The west has none, and yet it is here that the great part of the population of the province is located. Queen's University at Kingston is Sir James Whitney's alma mater. The Medical School has not the funds to run an institution like that. It is for the public benefit, and consequently we think that the province should support it. 

COOKING RECIPES

Coffee Custard.

Put one-half cup ground coffee in a little muslin bag and drop into four cups of cold milk. Let stand twenty minutes, then put into the double boiler until it reaches the scalding point. Cook five minutes; then remove the bag and pour the hot milk over four beaten eggs and four heaping tablespoonfuls of sugar. Pour into hot water in the oven, or, if preferred, until it thickens, strain and set aside to cool.

Sorrel Soup. This is one of the delicacies of the early spring; its slightly acid flavor making it particularly appetizing. To make it, wash thoroughly a pint of sorrel leaves and put in a saucepan with two tablespoonfuls butter, four or five of the large outside lettuce leaves, a sliced onion, and a few small sprigs of parsley. Toss over the fire for a few moments, then sift into the pan two tablespoonfuls of flour and stir until blended with the butter remaining Transfer to the soup kettle and pour in gradually, stirring all the time, three quarts of boiling water. Cook gently for 15 or 20 minutes, then add a cupful of mashed potato, and one of hot milk. Season with salt, pepper and a little nutmeg. Have in the soup tureen some croutons of bread toasted brown. pour the hot soup over them and serve The sorrel should be cut in fine pieces before cooking.

Some Good Custard. To make a chocolate custard grate a little chocolate over the tops of custards just as they are ready to go into the oven to bake. This forms a crisp coating, which looks pretty, and adds much to the flavor for those who are fond of chocolate. Orange custard needs the grated yellow rind of an orange with a little of the juice. Cocoanut custard is made by sprinkling freshly grated cocoanut into buttered and lightly sugared cups before turning in the plain custard. Flavor with orange rind or vanilla. When baked turn out and serve with sweetened whipped cream.



COAST BOXING IS DECIDEDLY SHAKEY

Death of McCarthy in Go With Moran May Affect Jeff-Johnson Battle.

STORMOFPROTESTRAISED

British Lad Denounces Promoters of Fight and Declares Bout a Frame-Up.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

San Francisco, May 2.- Due to the death of Tommy McCarthy, the 'Frisco lightweight, today the boxing game is in a precarious position, and one from which it is not likely to recover.

McCarthy died early Saturday as the result of a blow received in the sixteenth round of his encounter with Owen Moran, the English lightweight. The accident has caused a cloud of gloom to sweep over the city, and protests have sprung up all along the coast against the holding of the Jeffries-Johnson battle at Emeryville on

Sports Are Worrying.
Aside from the death of the young pugilist, the effect it may have upon the big fight of the heavies was the chief topic of discussion, but on all sides it seemed to be the opinion that the battle would take place just the same. The fatal accident may be the cause of clamping down the lift in 'Frisco proper, but the Jeffries-John-son battle will be staged under state laws, and there is little likelihood of these being changed at present.

The district attorney and sheriff of Alameda County, the site of the Jeff Johnson battle, also expressed them-selves as not believing that the death will affect the heavyweight battle.

Arraigned and Gives Bail. Moran is now on bail, having been arrested and arraigned on a charge of manslaughter. With him, arraigned on the same charge, were Jeff Perry and James Carroll, seconds: William and John McCarthy, seconds and brothers of the dead fighter, and Bernard Painter, another of McCarthy's seconds. When the principals and seconds were arraigned before Police Judge Conlan, Willie and John McCarthy were released on their own recog-nizance, while the others were held on \$500 bond each, or \$100 cash bail All furnished bonds.



BUTTER EASIER; EGGS ARE FIRM

London Market Today Was a Decidedly Quiet One in All Lines.

WHEAT DOWN TO \$1.00

lay Deliveries Were Below the Average-Very Little Poultry Is Coming In These Days.

It was as cold as a March day on the barket this morning, and quietness pre-zailed in every line. There were only two or three people the dairy hall offering butter and eggs, at the tone of the sales was to the effect that eggs are practically the same, while butter is considerably easier.

Not a great deal of butter was offered, but 26c and 27c were the ruling figures, while last week's prices were 28c to 30c per lb. The cows are now out on the grass, and a steady decrease may be looked for from now out.

Eggs Fairly Plentiful.

Eggs appear to be fairly plentiful, and the indications are that prices have not by any means hit rock bottom, as eggs are now selling about 2c higher than at this time last year. By the basket eggs are quoted at 20c a dozen. Retail prices are 21c and 22c a dozen. The wholesale dealers are paying 19c a dozen for crate lots.

Hay deliveries were below the average this morning, because of the threatening weather. Only ten loads of hay were on the stand, and they went off rapidly at unchanged prices, of \$12 for good loads and \$11 for loads of inferior quality. There has been a steady demand for hay right through the spring, keeping prices up at top notch. The supply for the past two weeks has scarcely been sufficient to meet the demand. The bad weather has kept the farmers in, several days there being only one or two loads.

No straw was offered this morning.

Three loads of oats were in; \$1.25 per cwt is the top price for this commodity. Hay deliveries were below the average


