CUT IN WAGES

Vancouver, Oct. 15.—W. D. Matthews, president of the Canadian Consolidated Mining and Smelting company, traveling on the coast with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, this afternoon gave an interview on the labor condition of the province. One point in particular which attracted the attention of the court was the fact that the defendant, Mr. Woods, desired to call Clark as a witness, but as Clark is at present a defendant and cannot be forced into the witness box, the prosecution suggested the competency of Mr. Clark in the case and the calling of Clark as a witness in it. The difficulty, however, arose that all the other defendants have given their evidence and the court is considering the point of law raised. D. Gourlay, a lumber dealer of Lacombe, was the first witness to appear and was the first witness to depose that he was a member of the Western Retail Lumber Dealers' association. He had been a member since it had spread to the west. He had conversations with some of the members in Winnipeg and elsewhere to the west. He did not keep copies of his correspondence.
