TOWN PLANNERS ASKED TO QUIT BY ALDERMEN

Appointment of New Committee Authorized-Cleanliness Notices in Restaurants Asked.

TO GET ADVICE RE GAS

Will Call For Tenders For Paving Plant-Money Bylaws Passed.

Town planning affairs took a sudden and somewhat unexpected turn, when the city council last night unanimously approved a resolution calling on the committee to resign, and authorizing the appointment of other committee.

It was anticipated that some inquiries would be made regarding the lispute between John Cottam and City Clerk Baker at the last meeting of the committee, but it was not thought that such drastic action as calling for the resignation of the whole committee would be taken. The motion was made by Ald. Watkinson and seconded by Ald. Drake. There was no discussion. Ald. Ashton, seconded by Ald. W. A. Wilson, brought in a motion, which was approved, asking the board of health to submit regulations for governing restaurants, and also putting notices in each one as to their state of cleanliness. They stated in their motion that there was still some doubt in the mind of the public as to the efficiency of the clean-up made by the board. committee, but it was not thought that

Wanted Goods Dated.

Aid. Watkinson approved this, but said it did not go far enough. He wanted to introduce a motion by which local cold storages would be required to mark on all goods the date on which they were received and not to keep them longer than one month. No one seconded the motion. Mayor Little said the council had no power in that matter, and that it would have to be dealt with by provincial authorities. Ald. Watkinson said he would take it up with the local member, Dr. H. A. Stevenson.

City Engineer H. A. Brazier was authorized to call for tenders on a new paving plant. It is estimated that the cost will be in the neighborhood of \$40,000. Alds. Moorhead and Seabrook were in favor of deferring action to 1921. Mr. Brazier stated that the present plant, which cost about \$19,000, had saved \$100,000 to the rate-payers in four years. It was now obsolete and only producing half its proper output, owing to frequent breakdowns. Often it was necessary for seven or eight men to work Sundays to repair it. It was necessary to place the order now, in order to have it in time for the spring work. Ald. Bridge said he had been opposed to the expenditure at first, but was convinced now that it was wise. Ald. Cunningham pointed out that it was not a direct expenditure, but a loan to the paving plant, which would be charged up against it and not against the general tax rate.







Oliver Mowat remained only a few months, resigning in November, 1864, to became vicechancellor of Ontario. The greatness of the loss occasioned by his leaving was then not recognized, for although he was respected and regarded as a man of promise, his career as a public man had only begun. He entered politics again as prime minister of Ontario, a position which he held with the highest credit to himself and advantage to the Liberal party and the province for a quarter of a century.
