Dublin, Aug. 17.—Eamonn De Valera, Irish Republican leader, declared definitely today that the Dail Eireann would not accept the terms offered by the British Government, extending to Ireland an offer of dominion status.

Mr. De Valera made this declaration at the second session of the Dail Eireann, held in the Mansion House, to take up the question of the negotiations with Prime Minister Lloyd George with regard to a possible Irish settlement.

### Hammett Places All Blame On Architect For Faulty Houses

Provincial Inspector's Report Confirms All the Statements Made by Inspector Piper-Declares Houses Are Not Perfect, But Claims They Are "Not Falling Down" -Commissioner Tallant's Complaints Are Fully Justified.

The report of E. W. Hammett, provincial housing inspector, who visited London last week under instructions from J. A. Ellis, housing director for Ontario, and inspected dwellings erected for the London Housing Commission on Pine Lawn and Garfield avenue, was received by City Clerk S. Baker this morning. While Director Ellis states that he grants permission for publication of the report, the housing commission has instructed that its contents be regarded as confidential by civic officials until it is discussed at a meeting of that body.

HOUSES NOT PERFECT.

This report declares that the houses are not "falling down," which statement did not require a special trip from Toronto to verify, as any citizen is aware of this fact. However, the report bears out the allegations of Commissioner D. J. Tallant, whose complaints brought about the investigation, in that Inspector Hammett says "the houses are not perfect," and places the blame on Architect McBride, who was employed by the commission.

Architect McBride, who was employed by the commission.

Blames the Architect.
The report practically coincides with that of Building Inspector A. M. Piper, published exclusively in The Advertiser Tuesday, the only points of difference being that the onus is cast on Mr. McBride by the Toronto inspector, and that his report is "milder" than that of Inspector Piper. "The architect could have remedied the defects," according to the report, which an official declared, "is as mild as it could possibly be put."

Principal Faults.

Regarding the Pine Lawn houses the report declares:

1. That the shingles used on the roofs of the 41 Pine Lawn houses are inferior to the Brantford shingles, called for inspecifications. This is the chief defect found by the provincial inspector, who blames Architect McBride

### HOUSE ASSESSED AT \$320 RENTS

Thirteen Families Live in the Ramshackle Building-Two Rooms Each.

RATEPAYERS - NO VOTE Amusing As Well As Sordid

Features Noted by

Assessors. Social conditions of London are, perhaps known to city assessors, who purue their rounds of every home annually, better than to many active social orkers who daily seek out and endeavor to eliminate squalor in local

homes.

However, the bright side of family wife in London is also accessible to the assessors, who assert that this city is comparatively free from sordid social conditions. Concluding their rounds for the 1922 assessment here, these officials relate many humorous and pathetic incidents which they have witnessed during the past few months.

Proud of Her Family.

One local assessor informed The Advertiser that he visited a home in South London where the housewife proudly announced for official registration on the assessment roil that she is the mother of eight children, the eldest of which is eight years of age while the youngest is one mouth old. She stated that none of the progeny are twins or triplets, no such unusual event marring the monotony of her matrimonial life.

Thirteen in Home.

One of the city assessors, who "covered thirteen people resident in one house, which, to the assessor, resembled a large barn. In this palatial mansion three families are domiciled, each having two rooms, one on each floor. Partitions separate the family apartment, but owing to a premature sinking of the floor, backyard gossip is unnecessary, the families talking by wireless via the "underwall route."

Assessed at \$320—Rentals \$300.

This house is assessed for \$320 and brings the owner an annual revenue of \$300, two families paying a monthly one year ago each family paid \$5 monthly rent, but the high cost of living was impressed upon them during the ensuing twelve months by this landlady.

One of the tenants of this triplex apartment informed the assessor that she has been ordered to move, because when plaster fell from the walls and she requested her landlady to repair it, the latter declared that "it must have been poked down with an umbrella." This is the fifth time within the past few weeks that she has been ordered to vacate, other provocations including the fact that she refused to pay tax for garbage collection and her objection registered to papering walls where plaster had fallen off.

A compromise, however, has been reached, causing a temporary halt in proceedings, the tenant being required to pay an extra dollar per month rent. Within a stone's throw of this miniature tenement the assessor discovered a home, the yard of which slopes uphill. A sidewalk in the yard leads to a stairway of twenty steps, which are the means provided to gain access to an outdoor toilet on the hillside.

Unpleasant Situation.

The tenant in this case informed the assessor that during spring and autumn storms the contents of the outhouse are washed down the hill to her dwelling below, and pointed to four feet of sand and debris at the base of the hill which was carried down by the heavy July storm as proof of her statement. It is interesting to note that within one city block of these conditions some of the most modern and expensive homes of the city have been erected by citizens.

Cannot Vote Yet. One of the city assessors informed The Advertiser that in one home "as neat as a new pin" he found a happy young couple, who are purchasing the property and pay taxes. Despite this fact, neither husband or wife, in this are entitled to a vote in civic afcase, are entitled to a vote in civic arise, as they are not of the required age. With no voice in the municipality elections, the young couple, who reside in the vicinity of Clarke's bridge, informed the official that this fact did not worry them, interest in their home being the keynote of their happiness.

Hubby Cannot Vote.

At another home nearby, the same assessor learned from the young couple resident there that friend wife, who reluctantly admitted that her years surpassed those of hubby, is entitled to cast her ballot at municipal elections, while the head of the house, under age, is required to remain at home and trust that she puts the X in the proper place on the ballot.

The woman in the case informed the city official that such trivial matters do not worry "her man," who is satisfied so long as the housework is properly attended to, and the assessor, after a cursory glance at the neat interior of the home, decided that "hubby has no kick coming."

In relating their experiences informally to the reporter, the assessors pointed out that in no way do they wish to reflect upon family life of London, buby contrasting conditions as above merely desire to demonstrate that one





### TO NORTH POLE BEING PLANNED

New York Physicist Will Make Attempt in September.

ALASKA TO LONDON

Stop To Be Made at Pole Party To Go Then To Spitzbergen.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.-Plans for an aeroplane flight to the North Pole and across the Arctic zone from Alaska and across the Arctic zone from Alaska
to Norway, to be attempted in September, were announced tonight by Edwin
Fairfax Naulty of New York, a physicist, who has long been interested in
Polar exploration and aviation.

Mr. Naulty stated that the plans call
for the use of only one aeroplane and
an expeditionary party of four, which
would include himself and three experienced pilots, all ex-service fliers.
They expect to fly across the Arctic in
24 hours actual flying time. His son,
Leslie Fairfax Naulty, who will be associated with him in the enterprise, is
going to Europe to take care of plans
for continuation of the flight from North
Cape, via the Scandinavian capitals to
London.

The Arctic flight proper, he explained, would start from Point Barrow. Point Barrow to North Cape, a distance of 2,400 nautical miles, will be regarded as the trans-Arctic flight. As the distance from Ketchikan, Alaska, to Point Barrow, is about 2,000 nautical miles, and from North Cape to London.

It had been his plan to undertake the flight next spring, he explained; but it had been moved up to late September on account of reports indicating unusually favorable Arctic conditions this year.







Miss Caroline Hess, 42, Grey-Haired Secretary of Goldsmith, Held in \$1,500 Bail.

NEW YORK, Aug. 16 .- The campaign of the Federal Government to break up traffic in etolen Liberty bonds and other securities resulted yesterday in the arrest of Miss Caroline Hess, aged 42, the grey-haired confidential secre-tary of Arthur M. Goldsmith, who is already in the net. Another woman connected with Goldsmith and Miss

Hess may be arrested today.

Miss Hess is charged with "unlawfully receiving, concealing and aiding in the disposition of" a \$5,000 Liberty bond. which the federal authorities allege was stolen in the robbery of the Dear-born street postoffice station in Chi-cago. Assistant United States District Attorney Maxwell X. Mattuck, who ordered the capture of Miss Hess, was greatly impressed with her intelligence, and intimated that an attempt would be made to picture the woman as the brains of the alleged conspiracy to dispose of stolen securities. At present. however, the only information against Miss Hess deals with the cashing of

Miss Hess deals with the cashing of coupons of Liberty bonds.

Serious Charges.

The complaint charges that Miss Hess on July 27 went to Postoffice Station Y. near her home at 232 East Sixty-Ninth street, and cashed the coupon of a \$5,000 Liberty bond, numbered which the Covernment alleges. 90964, which the Government alleges was part of the proceeds of the Dear-born street robbery. While this is the only specific instance cited against Miss Hess in the complaint, Mr. Mattuck told reporters yesterday that he had in his possession at least ten coupons of stolen Liberty bonds valued at \$50,000

which Miss Hess cashed at the same Disputes Clerk's Identification. the coupon for bond No. 90964 for Miss Hess identified her in Mr. Mattuck's office in the Federal Building. Even when she was confronted with the clerk, and he exclaimed. "That's the wo-man!" however, Miss Hess maintained the cool demeanor that had marked her attitude, and denied that she had ever had possession of the coupon.
"I never saw that man in my ife,"

she declared in a steady voice. remembers be because he has seen me in the postoffice a number of times, I suppose. I frequently went there." J.G. STEELE & CO. HARDWARE Mattuck asked the clerk if he was

positive in his identification.
"Certainly," the clerk said. "You don't often have to cash coupons for \$5,000 bonds in that neighborhood, so I paid particular attention to this lady. Besides, nobody who ever saw her would ever forget her."

Peculiar Appearance. The prosecutor said that this was true, that there was something about Miss Hess that made an ineradicable impression upon one. Although she is middle-aged, plain and quietly dressed, he said, her features had a sharpness and a shrewdness that attracted at-tention. Also she speaks with a pro-

nounced accent.

Miss Hess showed fight when she first Miss Hess showed fight when she first learned that the federal authorities wanted her. When Postoffice Inspector William F. Murphy went to her home with several of his men, she kept them waiting for three hours, declaring that Mr. Goldsmith had had a nervous break-down and she had to take core of him. down and she had to take care of him. Then she refused to go with the agents to Mr. Mattuck's office to answer his questions. Instead she went to the office of Charles E. Griffiths, attorney. office of Charles E. Griffiths, attorney, 120 Broadway, who telephoned Mattuck and agreed to produce his client on learning that drastic steps might be taken otherwise.

Woman Held in \$1,500 Ball.

Following the identification in his office, Mattuck ordered the woman's arrest and she was arregard hefer.

rest, and she was arraigned before United States Commissioner Hitchcock. She was held in \$1,500 bail, which was

furnished by a surety company, for a hearing on September 19.

The address given by Miss Hess, 232 East Sixty-ninth street, is also the home and office of Goldsmith, who is head of a commercial school known as the President Institute. Miss Hess has been a bookkeeper and confidential sec-retary for Goldsmith for eight years. Before taking that position she is said to have been engaged in social service work for wealthy philanthropists in this city. Little else is known about her

past life.

Day After Meeting.

The day on which Miss Hess is alleged to have cashed the coupon from the stolen bond—July 27—was the day after the last meeting in New York of Goldsmith and John W. Worthington, alias Whitehouse, head of the Ceutral Securities Company of Chicago, who has been arrested with others in connection with the \$6.000,000 bond thefts from the mails in Chicago.

Goldsmith was arrested here August
2, on instructions telegraphed from rederal authorities in Chicago, where he was indicted by a federal grand jury along with Worthington and others. According to the federal authorities, Goldsmith in New York and Worthington in Chicago were leading fearures in a girantic conspiracy. Goldfigures in a gigantic conspiracy. Goldsmith was held in \$10,000 bail, which was furnished, for a hearing which will

be held today.

Although he denied any connection with the conspiracy, Goldsmith admitted he had bought and sold Liberty ted he had bought and sold Liberty
Bonds through the Central Securities
Company. Suspicion was first directed
to Goldsmith, following the arrest of
Worthington in Chicago on August 1,
when his name was found on an envelope containing a \$1,000 Liberty
Bond from which the coupons had been
clipped was discovered in Worthington's effects. The coupons were traced
to Post Office Station Y, New York.

The first was disarmament, upon which Great Britain has always insisted. Germany cannot build up great armaments in secret, and the allies would be bound to know about the attempt long before it became a menace. 

In June, 1916, the Duma then in power adopted a law prohibiting the sale of any beverage containing more than 1½ per cent of alcohol. The soviets since they came into power have strictly enforced the prohibition decree.

### **NEW CUSTOMS RULING** AFFECTS RETAILERS

Sales Tax Is Not Applicable Under Certain Conditions.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(By Canadian Press).—That traders dealing both wholesale and retail can keep separate accounts, so that their business can come under different categories of the sales tax involving different rates of taxation, is set forth in a ruling issued by the deputy minister of customs to collectors throughout the Dominion. The circular points out that "in the case of a firm selling exclusively by retail, and making goods to the order of a customer, exclusively, the sales tax is not applicable." ### CHARTER GRANTED FOR COMPANY TO EXPORT LIQUOR

Windsor Firm Plans To Supply Needs of Detroiters.

WINDSOR. Aug. 16.—Backed by a charter granted today by the Dominion Government, the Essex Export Company, capitalized at \$100,000, has entered the business of supplying drinks to thirsty citizens of the United States. Organization was announced by Bernard Furlong, the legal adviser to the new company, the officers of which are: Vital Benoit, president: Alfred F. Morand, manager. Benoit is part proprietor of the Wellington Hotel, Sandwich West, while Morand is a son of Paul Morand, former license inspector for North Essex.

The company, which already has shipped an immense amount of liquor to the United States and other arid areas, has built a bonded warehouse at Petite Cote, near the river bank, at a cost of \$10,000. The intention of the company, according to Barrister Furlong, is to export liquor and beer that is "legally ordered" by Detroiters. Any attempt by officers under the jurisdiction of Attorney-General W. E. Raney to seize the properety of the new company will be met by Barrister Furlong asking the courts for a restraining order.

The charter of the company, the first of its kind issued for the exportation of liquor since Ontario became supposedly dry, may be followed by three others, Bavrister Furlong hinted. Applications by three other organized companies are now in the hands of Government officials.

In addition to being privileged to export liquor under the protection of the Dominion Government, the company's charter gives it the right to do business as "Forwarding agents, carriers, carters and custom house brokers."
