Renewed Reports of Indian Outrages
-Gen, Miles on His Way to the

Renewed Reports of Indian Outrages—Gen. Miles on His Way to the Scene.

RAPID CITY, S. D., Dec. 9.—A band of Indians from Little Wound's campe is camped ten miles east of the Cheyenne, between the mouths of French and Battle creeks. They have been raiding deserted ranches, killing and running off stock, burned hay and grain and stealing household goods. Yesterday 20 armed men, well mounted, left Rapid City for the Indian camp. They will be joined by a number of ranchmen, and if they are not interrupted by the twoops, will attack the Indians. A special from Custer says that not far from Buffalo Gap, T. M. Warren, a ranchman, with five of his men, attacked a raiding party of Indians and killed four. This story is not verified.

Gen. Miles has received a letter from Buffalo Gaps, dated Dec. 6, which says that on Friday last fifteen Sioux at the entrance to the Bad Lands tried to capture three cowboys, and the ranchmen near the Bad Lands are sending women and children into town. A telegram from the same place, dated Monday, says: "Ranchmen and Indians have had a slight skirmish. The situation is becoming serious, for the settlers are unarmed. Can you supply 50 good rifles and ammunition, so that settlers can derend themselves?" Gen. Miles will leave for the scene of the Indian trouble at once.

PRINCIPLES AND PERSONS. In view of the awakened public feeling or the trade question there is every reason to sion, by the agency of complete reciprocity with the United States, or by a great reduction in the present high rate of taxation, will in the near future triumph.

Stern experience has taught the people of Canada that prosperity cannot be attained by imposing grievous taxes on the country, and by handing over the taxpayers to the tender mercies of a few combines.

Trade freedom has won so many friends that its success seems beyond a peradven-ture if care is taken to prevent the opponents of reciprocity, open or concealed, from weakening its strength by leading the people away on side issues. A few weeks ago no one would have believed that the chief members of the Canadian Government in the Province of Quebec would be supporting unrestricted reciprocity and indors ing an unrestricted reciprocity candidate. ing an unrestricted reciprocity candidate. Such a spectacle in presented in Napier-ville, where a Dominion election is now in progress. What does it all mean? Simply that the movement in favor or unrestricted reciprocity is now so strong that even those who have hitherto opposed it deem it wise to swim with the tide.

Such a confession of weakness by their opponents may well be regarded as the signal for renewed effort on the part of trade emancipators. They must succeed if they avoid tactical errors and side or personal issues. The leaders in the anti-reciprocity movement-those who would fain remain the obedient servants of the combines and continue recipients of the Red Parlor contributions—would like nothing better than a campaign waged on the personal merits or demerits of Sir John Macdonald. It cannot be denied that the Conservative leader—he who represented himself to the assembled combine-manufac turers as the man in the tree who has the power to shake down the apples or with hold the fruit from the hogs—is a man of great personal magnetism. He has a genial, taking manner, and he has pronounced ability. He has many followers who have hitherto voted for him on personal grounds alone. Not a few of these voters can be won over to unrestricted reciprocity, if the great principle is the issue, but they will tick by the old Tory chief if the issue is diverted to personalities.

There is, indeed, too much personal politics in Canada, and representatives of both political parties must be numbered among the transgressors. Little is to be gained by antagonizing the electorate in regard toleading meninthis day. It did not help Mr. Meredith's cause in the late election to have Hon. G. W. 
