Annual Meeting of the Canadian Pacific.

Good Financial Showing Made by the Company.

The Dundas Land Slide Cut Through Reduction in Freight and Passenger Rates.

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company held in Montreal on Wednesday 343,898 shares were repre-sented. The Board of Directors were reselected, with the exception of R. V. Martinson, in whose place General Samuel Thomas, of New York, was elected. The report for the past year was highly satisfactory, showing:

Gross earnings.....
Working expenses.
Net earnings.....
Fixed charges..... Surplus for the year, after payment 2,230,285

The report attributes the decrease in working expenses to the large expenditure made for improvements during the past few years, and indicates the intention of the directors to continue improvements with a view to the further cheapening of the cost of operation, and expresses the belief that the proportion of working expenses to gross earnings will soon be brought below 55 per cent. The directors in the report express their intention to continue dividends at the rate of 5 per cent., and their belief that there will be no difficulty in maintaining this rate. The bad harvest in the Northwest materially affected traffic for the last half of the year, and earnings had to be made good from traffic of a leaner description than is usually sought by the company. The entire property of the com-The report attributes the decrease in description than is usually sought by the company. The entire property of the company has been well maintained; and the railway has enjoyed remarkable immunity from serious accident, and is the only one of the transcontinental lines that has been entirely free from snow blockades in the mountains. The land sales for the year were 195,160 acres for \$731,194, as against 162,310 acres for \$553,910 in 1888. We have discovered that a great many shippers are in the habit of returning weights of from 25 to 33 per cent. less than the actual amount loaded in the cars, and it is impossible for us to check these in any other way than that above indicated." Under the Interstate Commerce Law of the United States persons so under-billing are liable to a fine of \$5,000, and in addition two years' imprisonment in the penitentiary. In the past the railways accepted the bills of lading on the shipper's assurances, but have lately been finding that there have been serious discrepancies. 
