frequently interrupted by applause. He also spoke briefly in English and was given a rousing reception.

The chairman then suggested that the representatives from each parish should meet and choose delegates in ratio to the number of electors. This figured out as follows:—

NEW TELEPHONE

RATES SEPT. 30

Patrons Notified of Advances and Much Dissatisfaction.

The new telephone rates, allowed by the Public Utilities Commission go into effect September 30th. These call for a considerable advance.

Office or business phones are \$30.00 for a wall instrument \$4.00 for a desk phone.

Private dwelling phones are \$30.00 for a wall phone or \$31.20 for a desk phone.

There is considerable dissatisfaction in reference to this increase and the Graphic understands that a large number of house phones will be removed when the new rate goes into effect.

STILLS DISCOVERED

Federal Officers Co-Operate With Provincial Liquor Inspectors.

The officers of the internal revenue department of the federal government are co-operating in several districts of the northern section of the province with the inspectors of the New Brunswick liquor enforcement squad in a determined effort to suppress illicit manufacturing, which has apparently been in progress secretly in selected places for a considerable time.

A general raid has just been made on Shippegan island and other islands and isolated sections of the north-eastern coast of Gloucester and as a result a large amount of spirits ready for drinking by that portion of the consuming public not over-particular as to their brands, and more in process of distillation were seized.

The moonshine distillers were summoned into court and before Maxime Dugas, of Upper Carleton Place, magistrate for that district of Gloucester county, fines totalling \$4,000 were imposed.

FIRE AT ST. OMER.

On Thursday Mr. Nicholas Arseneau of St. Omer suffered a heavy loss by the destruction through fire of his store, house, barn and shed. Very little, if anything, was saved. Mr. Arseneau carried but little fire insurance, owing to the high rate charged.



CIVIC GOVERNMENT.

A sign of the times in the growing demand in the more progressive cities and towns for what is termed "civic" administration. It is freely admitted now that the supreme need in civic government is that each department, as well as the whole administration of a city, shall have experts at its head, and that such experts shall be selected by proper competitive tests. There are cities in Europe where a corps of men take up civic administration as a vocation. The true sense of the word there is very little expert guidance in Canadian cities. Men are placed in important positions largely through "pull" and precious little heed is given to qualifications. Montreal Star.



FREDERICTON GIRLS KNOCK H. C. OF L.

Stop Wearing Silk Hair Ribbons
And Adopt Tissue Paper
Substitutes.

Friday afternoon the girls of the High School made their appearance at school with their places in one of the class rooms were reprimanded by the teacher and told they must take off their paper ribbons before lessons commenced. The girls did not take kindly to this order and as a result they were told to go to the principal's room and the trouble started. After Dr. Foster had listened to the girls' story about the high cost of hair ribbons they were told that they could wear their tissue paper bows on condition that no disorder would be caused in the school rooms. The girls went back to their studies in a happy frame of mind and after school was dismissed they marched down Queen street with bows in all colors of the rainbow.

The girls in the other schools of the city have taken up the (ad) and it is only once in a while that silk hair ribbons are seen.

RETURNED SOLDIERS' INSURANCE ACT

Details of Important Measure.
Instructions have been received from Ottawa by Lt. Col. S. J. Wetmore, Director of the D. S. C. R. for New Brunswick, outlining the procedure to be followed in connection with the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, which came into force on September 1st. All matters relating to the enforcement of the act are to come under the Directors of the D. S. C. R. for the various provinces.

This Act applies to all persons domiciled and resident in Canada at the date of application for insurance who are returned soldiers, i. e., any person, male or female, who served in the war, or having been so, and who has been discharged from the service and before the expiration of twelve months from the date of application for insurance under the Act up to September 1st, 1922. Policies will be issued for a minimum of \$500.00 and for multiple thereof, not, however, exceeding \$5000.00. The insurance money is payable only in the event of the death of the insured and permanent disability of the insured. Endowment or term policies are not issued.

The various plans of payment are mathematically equivalent and the option is given only in order that the needs of the beneficiaries may be better met. If, for example, the amount of insurance is \$5000.00 and the insured has chosen to have \$1000.00 paid in one sum at death, the remaining \$4000.00 can then be converted into an annuity certain for five, ten, fifteen or twenty years, or as an annuity for life, guaranteed for five, ten, fifteen or twenty years.

The various plans of payment are mathematically equivalent and the option is given only in order that the needs of the beneficiaries may be better met. If, for example, the amount of insurance is \$5000.00 and the insured has chosen to have \$1000.00 paid in one sum at death, the remaining \$4000.00 can then be converted into an annuity certain for five, ten, fifteen or twenty years, or as an annuity for life, guaranteed for five, ten, fifteen or twenty years.

There is also a "Disability Benefit" clause, where, if the insured becomes totally and permanently disabled he receives the annual payment of one-twentieth of the amount of insurance during life-time and continued disability of the insured, but not exceeding twenty times in all. There is also a "Paid Up Insurance" clause, which the insured may elect to have at any time. Substantial cheques were received from the bride's mother and her brother, Lt. Col. M. C. QUARTERLY SESSION OF PRESBYTERY

Met At Newcastle Last Week
Recommend New In-
spector.

The quarterly meeting of the presbytery of Miramichi was held in St. James Hall, Newcastle on Tuesday, Sept. 14th. In the absence of the moderator, J. H. MacLean, was elected moderator pro tem. Those present included Revs. L. MacLean, W. M. Matthews, Hugh Miller, G. S. Gardner, Dr. E. B. Wythe, A. J. McNeill, F. W. Thompson, G. A. Grant, J. H. A. Anderson, A. D. Archibald, W. Girdwood, B. C. Salter, Thos. Harrison, Alex. McFar, ministers and E. A. McCurdy, elder.

Elders' commissions entitling them to membership in the presbytery for the current year were received and accepted on behalf of Messrs. Robert Hardy of the congregation of New Brunswick, and Messrs. Geo. Henderson, Douglastown and Nelson; David Sadler, St. Andrew's Church, Chatham; John A. McNaughton, Blind River; James E. Miller, Campbellton; George Colthart, Loggieville; and P. A. Forsythe of Redbank and Whitney.

Rev. F. W. Thompson, convenor of the Forward Movement committee gave a supplementary report, and also submitted a resolution, which was adopted endorsing the continuation of the programme of the General Assembly and commending it to the hearty support of the people.

The matter of nominations to vacant offices in the gift of the Assembly was taken up. Rev. A. H. Foster of Oakburn, Man., was nominated as business manager of the Presbyterian Publications, Rev. George S. Gardner, D. D., editor-in-chief of the proposed weekly official church paper in the event of the Witness being merged in the larger periodical. It was decided to make a nomination to the professorship in Robertson College, Edmonton, and the theological college in Saskatoon.

Rev. A. D. Archibald reported on behalf of the committee on public education calling attention to problems in the public school life of the province which must sooner or later reach to the detriment of the community at large.

Rev. W. M. Matthews in discussing the temperance situation in the province called attention to the inadequate organized effort for its betterment. He expressed a desire to see a more aggressive educational policy along these lines inaugurated, especially in view of the approaching referendum on the question of the importation of intoxicating liquors. He moved that a committee on prohibition be appointed to take such action as it might deem wise in the light of the results of the referendum.

The motion was carried and the following committee appointed: Revs. L. H. McLean, convenor, Dr. E. B. Wythe, F. W. Thompson, G. S. Gardner, F. Harrison, G. P. Frazier, G. A. Grant, Hugh Miller, A. D. Archibald and J. H. McLean and Messrs. E. A. McCurdy, John A. McNaughton and W. R. McMillan.

He further moved, seconded by Rev. Thos. Harrison that in view of the approaching vacancy in the chief inspectorship under the Provincial Prohibition Act, the Presbytery of Miramichi beg leave to present to the serious consideration of the Legislature a memorial in Council for the appointment of Dr. E. B. Wythe, minister of St. Andrew's Church, Chatham, as a person admirably qualified to discharge the duties of the office. The motion was carried unanimously. It was further resolved to forward copies of the resolution in full to the Government and the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance.

The committee appointed at last meeting presented recommendations for the record of the Presbytery, including the death of Rev. D. Henderson and J. M. Sutherland honored members of the court for many years. The resolutions were approved.

Rev. Thos. Harrison reported an encouraging visit to the Indian held by special committee of which he was convener. It is hoped that soon an ordained minister will be found for this field.

The clerk handed a specimen Cash Book for use in congregations prepared by David Watson of Saskatchewan and proposed to be an improvement with other churches, religious education, but were deferred for a more definite study to a future meeting.

Several other important matters were taken up such as the roll of ministers for appointment, co-operation with other churches, religious education, but were deferred for a more definite study to a future meeting.


