Starvation in Mexico.

Zatecas, Mexico, Nov. 4.—The condition of the poorer classes of this city is extremely critical on account of the lack of food. The streets are filled with begars of every age and description. The Government is doing good work in relieving the suffering, but there are several thousand famine-stricken people notwithstanding this aid, and they are actually starving. A number of free eating houses have been established, but the capacity of such places is limited, and instead of free distribution of corn being made among the famine-stricken people here, as is being done in other parts of Mexico, the grain is sold at a fixed price and as these in need are without money to buy they must do without. Many of the poorer people have fled to the mountains where they are living on the prickly pear, maguey plant and messquit bean.

Since the sontiment was stirred up in connection with this matter one director had sold the greater part of his stock at par. He bought at 80 per cent.

A. O. Jeffery and N. W. Rowell, representing the Ontario Loan and Debenture Company, claimed that according to the bylaws the company had every right to make the mortgage in the way in which it was made.

God's in His heaven, All's right with the world.

London, Friday, Nov. 4.

While it is reassuring to learn, from investigations made both at home and abroad, that there is no pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian cattle, and that in all probability cattle shipped from the Dominion may continue to be landed and distributed alive throughout Great Britain, there seems to be a growing impression that no great harm would come to Canada if our cattle were scheduled.

Canadians are allowed to land their cattle alive, yet last year they only exported to Britain 98,000 head, whereas the United States, which is a scheduled country, forced to kill its cattle at landing, sent in 440,000 head.

But it may be claimed that Canadian farmers profit because they are able to send "stockers," or lean cattle, to Britain, while the United States is compelled to fatten the cattle it exports, as they have to be killed on landing. As the ADVERTISER has before now pointed out this is a mistaken idea. It would be better for our farmers to fatten their own "stockers," and replenish the soil of their farms in the operation. It seems an absurdity for the agriculturists of Canada to be shipping hay and coarse grains to Eng-land, and at the same time sending lean land, and at the same time sending tear cattle to the old country to be fod on their own exports. The farmer who does this impoverishes his soil and makes very little out of the transaction, for prices for cattle have been ruinously low for some time. Stockers only bring \$25 a head, and fat cattle are sold at from \$60 to \$70. There is a fair margin to come and go there, when we consider the low price of fodder, to say nothing of the benefits accruing to the land from cattle feed-

At the start he concedes that any foreign critic of a measure of domestic legislation in a country not his own must occupy a delicate position, but his statements are so very fair and candid that the most violent partisan cannot take offense at them. He says he is an ardent well-wisher of the United States, not as a separate nationality, but as the biggest if not the oldest member of the Great British family. He is one of those who desire that the Englishis one of those who desire that the English-speaking races, and especially those who inhabit the British isles, the United States and British North America, shall be joined together—not by the formal bonds of law or treaty, but by every possible tie of com-mon institutions, common feelings, and common interests, as well as by a common history. Therefore, it is that he, in com non with many others, regrets the trade barriers that have been set up, and which injure the nations setting them up as well as the countries disposed to trade with them. Sir Thomas is a believer in the anassailable doctrine that free competition and free intercourse tends to bring out the special capacities of both parties to a trade, and he expresses the conviction that though the natural advantages of the American continent may give its inhabi-American continent may give its inhabitants larger prospects in certain industries,
there will be others in which the inhabitants
of the old country will not be behind." In
this connection, Sir Thomas points out the
evil effects of trade quarrels between Canada and the United States. This representative Englishman looks with disfavor upon any attempt of Canada to seek an exclusive trade
relations with England and he points
out that it has signally failed. "It tound
no favor even with Lord Salisbury's Govno favor even with Lord Salisbury's Government; and, at a recent meeting of the British Chambers of Commerce of the empire held in London under the presi-dency of Sir John Lubbock, a motion by Sir Charles Tupper in favor of such a policy was decisively rejected and a motion in favor of a non-protective policy was carried. To accept such a policy, Sir Thomas asserts, would be suicidal and fatal to Britain's commercial interests. "What is even more important," he adds, "it would be fatal to the future relations between Canada and the mother country and between both of them and the United States; for Canada is des-tined by nature and by geography to trade with the United States, and any

Sir Thomas strongly advocates the estab-lishment of unrestricted trade between Canada, the United States and Great

Isshment of unrestricted trade between Canada, the United States and Great Britain. In conclusion he says:

"No nation stands alone. Those who have upheld the standard of free trade through its darkest hours as good not for England only, but for all countries, must rejoice at the possible converson to the true faith of that great country, which already practices within its own borders a system of free trade wider than the world has ever known elsewhere; which, as it has led the way of the nations in apostasy from the true faith, will no doubt also lead the way in a return to that faith; and which, by such a course, would not only solve the Canadian difficulty and unite by ties of growing commercial interest the whole English-speaking populations both of North America and of the United Kingdom, but would also set an example which the English-speaking communities of the other hemisphere and the foreign nations of Europe must sooner or later follow."

The Education Committee of the Toronto Trades and Labor Council take exception, in the recent report, to the tendency to an excessive amount of military drill which is observable in the public schools of the city. The committee ask, not without force, "What are we sending our children to school for? Is it to make soldiers of them or to give them an education?" The reply will of course be that the military drill is a very healthful exercise, that it corrects faults in walk and carriage, gives erectness to the figure and grace to the movements, is a valuable aid to discipline by forming habits of prompt obedience to authority, etc. This is all very true, but it does not meet the objection. From the point of view of many of the best of citizens it would be better that their children should walk with stooping shoulders and awkward gait all their lives than that they should be trained up to regard the military life as the ideal life and the professional soldier as the ideal life and the professional soldier as the ideal hero. The ideas of the age are changing in regard to such points, and the laboring classes, who have always to do the chief part of the fighting, and to bear in their persons and families the brunt of the hardship and suffering which war entails, are becoming wiser. They are coming to see that the war is oftener are coming to see that the war is oftener the result of the existence of the army than the army the outcome of a necessity for national defense. But does it by any means follow that all the physical and, if you please, meral benefits of the drill cannot be had without reference to the military idea? The objectionable thing is not the forming, or marching, or other movements, but the continual holding-up of military ideals to fire the young imaginations. No thoughtful person can doubt that the seeds of the military passion thus implanted in the school have very much to do with forming the national character and begetting actual war in the future. Unhappily there are some who deem an occasional war a necessity to the manhood of a nation, and their ideas seem to have taken hold of those who have the management of our city schools. We commend the subject to the thoughtful consideration of our readers.


