Harry Elliott, of Bayfield, Held for Shooting His Brother.

to Murder in the First Degree -The Guldensuppe Case Postponed-Durrant Resentenced.

Bayfield, Nov. 11.-The developments in the Bayfield tragedy are so far not very clear. Yesterday was taken up with the coroner's inquest, many witnesses being examined, but only one person. Thomas Clarke, was able to give a clear report of what took place. Clarke said he was at King's store about ten o'clock Monday evening. He heard loud talking in front of the hotel, and walked across. He noticed the mother and sister trying to get Harvey into the house, but they could not do so. Someone was holding Harvey, while Fred was standing on the platform, with a reverver in his hand, carrying his arm by his side. Fred remarked that he would shoot Harvey if they did not take him away. Harvey replied that he was not afraid of being shot. Harvey then got free from his captors, and, throwing off his overcoat, made a rush at Fred, who fired at Harvey, who \$115,000 per annum. 





The spirit for service was given to the architects of the tabernacle on the old dispensation (Exodus, xxxi.) whatever was the stage of their sanctification personally, and even to Baalam, unsanctified though he was. The case of some of the judges is also in point. Moreover the history of the church furnishes many instances of spirit-endowed men for service who were in nowise noted for their personal sanctification. The personal sanctifi-

cation of the apostles did not take such an immense bound at Pentecost as some would have to conclude from their theories. The full effect of the spirit for service may come as suddenly as on Pentecost, or as upon Samson of old, but the effects of the working of the spirit for sanctification are always gradual as the growth of the grass. This latter must necessarily be so, for the individual believer is a co-worker, and as a moral agent, must make frequent choice on his way

to final victory. Since the compilation of the N. T. canon we cannot legitimately expect such "gifts" for service, as some of the ordinary Christians of old obtained We have sufficient guidance in the written word, and should "meditate on these things," and seek the spirit to make us believe more thoroughly, and realize more spiritually and intensely, both for service and sanctification, the truths there set forth, rather than expect by the spirit's aid to be spared the necessity of patient, intelligent study of what has been revealed for our guidance, and spared also the selfdenial, daily cross-bearing, and watchfulness, needful as co-workers in our personal sanctification. Price of School Books.

In a recent address, Hon. George W. Ross, Minister of Education, pointed out how little ground there was for the attack on the department on the score of text books. He showed the average yearly cost per pupil for a complete set of text books was only 19 2-5 cents. In Toronto, where the board purchased the books for the children, the average | majority of 54. At next general eleccost is only 18 cents per pupil. When Mr. Ross took control of the Education Department, soon after the retirement of Dr. Ryerson from the chief superintendency of the schools, he found that there were eleven different grammars. nine geographies, four arithmetics and five histories. Now there are only one of each. In former times, a parent moving from one school section to another was liable to find it necessary to purchase an entirely new set of text books for each of his children. Now a book good in one section of the Province is good for the same grade in any other part. There were, 20 years ago, 131 text books in the high schools of Ontario; now there are only 25. Of these 101 were foreign, and only 10 were Canadian. Now only two are coreign, and the Minister hopes soon o supersede them with Canadian pubtications.

Bitter political opponents of Mr.Ross conceal these facts, and endeavor to tir up discontent among the people by insinuating, what they dare not openly harge, that the Minister has not honestly managed his department. But they cannot controvert the official recurns, which speak volumes for the efficiency of management and the beneficial effects of intelligent control.

Our schools books are better in makeup and cheaper in price than are the school books in use in Great Britain and the United States, as has again and again been proved.

The Toronto Sentinel has discovered that Richard Croker, the notorious boss of Tammany Hall, is the son of an Orangeman. He was born near Cork, in Ireland, Nov. 24, 1843, and emigrated to America with his parents in 1846. His father was a blacksmith.

There is often an outery by taxpayers against providing free education in the high schools and collegiate institutes, but in the majority of the boards, when it comes to a vote, it is found that there is a decided opposition to collection of fees.

#### Why Should London Not Be a Great Meat Shipping Point?

Mr. John I. Hobson, president of the Dominion Cattle Breeders' Association, who has just returned from a visit to Great Britain, was interviewed by a representative of the Mail and Empire. He made an important statement as to the future of the Canadian cattle trade. Mr. Hobson says that the price at which the Australians can market mutton in Great Britain, is such that there is not a bright outlook for our sheep in the old country; but he holds decidedly to the opinion that there is a good market for Canadian beef if the right quality of meat is sent over. English consumers, it appears, have acquired a liking for the very best of American hindquarters of beef. The quality suits them, and the supply is unintercupted. The difficulties in the way of creating a demand for Canadian beef are the irregularity in supplying a really good article, and a want of uniformity in the quality. Every Englishman who has investigated the matter nas found that there is no better beef to be found anywhere than the best Canadian; but the retailer cannot be Induced to work up a trade in it unless he is satisfied that he can get a continuous supply. Here, then, is the problem for Canadian cattle raisers and shippers. They must produce well bred and well finished animals, and in this regard Mr. Hobson says they have in the past been neglectful. He calls attention to a fact which The Advertiser has before now emphasized-that tens of thousands of Canadian cattle have been sold every year to United States buyers, who have finished them and shipped them to the English market. either alive, or cut up and dressed, netting handsome profits, that would have gone into the pockets of Canadians if they had been similarly enterprising. In England they do not use meat freshly slaughtered, as we do. They prefer it after it has been in a cold storage department for about eight or ten days. Thus it is proved that we have the cattle, the best products with which to feed them, ample facilities for shipment, and the best customers in the world ready to buy. What more is needed? London's New Sewers.

participated in the inspection of the new sewers for London yesterday, in company with the mayor, president of the Board of Trade, chairman of the Board of Health, chairman of the special committee charged with the construction of the sewers, aldermen, engineers. and citizens. Two hours and a half were well spent in examination of the works in progress of construction, in experimenting with those sections of the new sewerage system that are already in shape, and in having questions answered by the engineers. It was so much simpler a process of receiving information understandable by a layman than the usual method of examinaing plans, reading specifications, looking wise and indorsing or kicking, as humor prompted. I had. previously listened to a good deal of talk by men who had taken no means to understand the system, and who were swayed by some unaccountable prejudice into the belief that it would prove inadequate, and cost far more money than the people voted, but the result of yesterday's inspection was to confirm the belief that the condemnation was undeserved. These facts were demonstrated yesterday:

The construction of the entire system, judging by the contracts already completed, or in progress, will cost less than the original es-

To satisfy some doubting ones in the northern part of the city, the size of the sewers in that division has been increased, though the engineers staked their professional reputation that as originally provided for the sewer was big en-

Ample provision is made for disposing of overflow water in time of storm before it reaches the main sewer beyond the new bridge at the foot of King street.

There will be no difficulty in draining the cellars. Even on the line of Carling's Creek the new sewer is a number of feet below the

bed of the stream. The flushing of the sewers will be systematically gone about, and the most effective work will be done with the least expenditure of water. On the sewer running near Carling's Creek, provision will be made for using the water from that stream, as necessity requires, for flushing purposes, thereby saving

city water. It was a striking commentary on the clearness of Engineer Chipman's explanations, and on the thoroughness of the manner in which the special committee, with Ald. Parnell as chairman, have done their work, that all the gentlemen in attendance, without exception, took occasion to express entire satisfaction with the system. "It could not be bettered, and was certainly required, if the city was to go ahead and maintain its reputation," said Mr. John Christie to me. Ald. Cooper had been somewhat skeptical as to the effectiveness of the system, but before the party separated, he, too, added his entire approval of it, and of the way in which the work was being executed. Mr. A. B. Greer, president of the Board of Trade, was equally emphatic in his declaration that the decree of the people, as voiced in their vote that an effective system of sewerage should be provided, was being carried out most efficiently. The only regret was that Ald. Carrothers was not present to receive more light. If he had been, I doubt not that he would have joined with his colleague, Ald.Cooper, in saying that the work, as empleted, and the explanations regarding the sewers yet to be laid, were entirely satisfactory. When the system is finished, in the near future, there is no reason to doubt. it will be the best in the Dominion. and provided at a comparatively

small cost, when one considers the difficulties that had to be faced in order to get proper levels. There has been a good deal of talk about the pay of the men employed in the sewers. We saw men working in a narrow cutting, nearly 30 feet deep, and found on one or two blocks the depth was 38 feet, a large portion being through sand. The men who work in a ditch of this description desire good pay, for their task is a dangerous and disagreeable one. So far no one has been seriously injured on the work. Let us hope that this record may be maintained to the end.

## Canadians and Their Neighbors.

Gossip About the Visit of Mr. Wilfrid Laurier to Washington.

The British Government Anxious to Have Cordial Relations Between the Dominion and the

States.

SEE THE PRESIDENT. Washington, D. C., Nov. 11.-Sir Wilid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies and Prof. d'Arcy Thompson, the British sealing expert, were officially received by President McKinley at the White House yesterday. They were first escorted to the state department by Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British ambassador, and presented to Secretary Sher-After a short exchange of courtesies, the party, led by the venerable premier of the administration, proceeded to the executive mansion, and were at once ushered into the presence of the president. The reception took place in the blue parlor, where all official functions are observed. Although formal, it was almost entirely devoid of ceremony, and was devoted to a general conversation suitable to such an occasion. The interview lasted only about a quarter of an hour, and was marked by the most cordial relations. No attempt was made at a serious discussion of the important questions between the two countries, that being deferred to a more opportune time.

SIR WILFRID RECEIVES CALLERS. The Canadian premier received callers in very democratic fashion at his apartments in the Shoreham, but to all manifestly premature at this stage for him to discuss the outlook on the Bering Sea question, or any other subject they would give their exclusive atten- axe handle. He then fled. ct until some conclusion was reached, and that other quesns, such as reciprocity, border immigration, etc., would not be referred to until the first purpose of the visit was accomplished. Gen. Foster called on the premier early in the day, and later Sir Wilfrid and Sir Louis Davies called in the British ambassador, Sir Julian Pauncefote, who accompanied them in a call on Secretary Sherman.

THE EXPERTS MEET. In accordance with the arrangement made in the morning experts representing the three governments-England, Canada and the United Statesassembled at the state department at 2:30 in the afternoon. They were Messrs. Jordan, Thompson, and Macoun. In addition, Gen. Foster and Mr. Hamlin werein attendance for the United States and Sir Louis Davies for Canada. Sin Julian Pauncefote sent a note excusing himself from coming on account of illnesss. The meeting lasted for about an hour, and presumably the proceedings were mainly preliminary, and designed to outline a plan of procedure. Mr. Hamlin was elected chairman. It was officially stated that the proceedings were secret, in the sense that nothing could be given out for publication before the end of the deliberations.

MR. FIELDING'S VIEW. A cable from London says: Hon. W. S. Fielding, Canadian finance minister, when questioned regarding the visit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir L.H.Davies to Washington, said he was not sur-prised. If the Washington statesmen showed an earnest desire to remove the trade and other obstacles to neighborly relations between Canada and the United States, the Canadian ministry would gladly co-operate. That attitude had always been their policy in the interests of the empire, as well as of Can-

TARIFF EQUALITY.

New York, Nov. 11.-A special cable to the Evening Post from London says: In view of the visit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir L. Davies to Washington, it is understood that Mr. Chamberlain forwarded to Lord Aberdeen last week important recommendations on the future trade relations between Canada and the United States from the imperial point of view. Though Mr. Chamberlain has abandoned his zollverein schemes, he would view with keen disappointment and grave forebodings the ultimate effect of the English attitude towards the Dominion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's acceptance of any such trade agreements with the States as Mr. Blaine once proposed, involving discrimination against England, Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself and Mr. Fielding, Canada's minister of finance, who is now visiting London, have given definite assurances that Canada never would consent to such discrimination. They have not, however, disguised the fact that if the United States showed a neighborly attitude towards Canada on outstanding trade and other questions, they would go a long way to meet Washington advances, short of

A REPUBLICAN PROPOSAL. Buffalo, Nov. 11.-The Buffalo Express (Republican) referring to the present conference at Washington, expresses a strong desire for closer trade lations between Canada and the United States. It says: "It is the wish of the great majority of people on this side of the line to cultivate neighborly relations with the population to the north. Our protective policy is not based on feelings of hostility toward any nation, and least of all toward Canada. It simply looks steadily at our own interests, as should the commer-




