

35 MINERS PERISH WHEN FIRE BLOCKS THE WAY OF ESCAPE IN MONTANA MINE

Heavy Loss of Life by Blaze in Spectacular Pit.

Butte, Mont., June 9.-At least 33 men are dead and 167 others missing fire in the Spectacular Copper Mine.

The fire broke out in the lowe levels of the mine late last night, starting from a broken power cable that carried electricity to the under ground pumps. Lower levels of the mine quickly filled with smoke and

Enemy's Defence System Penetrated for Depth of Half Mile on a Two-Mile Front Early This Morning---Furious Counter Assaults Fail To Loosen Grip of Tommies on Belgium Gains.

London, June 9, 2:46 p.m.—The British attacked last night south of the Souchez river and entered the German positions on a front of more than two miles, the war office announces. The German line was penetrated to a depth of more than half a mile. Heavy casualties were inflicted on the Germans.

The attack extended north of the river. The statement says operations were carried on with complete success on a wide front from south of Lens to La

The Germans made a powerful counter-attack last night over nearly the whole length of the new front. They were repulsed completely, the British retaining all the ground captured.

MANY GERMANS KILLED.

'The enemy's trenches were also entered successfully north of the Souchez River, southeast of Loos and south west of La Bassee. Large numbers of Germans were killed. and great damage was done the enemy's defences. A further 44 prisoners, including three officers, and several machine guns were taken by us.

'The sector of the Hindenburg line still held by the enemy west of Bullecourt was raided by our troops last night and a number of the hostile garrison were killed or taken prisoners."

COUNTER-ATTACKS REPULSED.

The statement follows: 'At 7 p.m. yesterday evening, after heavy artillery preparation, the enemy unched a powerful counter-attack against nearly the whole of our new front ith of Ypres, from St. Yves to the north of the Ypres-Comines Canal, a disance of about six miles. The attack was delivered with large forces, com-osed of fresh divisions brought up from the enemy's reserves. Owing to the destructive fire of our artillery and machine guns it was completely repulsed

FIERCE FIGHTING. The fighting was particularly flerce east of Messines and also in the neigh orhood of Klein Zillebeke, north of the canal. By midnight the enemy's attacks had broken down with great loss all along the line. Our troops retained pos-session of the whole ground captured by us since the commencement of the

ATTACKS BEATEN OFF. British Headquarters in France, June 9-Via London.-The Associated

With their overwhelming weight of massed guns and in hand-to-hand fighting at some points the British have beaten off all German counter-attacks upon their newly-won positions beyond the Messines Ridge. Prussian and Baarian troops, driven forward under a storm of fire poured upon the dvanced British battery positions, suffered frightfully. As this dispatch is written, they had succeeded in recapturing and holding only one British post, at Kleinzillebeke, which had been pushed well forward of the consolidated main British line.

Beaten back in the centre, the Germans apparently have massed towards the flanks of the front on which the British advanced. They attempted several times to organize heavy counter-attacks in the direction of Warneton, but the British guns upset their plans.

THE GERMAN STATEMENT.

WHITE PLAGUE KILLS Will Cost \$150,000. At the dinner, Sir Adam Beck reviewed the history of the sanatorium, tracing its growth. The need of providing accommodation for 150 soldiers was dwelt on. The new building would cost \$150,000 when completed and furnished. 




