LINDSAY FACTORIES REQUESTED TO CLOSE, SHORTAGE OF POWER



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LONDON'S POPULATION IS CLIMBING STEADILY NEARER TO THE 1,000,000 MARK

No Mushroom Growth, But a Steady, Substantial Increase Backed by Splendid Business Prosperity—Every Home Erected by the Housing Commission Will Be Needed For Influx of New Residents.

London's prospects of having a population of 1,000,000 within the near future are excellent, E. R. Dennis, chairman of the housing commission declared in an interview with the Advertiser today. His duties as head of the commission bring him in close touch with the growth of the city, and he is able to base his assertion on facts.

Whole families are moving into London every week, and the average person does not realize just how fast the population is growing," he said. "In addition to the many large factories which are coming here, there are many smaller businesses being opened, and all these are doing their share to add to the prosperity of the city."

"I do not look for any mushroom growth, such as Windsor or Welland in the past few years, but I believe that if we are going to expand like that, we will have to attract a class of people not desirable in the present city. We are getting skilled mechanics and other classes of workers who are a real asset to the city. It will pay us to go slowly and get good Canadian citizens like that, because it will insure substantial permanent growth."

U. S. Senator Will Fight Plan to Limit.

Danbury, Conn., Oct. 5.—Senator William E. Borah, Idaho, one of the "irreconcilable" opponents of the league of nations in the United States Senate, today made a public declaration that his attitude is unchanged as to the league of nations. He said that he would not accept the proposed international agreement unless it contained provisions to maintain the untrammeled and unimpeded independence of the United States. He said the United States, through the Republican party, favors doing its part in the family of nations, but a public conscience cannot be induced to sign a contract which would determine our course in international affairs.

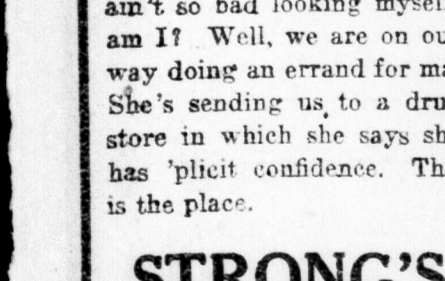

As an alternative to the carrying out of the agreement, the plaintiff asks for cancellation of the agreement and damages for breach of the agreement on the part of the defendant.

CHURCHES ARE HERE.—Plans for the Ribout street bridge have arrived in the city. Members of the city engineering staff could scarcely believe when it was first heard, but it has been so substantially confirmed since then that there is not the slightest doubt about it. Within a few days they will be in position on the structure. The bridge will be a timber, which is at present doing duty there. The long, narrow bridge will be built in great haste, but various reasons were responsible for their shipment being delayed until now.

GIVING PEONIES.—This year the London Horticultural Society is giving four excellent peonies as premiums, namely: Albare, Madame Calot, Felix Crouse and Madame de Verneville. The latter took first prize at a summer peony show held in Human Hall, and was exhibited by Thomas Hill. That the society is able to give such premiums this year is owing to the increased government grant to horticultural societies, which amounts to \$200 for the local society. It is expected that will be given out in about a couple of weeks, as the invoice has already arrived from France.

SAYS WHITE FLOUR CAUSES ILLNESS

Dr. Grenfell Tells of Work Among Natives of Labrador.

Dr. Grenfell, speaking at the Institute of Public Health today, dealt chiefly on the dietary troubles of the people of Labrador. He said they insisted on using the white, refined flour and will not use brown bread, and consequently blood trouble follows. No dairy butter is used by them; they get their butter from the cod fish and use it very sparingly. Two diseases are prevalent there, rickets and beri-beri, and in many cases prove fatal. He said that lack of green vegetables is becoming serious, and advised the natives that if they could not be obtained, potato peelings were best. He told them that if they could get a certain part of it is valuable to the system, the potato peelings should be used.

FRANCE AND GERMANY MAY BEGIN DISCUSSING REPARATIONS DIRECTLY

Brussels, Oct. 5.—Reports that direct negotiations might be held between France and Germany with a view to effecting a definite agreement on a reparations plan seem to have been kept in the international press for several days. It is in the morning while the committees and sub-committees were busy preparing their various resolutions for the conference with regard to the prospective reparations conference here.

CUBA'S CANE CROP IS BELOW AVERAGE

Havana, Cuba, Oct. 5.—Prediction that Cuba's cane crop would be inferior to the one of 1919, and that its product would not reach its former level, 1912, was issued in a bulletin last night by a sales commission which represents holders of a considerable portion of this year's unsold crop.

HOTEL PRICES REDUCED

Chicago, Oct. 5.—By the Canadian Press.—The Hotel Association of Chicago, composed of all the Loop hotels, has put into effect their revised prices. The price cut was brought about by a request from the city council last week that their prices conform with wholesale prices. The price cut ranged from 10 to 50 per cent. The new rates will be reduced later in the week.

CHURCHES ARE ROBBED

Quebec, Oct. 5.—Many churches were robbed a few days ago in the Eastern townships. East Angus, Cookshire and Bromptonville during last week end, thieves entered and pilfered church collections boxes, but found little cash.

HYDRO BYLAW CARRIED

Wardville, Oct. 5.—Only three votes were cast against the hydro by-law when the question was submitted to the ratepayers yesterday. Work on the new power plant will proceed as soon as possible.

WHEAT PRICES TOUCH NEW LOW MARK IN WEST

Quotations Decline 10 to 12 Cents a Bushel For Future Delivery.

FLOUR RECEDES ALSO

Drop of 60 Cents a Barrel Reported by Two Mills—Low Figure \$11.30.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Wheat futures declined 10 to 12c a bushel today in the principal grain markets of the West, in some cases touching low levels not before reached since the United States Government established the war-time wheat price.

December deliveries closed in Chicago at \$1.21 1/2; at Kansas City, \$1.21 1/2; and at St. Louis at \$1.25 to \$1.25 1/2; and at Kansas City, an even lower level was reached in \$1.21. At Minneapolis the December option closed at an even \$2, a drop of a crop of 11 1/2c from Saturday.

March options closed: At Chicago, \$1.21 1/2; at St. Louis, \$1.25; at Minneapolis, \$1.28.

Declines in wheat were reflected in new flour quotations from Minneapolis, where recessions of 60c a barrel since Friday were reported by two mills, bringing flour to \$11.50 to \$11.55 a barrel, in quarter-barrel sacks.

Corn and oats likewise touched new low levels, equalling quotations of 1915 and 1917 for the December options. December corn closed today in Chicago at 85 1/2 to 86 cents, compared with \$1.21 six weeks ago and \$1.75 in July, 1915.

Oats established new low records in both the December and the May deliveries, closing at 30 cents and 29 cents on the Chicago Board. In May of this year May options went as high as \$1.05.

Lack of export demand and free Canadian offerings were cited as causes of the decline in wheat, corn and oats are reflecting the wheat situation.

INJUNCTION AGAINST GAS CO. ORDERED

Chatham City Council Takes Offensive in Natural Gas Fight.

CHATHAM, Oct. 4.—The city council tonight authorized the gas and fuel committee to instruct City Solicitor O. L. Lewis, K.C., to issue an injunction restraining the Chatham Gas Company from raising their gas rates and to take any other steps deemed necessary.

This action followed reading of a communication from the city solicitor, in which he expressed the opinion that the company was not justified in increasing the rates without making application to the Ontario Railway Board, and also that the Chatham Gas Company should compel the Union Natural Gas Company to fulfill terms of the agreement with the local company.

WILL FILL VACANCIES SOON. OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—Six vacancies in the Senate are expected to be filled shortly. The vacancies are divided among the provinces as follows: Ontario, two; Saskatchewan, one; Nova Scotia, one; British Columbia, one; Alberta, one.

SARNIA LAD THROWN UNDER HEAVY WAGON INSTANTLY KILLED

Pedal of Bicycle Struck Curb—Inquest May Be Ordered.

SARNIA, Oct. 4.—Fourteen-year-old Douglas Tobin, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. M. Tobin, 121 Vidal street, north, was instantly killed late this afternoon, when he was thrown under the wheels of a heavy wagon as the result of colliding with the wagon while riding his bicycle. The lad was employed as a delivering messenger, and it is thought he was hurrying in order to get home in time for supper. Witnesses of the accident state that the lad turned toward the sidewalk to pass the wagon, and that the pedal of his bicycle struck the curb, throwing him under the wagon's wheels of which passed over him before the driver could bring his team to a standstill. It is expected that an inquest will be held.

LIBERALS AND COALITIONS. Mr. Meighen's coalition is by no means the first in Canadian political history. The best known is the coalition formed to carry out Confederation, and its story is instructive. In the early sixties Canada had a series of weak governments, with majorities so small that they were humorously called drinking majorities, because a government might be defeated by a supporter or two going out for a drink. At least, there was virtually a deadlock.

Oliver Mowat remained only a few months, resigning in November, 1864, to become vice-chancellor of Ontario. The greatness of the loss occasioned by his leaving was then not recognized, for although he was respected and regarded as a man of promise, his career as a public man had only begun. He entered politics again as prime minister of Ontario, a position which he held with the highest credit to himself and advantage to the Liberal party and the province for a quarter of a century.

George Brown left the coalition at the end of 1865. The assigned reason was a difference of opinion as to reciprocity with the United States, but it was well known that he found his association with John A. Macdonald very unbecoming and was glad to go. The course of George Brown is well studied, because Mr. Howland and other Ontario Unionist-Liberals justified their course by referring to Brown. They said that Brown subordinated party to the purpose of achieving Confederation. They subordinated party to the purpose of winning the war.

Resolved, that coalitions of opposing political parties for ordinary administrative purposes inevitably result in the abandonment of principle by one or both of the parties to the compact, the lowering of public morality, lavish public expenditure and widespread corruption; that the coalition of 1864 could only be justified on the ground of imperative necessity, as the only available mode of obtaining just representation for the people of Upper Canada, and on the ground that the compact then made was for a specific purpose and for a stipulated period, and was to come to an end as soon as the measure was attained, and while this convention is thoroughly satisfied that the Reform (Liberal) party has acted in the best interests of the country by sustaining the Government until the Confederation measure was secured, it deems it an imperative duty to declare that the temporary alliance between the Reform (Liberal) and the Conservative parties shall now cease, and that no Government will be satisfactory to the people of Upper Canada which is formed and maintained by a coalition of public men holding opposite political principles.

There is the chart for the Liberals of today the course of Brown and Upper Canadian Reformers was amply justified by events. The government of Sir John Macdonald soon lost all trace of the composite character and became frankly Conservative. The Liberals got together, and in six years swept the Government out of power, and afterwards won an overwhelming victory at the polls. Such another victory awaits the Liberal party today, if they will get together again and seize the magnificent opportunity which now presents itself.

THAT AMERICAN COMMITTEE. "The Nation," a paper with extreme socialistic leanings, published in New York, is still organizing its "non-partisan" committee of one hundred American citizens who are to investigate charges of atrocities brought against the Sinn Feiners and the counter-charges of atrocities brought against the British Government. Any man of ordinary intelligence finds very little difficulty in drawing correct conclusions about the matter. As far as the atrocities charged against the Sinn Feiners are concerned, they have, for the most part, never been denied, either by the leaders of the "Irish Republic" or by the rank and file. The organized assassination of policemen is the avowed policy of the Sinn Fein extremists, consequently, when Cardinal Logue fearlessly condemned such a policy he received letters threatening his life.

appears the name of William Randolph Hearst of New York. The question naturally arises: "If Hearst is non-partisan, what is meant by the term?" Hearst not only never lets pass an opportunity to vent his unreasoning hatred for the British Government and the English people, but has not hesitated to manufacture lies out of whole cloth whenever it suited his purpose. So much is this the case that the Government rightly banned the Hearst publications from Canada during the war, and there is an agitation at the present time to exclude them permanently.

As a matter of fact, the danger of a war between England and America being precipitated by the Irish question, and which the "Nation" seeks to avert, is purely imaginary. Everybody knows that the pro-Irish resolutions passed by American legislative bodies were mainly insincere, and were merely indicative of a desire to secure the Irish vote.

It is noteworthy that the "Nation" has been devoting a great deal of space lately to an exposure of American atrocities in Haiti, a record which puts any accusations brought against the British Government in the shade. Says the "Nation": "We have our unsolved negro problem; our record in San Domingo and Haiti is wickedly imperialistic, and we have done to death three thousand Haitian men, women and children who did us no wrong."

Note the last sentence: "Done to death three thousand who did us no wrong" who did not even burn barracks, to say nothing of assassinating over one hundred policemen in twelve months. And it is representatives of this nation, which, according to their own confession, are far worse than the British are said to be by their worst enemies, that the "Nation" wishes to set in judgment over Great Britain.

The "Nation" excuses itself for this inconsistency by adding that "We would welcome an inquiry by the English Labor Party into our Caribbean adventure." It is safe to predict that the "Nation" will never have the pleasure of welcoming any such commission from English shores. The English Labor Party knows how to mind its own business if the "Nation" and certain American vote-catchers do not. The British Government are not even entertaining the notion of appointing themselves advisers to the American people or the American Government, or to the Italian Government, or to the French Government. They rightly consider that the Lord will not hold them responsible for the misdeeds of other civilized and professedly Christian nations. If the American people themselves cannot or will not put a stop to any injustices or atrocities their Government may commit, it is not for England or for France or any other nation to compel them to do so, or to interfere in the local struggle between right and wrong.

It is not without reason Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in a memorable speech, extolled the role of Great Britain to be, though far from perfect, the wisest, most liberal and most benevolent the world has ever seen. It is not without reason that the greatest of French newspapers, "The Temps," in a recent editorial, declared the British Empire had withstood the storm for a thousand years because it was founded on the rock of justice, of magnanimity, and of righteousness, to a greater degree than Greece, Rome, Spain, or any other great empire. Compared to the British administration of the national, city and police administration of the United States makes a poor showing.

EUROPE NEEDS HELP. The Canadian Red Cross Society has been informed of the appalling conditions of disease and distress in the war-stricken areas over a broad belt of Europe, extending from the Baltic to the Adriatic and the Black Sea. Some twelve nations, many of whom were either allies or friendly to the Allied cause during the war, are in dire distress and need outside help.

Under the patronage of His Majesty the King, and with the approval and support of the leaders of all political parties and national organizations, arrangements have been made for the raising of a British Empire relief fund, to be administered by the British Red Cross Society in co-operation with the League or Red Cross societies of the world, some 30 nations belonging to the league.

WESTERN "U." In line with the general advancement that has been made by the medical department of Western University, every possible encouragement has been given by the board of governors to the building up of the Medical School Library. Although it is only two or three years ago that the library was but a small affair, such progress has been made in the meantime that today the library of the school has had its part in raising its general standing, and is being used more and more, not only by the faculty and students, but by doctors in practice in London and vicinity.

DAIRY PRODUCTS. (Farmers' Advocate.) No kind of food will contribute more abundantly to the development of a healthy, vigorous race of people than dairy products. All our dairy organizations should be generously supported in order that they may do honor to the dairy cow and popularize dairy products in the urban homes throughout Canada.

TO DO THE DETERMINING. (Cleveland Plaindealer.) There is fine morality and unselfishness in the doctrine of self-determination by small nations under the protection and guidance of friendly great powers. But there is also an intimation of inferiority which goes against the pride of the beneficiary nations.

MARKETING LIVE STOCK. (Farmers' Advocate.) As live stock producers we in Canada have worn deep and definite grooves out of which we make no effort to escape. These channels or beaten ways are the outcome of certain conditions which influenced trading in years gone by, but in some instances they are due to seasonal and climatic conditions.

TACT WILL BE NEEDED. Announcement has been made that the local mothers' allowance board has been appointed, and although the board has not yet become fully organized, applications have been pouring in.

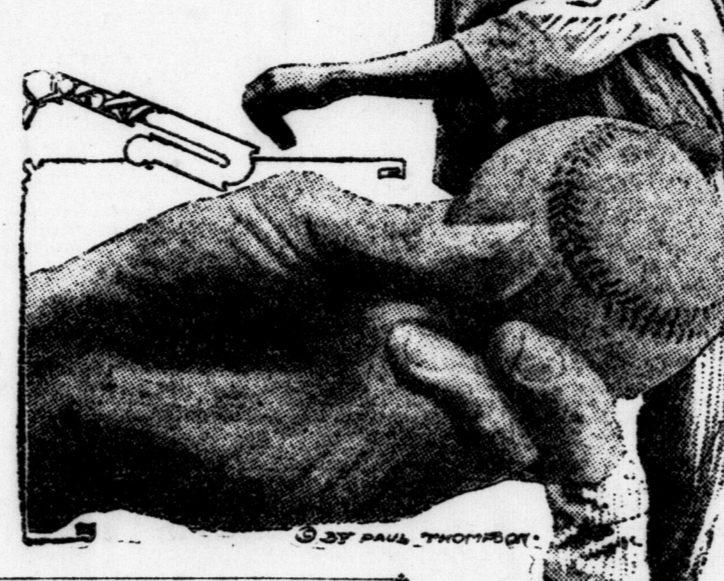

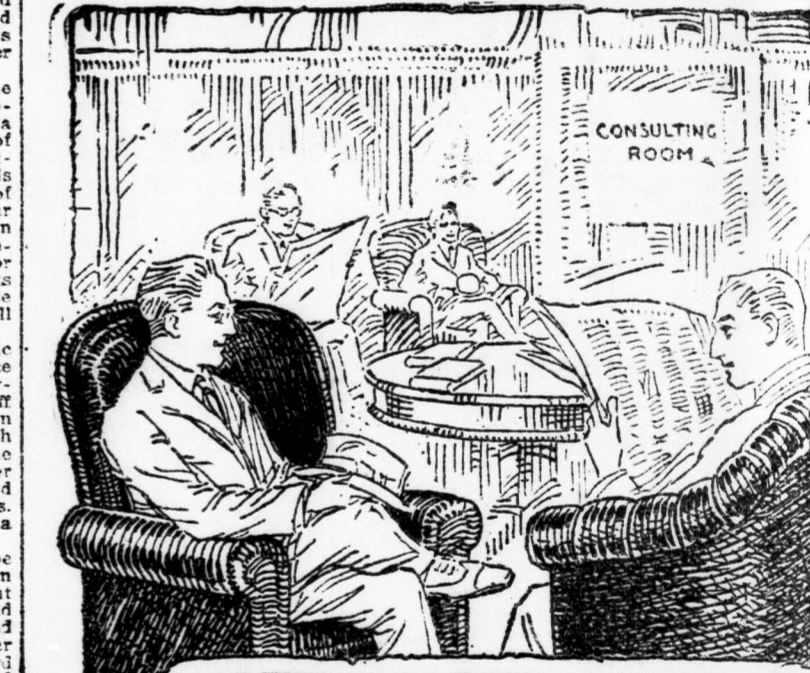
