NEW SITE FOR KNOX

Toronto, May 18 .- With the proposal which is rapidly assuming shape for the erection of the Caven Memorial Library, the larger question of the future of Knox College becomes a live opic. Inquiry among many of those in touch with the question points to the fact that a movement is already on foot in this city for the abandonment of the present site and securing one within the university grounds. It is urged by those in favor of the change that the present site, owing to th street railway, is wholly unsuitable, and that noise is a serious drawback The present grounds are likewise very valuable for commercial purposes, and the sale would go far toward the purchase of a new site. Added to this is the distance from Toronto University and the other educational institutions.

KALIEFF PAYS

Sergius Executed at Moscow.

London, May 18.-A dispatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg says that Ivan Kalieff, who assassinated Grand Duke Sergius on Feb. 17, at Moscow, was executed today.

Ivan Kalieff belonged to the noted fighting group" of the Socialist revoutionary party which had passed senence of death upon the grand duke long before the tragedy.

At 3 o'clock in the afternoon of Feb. 17 Grand Duke Sergius was proceeding to the Governor-General's palace in Moscow in his carriage, Kalieff, attired as a workman, stepped forward from the sidewalk as Sergius was passing the courts of justice and threw under his carriage a bomb, which he had concealed beneath his coat. Loaded with nails and fragments of iron, this deadly missile tore the duke's body into ghastly fragments. The assassin, stunned by the explosion, on being captured did not deny his crime, but gloried in its success. He expressed satisfaction that the duke's wife had not shared her husband's fate. UNEMPLOYED WILL MARCH ON LONDON

Euglish Labor Leaders Plan to Have Thousands of Men There.

London, May 18. - A great national demonstration in favor of the unemployed bill now before Parliament is Parliament and well - known labor leader, and other labor leaders. The programme includes the march of several thousand unemployed men from leading factory centers of the country to London on the lines of the Coxey army. The date of the demonstration, which will take place in Hyde Park, has not been definitely settled, but it will be either June 10 or June 17.

The men will be advised to throw the responsibility for the maintenance of their wives and children during the pilgrimage, upon the authorities, and their children will be directed to demand food in the schools. There is no intention to send deputations to Parliament, where they probably would meet the fate of Gribble, the leader of was thrown out of the speaker's gallery of the House of Commons May 12 after attempting to address the House, but to concentrate such a mass of unemployed men in London that Parlia-

FURTHER GRANT FOR ARMORIES

Supplementary Estimates Ask for \$6,000 for Lighting and Sidewalks.

Ottawa, May 17. - Supplementary estimates for the fiscal year, amounting to \$6,379,342, were brought down in the House tonight. These, added to the sum voted last session, makes a total appropriation of \$81,349,391 for the fiscal year ending on June 30.

Among the items are \$10,000 more for the voters' lists for the last general election, \$300,000 for immigration, in addition to \$682,276 already voted, \$100.000 additional for annual drill, \$25,000 pay of troops nof being raised to garrison Halifax and Esquimalt. The Intercolonial requires an additional \$450,575 on capital and \$2,000,000 on reserve account to finish up the year. The sum of \$290,500 is asked for Grand Trunk Pacific surveys, making \$1,619,000 for the year, \$26,000 more for dredging at Port Arthur, and Fort William, \$50,000 further for Collingwood harbor, \$7,000 for deep water-ways commission, \$65,000 additional for the Hudson Bay expedition, and \$1,000 honorarium to Commander Law. The sum of \$280,000 is required to pay unprovided items, including \$68,800 for mounted police, and \$48,363 over ex-

GOMPERS ARRANGING PEACE

A Settlement of the Big Chicago Strike Is in Sight.

Chicago, May 17.-It is highly probable that the next 24 hours will see the end of the teamsters' strike in Chicago. Although none of the labor leaders will so acknowledge it, it is generally understood tonight that the programme for calling off the strike has already been arranged. Tomorrow a meeting will be held be-

tween the teamsters' joint council and a committee representing the teamowners' association. It will be made plain to the teamsters that the business interests of the team-owners render it imperative that the boycotts be lifted. It will then be agreed, it is said, by the team-owners and the teamsters' joint council that the demand of the team-owners to make deliveries to boycotted houses with union drivers be submitted to arbitration.

The arbitration is to concern only the team-owners' association and the teamsters, the members of the employers' association being in no manner interested in it officially.

Pending the decision of this board of arbitration, the strike is to be called off, and such members of the team-sters' union as are able to obtain their old positions return to work. This will end the strike with the exception of the strike against Montgomery, Ward & Co., and it is expected the trouble in this direction will die out grad-

ually. President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, was active today in all efforts made toward settling the strike. He conferred with members of the team-owners' association, held conferences with the teamsters and had an extended talk with Mayor Dunne. He refused to state the result of his day's work, but expressed himself as continued in the strike would shortly be adjusted.

LONDON, THURSDAY, MAY 18. A False Alarm.

Our local contemporary has not been careful of the city's reputation in publishing an exaggerated version of some comments upon Springbank water by the provincial analyst and the secre-

tary of the Provincial Board of Health. At certain periods of the year slight traces of deleterious matter will be found in the best water supply, but we have the word of the chairman of the local board of health, and the medical health officer, both experienced analysts, that frequent tests, taken before and after those of the provincial officers, have demonstrated that London's drinking water is of a high average of purity, and that there is not the slightest ground for public alarm. They repudiate indignantly the suggestion that the epidemic of typhoid last year was caused by Springbank water, not by the well water at Port Stanley. Ninety-five per cent of the typhoid patients attended a combined Sunday school picnic at Port Stanley on July 20 and drank water from the wells in which typhoid bacteria were found by these same provincial officials. If the contamination came from Springbank what an extraordinary coincidence that 95 per cent of the victims should have happened to drink water at Port Stanley! Springbank water must have been much the same last summer as the summer before, and a good many summers before that. The driving-shed, which the provincial analysts say is too near the collecting basin, has been there for years. If there was any source of pollution last summer it has existed since the city went to Springbank for its water supply. Yet no city can show a cleaner bill of health extending over a long period, than London. One of its proudest boasts has been its pure spring water, which has been the envy and admiration of every visitor.

city's water supply has been given publication, especially before the Old Boys' reunion, when thousands of visitors will gather at Springbank. It may seriously interfere with the success of the celebration and give the city a bad name. The report of the provincial analysts has been known to a few civic officials and to the newspapers for some weeks, and it was agreed that it should not be given currency, because it was felt to be an injustice to the city, and was flatly opposed to the testimony of local analysts. Under the circumstances, the publication of a garbled version of it by our contempory was a distinct breach of faith. W reproduce the exact copy of it today, because public apprehension has been excited and there is nothing to be gained now by suppressing it.

The Transvaal's New Constitution

The new constitution of the Transvaal has been promulgated in letters patent. It is held to be a reproach to the Imperial Government -by British Liberals, who are for giving a full grant of responsible government to the colony and throwing the Boers on their good behavior. The constitution certainly falls far short of Canadian and Australian autonomy, but is defended as a test of the temper of the Boers and their fitness for a complete measure of self-government.

The colony is to have a legislative assembly, consisting of six to nine appointive and official members, and not less than 35 elected members. Only the whites will have votes, and the franchise will be limited to burghers whose names were on the last lists of the late South African republic; to persons occupying premises of the yearly value of £50, and to anyone in receipt of an income of not less than £100 a year. The executive council will be wholly nominated and will not be drawn from the legislative assembly. "Jim, yer lazy good fer nuthin" Practically the latter will be only a deliberative assembly, as it may not appropriate any part of the revenue of the colony or impose any tax rate, or duty, except upon recommendation of the Lieutenant-Governor. The Lieutenant-Governor has therefore, almost autocratic powers. Three important departments, the railways, the censtabulary and the land settlement, are taken out of the hands of the Transvaal Government, and vested in an inter-colonial council, which is appointed by the crown. The debates of the Legislative Assembly are to be conducted in English, but a member may speak in Dutch by permission of

the president. It will be seen that the constitution places the Transvaal a stage between able to beat him on his own ground." a crown and a self-governing colony, but not much removed from the former. The Boers will be incensed, and they may refuse their aid in working the new constitution, in which event they may postpone any wider control over their own destinies. It might have been the part of wisdom to throw greater initial responsibility upon the people of the colony, A similar Imperial policy produced discord and rebellion in Canada, and peace only came with a full measure of responsible government, but the conditions of South Africa at present, and Canada in the first part of the nineteenth century, are not identical. Each country had a race problem, but in Canada the foremost champions of self-government were men of British blood, and they had behind them a majority of the British population. In the Transvaal there are probably few Britons who want colonial autonomy, because they fear the Boers would abuse their power In this they may be mistaken.






