# Haig Opens Attack at Early Hour Today on Teuton Lines To Northwest of St. Quentin

SERBS ADVANCE OVER NINE MILES EAST OF MONASTIR

Germany's Great Offensive That Was Opened on March 21 Last Has Gradually Been Turned From Success Into Utter Defeat by Brilliant Work of Allied Forces.

New York, Sept. 21.—The following war review of the past six months is issued today by the Associated Press:
Six months ago today the great German offensive began. For weeks victory seemed about to perch on the German banners. Today, the Allied star is in the ascendancy.

Anxiety and encouragement, decision and joy, have succeeded each other since at dawn on March 21 the greatest battle of history began. It has been a period of almost incessant fighting and of bewildering changes in the situations that developed from day to day and from week to week.

The Allies knew it faced Germany's mightlest effort last March, but it stood unafraid. Released by the absolute collapse of Russia as a belligerent, vast numbers of German veterans had been rushed to the western front and been given intensive training for the offensive, by which the Teutonic warllords dreamed that they might force on the world a German peace. Germany made no secret of her intention. It

# BOMBARDMENT OF METZ A SURPRISE TO INHABITANTS

German Newspaper Claims Out of 48,000 Electors, Less That There Was No Panic in the City.

Geneva, Friday, Sept. 20.—"The bombardment of Metz by American heavy artillery caused surprise, but no pante," says the Metzer Zeitung, "the enemy merely copying the method of the German bombardments of Paris." The paper adds that few persons were killed, and the damage was insignificant. It is learned from Basle, however, that the American bombardment of Metz caused an enormous sensation in Germany. Many of the inhabitants have left the fortress, but neutrals are prohibited from departing. It is the first time since 1870 that Metz has been under artillery fire.

# TWO ENEMY SHIPS SUNK IN THE DWINA

Entente Naval Units Inflict a Vessel Struck by Two Mis-Heavy Loss On Foe.

London, Sept. 21.—Entente naval units and Allied troops operating along the River Dwina, in northern European Russia, have sunk two enemy ships and have captured three guns, according to an official statement issued by the British war office today. Heavy losses were inflicted by the Bolshevik forces by the Entente Allies.

Winnipeg, Sept. 21.—By an over-whelming majority, the electors of Winnipeg voted yesterday for the abolition of the board of control. Of abolition of the board of control. Of the 4,330 citizens who recorded their votes, 3,645 desired the abolition of the board; 653 sought its retention, and 34 ballots were spoiled. Out of a total of approximately 48,000 electors, only 4,339 were sufficiently interested in the result of the referendum to cast their ballot.







The rate calls for a charge of 4½ cents per hundred feet for floor space.
This is an increase of 50 per cent of the city rate, which is 3 per cent. The rate per k.w. hour will be the same.
2 cents. This will mean that the minimum charge for Broughdale will be about 60 cents net, instead of 45 cents in the city.

The Broughdale lines were taken over by the hydro-electric commission after the London Electric retired from the field. Power is supplied through the city stations.







# PERSHING'S ARMY'S FIRST "SHOW" GOOD AUGURY FOR FUTURE

America's Task Will Not Be Completed Till Metz, Strassburg and Alsace-Lorraine Have Been Restored to France -Simonds Confidently Predicts Accomplishment of All These Objectives and Mo re in 1919.

# By Frank H. Simonds

Author of "The Great War," "They Shall Not Pass."

New York, Sept. 20 .- In American history hereafter, in the history of the World War, September 12 and 13, 1918, will have a very real significance. On these days the United States began her actual participation in the European struggle as a full grown ally. The date corresponds to July 1, 1916, in the history of the new British army, the date on which Haig began the Battle of the Somme. America's beginning was made away out at the other end of the line and the objective was St. Mihiel salient, which for four years had faced the Allies and in that time had become one of the really permanent landmarks in the whole front from the sea to Switzerland.

The Battle of St. Mihiel, for thus it is bound to be known, has three aspects: We must view it in relation to the larger strategy of Foch, and thus as a detail in the main campaign against Ludendorff, comparable with the various thrusts of Rawlinson, Horne, Byng, Mangin, in the other sectors; we must view it as a whole in itself, so far as the local field of operations was concerned; and, lastly, we must examine it as the expression in fighting terms of the meaning of the new American army, now graduated from necessary but not less irksome leading strings and making its bow upon the platform of the world struggle.



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



# THE EFFICIENCY OF BRITAIN.

TYTHEN THE WAR was in its early stage Lloyd George made the statement: "Our resources will continue to grow. We shall become stronger in numbers, better provided with cannon and munitions, better supplied with the necessaries of life, more and more powerful financially, while at the same time the resources of our enemy will decrease." That statement has been fulfilled to the letter and the rest of the world, sometimes inclined to think in the pre-war period that Britain was losing ground, has been shown that in her people there rested latent an efficiency, or rather a reserve of efficiency, that only a great emergency was needed to bring out. In the newer lands we have made a sort of religion of "punch," to use a very expressive word. We have demanded that preachers have punch, that newspapers have punch, that business and education and amusements have this quality more or less indescribable that sometimes covers such a multitude of shortcomings. For the preacher with punch may hide shallowness of thought under flow of words, and militarism finally destroyed. the salesman with punch may be more anxious to make the immediate sale than to think of the future trade, and the educationist with punch may make showy graduates who fall by the wayside as soon as they get into the active world. 


We haven't been saying too much about them all summer, but now that this year's crop is a reality, it is high time to begin talking potatoes again. The crop is a fair one. The war gardens have helped considerably and few homes this year will be without some potatoes of their own growing. The farm houses will have the usual large quantity to put down in the cellar for winter use.

The farmers' wives do not have far to look for substitutes for what flour for use in bread-making while they have plenty of potatoes left over from dinner. They can be used with flour up to a 50 per cent proportion. The oven should not be too hot when baking bread with potatoes, and the large natural moisture content of the tuber should be taken into account in preparing the sponge.

# BLOW STRUCK BY ALLENBY IN THE HOLY LAND RESULTS IN CAPTURE OF 3,000 TURKS

British Troops Break Through Enemy Positions On Front of Sixteen Miles-Serbs and French Compel Bulgarians To Evacuate a Front Seventy Miles in Length.

LONDON, Sept. 20.—British forces in Palestine, under command of General Ailenby, attacked the Turkish positions on a front of sixteen miles on September 19. The British broke through the Turkish lines between Rafat and the sea, and pushed forward for a distance of twelve miles.

Over three thousand Turks were taken prisoner by General Allenby's forces.

The main Turkish forces in Palestine are now being closely pursued by the British. The cavalry pushed through the Turkish front and was advancing in the rear of the Turkish armies in the direction of Nablus. Another body of cavalry was advancing in an easterly direc-

tion toward Elafula and Beisan to intercept the Turks to the On Wednesday General Allenby's right wing attacked west of the Jordan and occupied El Mugeir.

El Mugeir is the junction of several roads and its capture will prevent the Turks from escaping eastward. There are 18,000 Turks on the west and 8,000 on the east. General Allenby now is behind the main Turkish force west of the Jordan, which will have difficulty in extricating itself, especially as the Arabs have cut the Redjas railway, east of Lake Tiberius.

Dispatches from Macedonia tell of further important victories over the Bulgarians by the Serbians in the Cerna river region, and the Greeks and British south of Lake Doiran. The Bulgarians are reported to have evacuated a front 70 miles long and 30 miles deep, with a loss of 10,000 prisoners.

On the western (France) front, Scottish troops Friday morning finally overcame the resistance of the Germans still in the village of Moeuvres, west of Cambrai, where there has been much violent fighting recently, and completely captured the village, according to Field Marshal Haig's communication tonight.
