Dispatches reaching London today assert that the Germans have not abandoned hope of reaching Calais, and are planning a new offensive in Belgium and Northern France. According to these advices, train after train loaded with troops is moving into Flanders. With the touch so often added heretofore on the occasion of any approaching holiday or anniversary, these dispatches say that the German soldiers hope to present Calais to Emperor William for a birthday present.

Only a small fraction of the British military writers profess to see in the German advance at Soissons any new threat to Paris.

Attack on Egypt.

They pay more attention, however, to the cumulative indications that the Turks have determined to attempt an invasion of Egypt. The general feeling is that any such raid could be checked, as the Turks would have to reckon with not only the British troops but with warships, which will be able to share in the work of opposing the invaders, operating in the Suez Canal off Akabah, Arabia and at other points. SWEEPING CHARGE Barbed Wire Entanglements Fail To Stop Canadians, Who Clear Germans Out of Treaches at Bayanet's Point.

[Special Cable to The London Advertiser and Montreal Stars by Roland Hill, in France.]

Northern France, Friday night, Jan. 15 .- Via London.-From two wounded British soldiers, one a sergeant in a Welsh regiment and the other a private in the Staffordshires, neither one of whom had come into contact with the other. I learn that the Patricias have again been in a glorious action during the last two days.

They have assisted in repulsing a heavy German attack northeast of Bethune and have played an heroic part in a counter-attack against the main German trenches. which were captured after a splendid bayonet charge and which are now held by them and their brother regiments.

FIRST REALLY SERIOUS ACTIONS. The narratives of the two soldiers, when pieced together, make a circumstantial story of the first really serious action in which the Canadians participated. For several days the Canadians have occupied a village near Bethune which was formerly held by the Indian troops. The latter had been sent south for a rest after strenuous fighting in which, although constant attacks by the Germans had been repulsed, no ground had been gained by the

Alies for several weeks. DEAD LEFT UNBURIED.

The main trenches, so the sergeant fold me, were slightly over one thousand yards apart and so deadly was the space between that the Germans had never recovered their dead, which lay like frozen hillocks within two hundred yards of the British trenches.

On Wednesday afternoon there was a terrific artillery attack on our line which seemed to forecast that an assault would be made that night, but the weather, although bitterly cold, was exceptionally clear and the Germans apparently abandoned this plan.

DECIDE TO BE AGGRESSORS. The British had prepared for an attack by concentrating several regiments, of which the Patricias was one, and on reports coming in that a drain seemed to have been made on the enemy's line to assist another attack further south, it was decided at least to make a reconnaissance in

Under heavy artillery fire at daybreak, in which one particularly obnoxious German battery was put out of action, the Pats and their support reached a partly-destroyed trench which the Indians had once captured and found themselves unable to hold. MINE FIELD DESTROYED.

The engineers fortunately found a part of a German

mine field which they exploded without loss. The attackers were then only about three hundred yards from the advanced German trenches, but between them and their quarry were strong barbed wire entanglements and much marshy ground. Our artillery found excellent range and with terrific fire made a way through. "FIX BAYONETS AND CHARGE."

It was seen that most of the German gerenders had fallen back to main position and order was given to fix bayonets and charge. Although the attack was in command of the senior officer of an English regiment, the place of honor on the right flank was royally given to the Patricias, who managed to get a machine gun into an enfilading position and backed their advantage up with

Their charge carried them actually into the German trench. The other regiments meanwhile had also gained shelter and remaining Germans were either killed or cap-

The total casualties were slight considering the tremendous advantage gained.

The Patricias, according to one of my informants, lost three killed and a score wounded. The latter, according to a high British medical officer whom I questioned. would as a compliment to Canada be sent down to the Canadian hospital at Letoquet. It is impossible to get the names of the killed as arrangements have been made to cable all Canadian casualties direct to Ottawa, where they will be given out officially by the militia department.

Orders Given Do Not Allow Them To Be Worked or Annoyed.

Washington, Jan. 16.-Regulations of the Russian war office as to prisoners of Petrograd Novos Vremys, a translation of which the Russian embasey here is

sued today are as follows: "As lawful defenders of their country, prisoners of war must be humanely.

"Under no cficumatances shall they be restrained from worship according to their own faith, the sole condition being that it shall not interfere with war regulations.

"The belongings of prisoners of wer, with the exception of weapons, horses and war papers, shall remain untouched. "Every prisoner of war is required to reveal his real name and rank. "Commanders of military districts who have prisoners of war in charge are required to exercise care that such prisoners are not insulted or persecuted,

and that they are given every possible comfort and attention. "Persons to whose care prisoners of war are intrusted are strictly forbidden to put such priseners to work for them "In the quarters assigned to them orisoners of war will wear regulation clothing, but without distinction of rank. Things needed new so far as possible will be issued to them by the com-



That he should leave office at a time when Russian armies had over-run a large part of the dual monarchy was not expected, and is undoubtedly significant. His resignation and the aphim followed a protest made to the Austrian Emperor by prominent Hun-garian people against the lack of protection accorded the eastern section of the monarchy. The Hungarians threat-ened to join with the country's enemy, ter promises to make it one of his first duties to visit the Emperor of Germany. Possibly related to the Hungarian protest was the announcement that during the middle of February a Prussian army of half a million men would push southeast through Austria and Hungary and attack the Servians with whom the Austrians have been unable to cope so far. This announcement may also have resulted from the in-vasion of Hungary by the Russians. The Muscovites are on the border of Transylvania and by the middle February may have joined with Servians and Montenegrins, while if Roumania is then on the side of the Allies a half million Prussians are likely to feel lonesome so far from home. At any rate Russia has the whip hand in eastern Hungary, and if Roumania makes a move it must be in behalf of the Triple Entente in order to be of any benefit to herself.

WHEAT DROPS FIVE CENTS. that a congressional movement was on foot to prohibit exports. May wheat, which closed at \$1 45 yesterday, sold down to \$1 40.

Chicago, Jan. 16.—Selling out of immense quantities of wheat today smashed prices 5c a bushel. The extraordinary drop in values directly followed amouncements that an effort would be made to bring about through Congress an official embargo on exports of wheat from the United States. Much of the selling was of a stop-loss character. The paralysis of demand was at times so complete that it was imposssible to execute orders. It was not long before strong firms took a hand at buying, and there was a reaction of 2%c. Sensational weakness in wheat did not develop at the outset. Opening prices were at a moderate setback of %c to 1%c. The crumbling of quotations, when it did start, however, showed a swiftness seldom equalled.

however, showed a swiftness seldom equalled.

Winnipeg, Jan, 15.—New high records were made on all grades of wheat today. Wheat creates new records daily, almost hourly, as values keep on creeping upward on all important transactions. Shortly after midday May wheat sold at \$1.42%; July was \$1.43% bid. Oats and flax have also entered the lists for record breaking, May selling at 60c; May flax sold at \$1.74%, which it claimed, make high records for these grains for some years.

Exporting houses state that all offers for export are accepted; and will inquiries come for more. The demand by foreigners apparently is without a limit, and the question is to procure wheat, despite the price that may be asked for if. Heavy sales have been made for May and June delivery. The cash situation is getting out of the rut to some extent.

One trader sold today over 200,000 bushels of the various grains, and grades for opening of navigation, and he reports offerings in this line are being put on the market more freely.

Total inspections on Thursday were lab cars, as against 275 cars last year, and in sight today were 120 cars.






