Ex-Ald. E. W. Scane Called to the Unseen at Eventide Yesterday.

An Honored and Useful Life Ended - Funeral Will Take Place on Friday.

Chatham has again been called to mourn the loss of another of her oldst and best citizens, in the person

Mr. Scane's death, while not entirely unexpected, was quite sudden and has caused a gloom to spread over the entire community. He was in his ofifce three weeks ago to-morrow and, while not in very good health, seemed to be gaining strength. He has been in very poor health for some time, and his recent attack was brought on by severe cold

Yesterday morning he seemed much better and about half past six o'clock Mrs. Scane entered his room and he expressed himself as feeling greatly Botha and Delarey will Attendimproved, and as having no pain whatever. A few minutes after he spoke these few words, he was dead. Mrs. Scane called for the nurse, who did not enter the room before he was gone.

Atkinson, whose office was then situated at the lower end of Fifth street. He studied there for a number of years and passed as a solicitor and attorney in the winter of 1865. Shortly afterwards he was accepted at the bar.

On the 14th of February, 1865 he married Miss Mary A. Spencer daughter of the late Wm. Spencer, whose old homestead is still standing on Queen street. Almost immediately after his marriage he opened up a law office for himself in Chatham and Bothwell, attending the office in Bothwell himself and leaving Henry Smyth in charge of the office here. He soon closed up his Bothwell businesses and came to Chatham and openess, and came to Chatham, and opened up a law business in a frame building opposite the market, owned by the late Dr. Bright. While in this office, M. Houston, P. M., entered with a student. Later on the ofwas moved over Dingman's store

and still later to the present location. In 1870 Mr. Houston graduated as a lawyer, and came home to find Mr. Scane dangerously ill with inflamma tory rheumatism. Mr. Houston conducted his business for a couple of months until Mr. Scane recovered, then he, too, started in business for himself, although he always did busiess jointly with Mr. Scane.

On the first of May, 1873, Messrs. Scane & Houston entered partnership and the first other partner admitted was A. Craddock, who died in 1891. Fred. Stone, who is at present a member of the firm, was admitted in the fall of '96. Mr. Houston was one of Mr. Scane's closest friends, they having done business together for the

last 37 years.
Mr. Scane's death will be felt by more than those with whom he came in personal contact. He has served the city in many ways, and during the terms. Canada, Australia, New Zeaterms of his various offices he has acted honorably and well. At the Council Board his advice and judgment were much depended upon and sought after. He was councillor of the town of Chatham in '69, '70 and '71, while in '72 he was deputy reeve, representing the town at the County Council Board. He was mayor in 1882 and 1883, being elected both times by acclamation, and he has since been alderman in '99, 1900, 1901, retiring in 1902. He was chairman of the Cemetery committee when the land for the Maple Leaf cemetery was purchased and was chairman of the Finance committee in '99, 1900 and 1901. He was a very prominent Con-servative and was asked several times

to run for a seat in the Dominion House, but always declined. He was one of the best educated lawyers in Chatham, graduating from the Victoria College when it was situated at Coburg. He was at the time of his death, vice-president of the West Kent Law Association, and always took a keen interest in anything pertaining to advance educa-

He was also a member of the A. O. U. W. and the Royal Templars. In religion he was a Methodist and was one of the piliars of the Park street Methodist church. He was one of the most active members in the congregation and will be greatly miss-

The article urges that no nucleus of a hostile state must be left intact, though the utmost possible degree of self government should be granted the Boer colonies. It says "Leave any district of the Transvaal under purely Boer rule and a new arsenal will arise to astonish the Brit-

Canada to Send Three Hundred Mounted Men-In all 2,500 Colonials.

They Will Take Part in the Ceremonies--Strong Feeling in Favor of Consolidation.

London, April 1 .- The strong colonial feeling in favor of a consolidated Imperial army is shortly to produce some definite proposal from the younger nations. The colonies regard our attempts to make a great army by offering men a few pence extra as futile, and quite inadequate. The conditions of a century ago are not the conditions of to-day, and as a proof that soldiers cannot be obtained by present means or those contemplated, colonials point out that the British army has never in recent years been up to the establishment, and that recruiting has been a sore trial. It is believed that Australia would make the proposition this year for an Imperial army running in a sequence of divisional numbers throughout all the portions of the empire.

"A VOICE THAT IS STILL."

These are sad days of mourning in the Maple City.

One by one, within an impressively short time, her stalwart sons - men who have been the pioneers of her progress, citizens who have devoted lives of labor to her development, colleagues of intellectual strength and unquestioned integrity - are being called from within her gates to the portals of the Great Beyond.

The sad news last evening of the demise of E. W. Scane cast a gloom over the entire community. Death has taken from us an esteemed resident, one who was universally held in high regard, honored as a citizen, respected and beloved as a man. He has served Chatham faithfully and well in almost every office within the gift of his fellow citizens, he has given an earnest life of service to the

Chatham mourns herself to-day, while she sympathizes with the bereaved widow and family. The loss is shared by all.

#### THE BOYD THREATS.

Says the Woodstock Express: Somebody appears to be very anxious to shoulder the blame for the murder of James Quirk, the Brantford hotelkeeper. Letters have been received from Woodstock, Detroit and Buffalo, assuming the responsibility. This fact recalls an interesting circumstance in connection with the Benwell tragedy. It may be remembered that when Birchall condescended to say anything at all in his own defence, beyond a general formal denial, he threw out certain hints about a mysterious "Colonel." who was supposed to have accompanied Benwell and Birchall on the day of the murder and who went into the swamp with Benwell after Birchall had started to return to Eastwood. The story of the "Colonel's" connection with the tragedy was never clearly told. It was merely hinted at. There was neither beginning nor end to it. The "Colonel" appeared suddenly on the scene without any introduction, and disappeared just as sudden ly. But it is worthy of note that the "Colonel" wrote a letter, in which he spoke of his connection with the killing of Benwell as a matter of fact, and this letter bore the post mark, of a Michigan town, and was doubtless posted there, though it was generally believed to have been written in Woodstock. Indeed, the suspicion was very general that it was written by Birchell himself. The mystery of the "Colonel" has never been cleared up, but there was a general feeling at the time that he had no existence outside of Birchall's imagination. There may be a hint in all this for the Brantford authorities, not to look too far from home for the writer of the letters.

IF CHAMBERLAIN COMES.

#### CHILD SAVERS.

In the ten years of its existence the Children's Aid Society has sheltered 2,680 neglected children, the majority of whom have found homes with good families throughout the Dominion and are now being educated and trained as the natural children of their foster

By the admirable system of the society these children have not only been saved from the evil environments of dissolute homes, but they have been protected from the taint of institutionalism, and are growing up with the same advantages as the children of the best parents. Living in separate homes, surrounded by all the helpful influence of family life, they develop naturally, and their talents have full scope for individual expression. In the best institutions that human ingenuity has devised this is impossible. The necessary discipline makes freedom of action impossible, and the children are brought up in one groove, oftentimes resulting in the destruction of elements of power inherent in the child.

The work of the Children's Aid is worthy the support of the philanthropically inclined people of the Dominion. It is in good hands, and its work speaks for itself.



BRITISH BREAKFAST TABLE.

Review of British Imports For Thi Service During 1901. A review of what may be described as the breakfast table imports for 1901, shows that while our colonies obtained a slightly smaller share of the trade than before, Russia secured a considerably increased propor

The bill for butter imported from oversea was £19,297,005, which is £1,837,000 more than in the previous year, and fully £2,084,000 more than in 1899. The lion's share went to Denmark, which secured £8,-950,497. Though much of the Russian butter which formerly came through Denmark now reaches us direct, the advance of the Danish total for the year is no less than

Russia sent the next largest quantity of butter and for the first time passed the million mark, with a bill for £1,665,352. France, which obtains a higher price for its smaller product, exceeded this figure with a total charge of £1,704,128. So Russia for the first time takes, second place for quantity and third for val-

Holland received just over a million and a half sterling for butter. Canada took fully a million, which was a marked improvement on 1900, but rather less than in 1899.

New Zealand, with £819,534, showed an increase of £25,000, while all the Australian colonies experienced a falling off. Victoria received only £921,505, as compared with £1,-296,438 in 1900, and over a million in the preceding year.
We imported last year 2,048,735,

400 eggs, for which we paid £5,495,-776, an increase of £89,000. Russia maintains the pre-eminence in this market, sending the greatest quantity and obtaining the enormous um of £1,207,483. This is only 000 more than in 1899. £98,000 more than in 1900 Denmark has wrested the second place from Germany, with £1,160,948, as

compared with Germany's £895,624. Belgium is credited with £805.241, nd is fourth. France has fallen rom £867,000 in the two previous vears, with the third place in 1899 and the fourth in 1900, to £696,125 and fifth place. Canada also shows diminishing trade, receiving only £255.766, or £33,000 less than in the previous year.

The total quantity of bacon im-ported shows little increase, but the bill went up nearly two millions to well over 134 millions sterling. The United States received 91 millions, Denmark fully 31, both of them showing an enormous advance. Canada, on the other hand, fell from £1.075,445 to £921,509.

Out of the 41 millions spent foreign and colonial hams, the United States received £4,209,816, an increase of £453,000. Canada from £446,942 to £304,822. - London Daily Mail.





THE DESTRUCTIVE TEREDO.

A Curious and Fragile Worm That Digs Tunnels In Timber.

It was in 1731 that Holland narrowly escaped inundation along its coast because the timbers of the sea dikes in many parts were discovered to be quite unsound. The timely discovery of the real condition of the dikes saved the country from an awful catastrophe, the full extent of which was comprehended by only a few Dutchmen.

The timbers had been honeycombed by the teredo, or shipworm. This

creature burrows into any wood immersed in sea water. It makes an entrance when young and digs channels along the grain of the wood, living and often dying in the timber. The worm grows in some localities to a length of twelve inches, its girth being one and a half inches, and the curious thing about its whiplike body is its exceeding tenderness. It cannot bear its own weight. It will break if

subjected to any strain. It will burrow straight along the grain of the wood unless turned aside by a knot or nail, and, no matter how many of these worms may be burrowing in the same piece of wood, they never run their channels into one another. By some marvelous instinct they keep clear of each other's pre-serves. We have recently seen a cross section of a log eighteen inches in diameter, and we counted no fewer than 800 distinct burrows.

The Saving Sense of Humor. Some of the world's greatest humorists unite with that sprightly gift a deep tenderness and broad sympathy. Their lips smile at a spectacle of the absurd at the same instant that their eyes overflow in recognizing the pathos that is its so frequent accompaniment. It is this quick perception of a situation as a whole, this power to see all its aspects at once, that gives us just judgments tempered by mercy, severity lined with leniency, that acts as a saving grace to culprits.

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

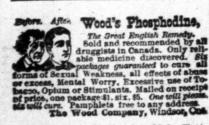



BRITISH BREAKFAST TABLE.

Review of British Imports For This Service During 1901. A review of what may be described as the breakfast table imports for 1901, shows that while our colonies obtained a slightly smaller share of

the trade than before, Russia securad a considerably increased propor-The bill for butter imported from oversea was £19,297,005, which is £1,837,000 more than in the pre vious year, and fully £2,084,000 more than in 1899. The lion's share went to Denmark, which secured £8, 950,497. Though much of the Russian butter which formerly came through Denmark now reaches us di-

tal for the year is no less than £930,000. Russia sent the next largest quantity of butter and for the first time passed the million mark, with a bill for £1,665,352. France, which obtains a higher price for its smaller product, exceeded this figure with a total charge of £1,704,128. So Russia for the first time takes second place for quantity and third for val-

rect, the advance of the Danish to-

Holland received just over a million and a half sterling for butter. Canada took fully a million, which was a marked improvement on 1900, but rather less than in 1899.

New Zealand, with £819,534, show-ed an increase of £25,000, while all the Australian colonies experienced a falling off. Victoria received only £921,505, as compared with £1,-

296,438 in 1900, and over a million in the preceding year.
We imported last year 2,048,735,-400 eggs, for which we paid £5,495,-776, an increase of £89,000.

Russia maintains the pre-eminence in this market, sending the greatest quantity and obtaining the enormous sum of £1,207,483. This is only £24,000 more than in 1899, but it £98,000 more than in 1900. Dennark has wrested the second place iom Germany, with £1,160,948, as compared with Germany's £895,624. Belgium is credited with £805,241, is fourth. France has fallen rom £867,000 in the two previous years, with the third place in 1899 and the fourth in 1900, to £696,125 and fifth place. Canada also shows diminishing trade, receiving only £255,766, or £33,000 less than in the previous year.

The United States received 91 millions, Denmark fully 34, both of them showing an enormous advance. Can-ada, on the other hand, fell from £1,075,445 to £921,509.



THE DESTRUCTIVE TEREDO.

It was in 1731 that Holland narrowly escaped inundation along its coast because the timbers of the sea dikes in many parts were discovered to be quite unsound. The timely discovery of the real condition of the dikes saved the country from an awful catastrophe, the full extent of which was comprehended by only a few Dutchmen. creature burrows into any wood im-

The timbers had been honeycombed by the teredo, or shipworm. This mersed in sea water. It makes an entrance when young and digs channels along the grain of the wood, living and often dying in the timber. The worm grows in some localities to a length of twelve inches, its girth being one and a half inches, and the curious thing about its whiplike body is its exceeding tenderness. It cannot bear its own weight. It will break if subjected to any strain.

It will burrow straight along the grain of the wood unless turned aside by a knot or nail, and, no matter how many of these worms may be burrowing in the same piece of wood, they never run their channels into one another. By some marvelous instinct they keep clear of each other's preserves. We have recently seen a cross section of a log eighteen inches in diameter, and we counted no fewer than 800 distinct burrows.

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

It belongs to Lord Renand is considered the beautiful demesne on all the azure coast-leaving in the shade even the great estates of the Grand Dukes of

Lord Rendel has been in the board of management of the famous Arm strong firm, and has a fortune estimated at over \$50,000,000. From 1882 to 1885 be was Civil Lord of the Admiralty.

While Prince of Wales King Edward was several times a guest at Thoreno. A few years ago it was rumored in the English circles at Cannes that he had offered to buy the place, but that Lord Rendel refusing to take money and insisting on making a present of it, the then Prince had given up the idea.

The 125-acre park surrounding the castle is entirely shut in by stone walls clad in ivy and honey suckle. The avenues and lanes aggregate 12

When in England Lord Rendel lives in another suburb country place, Hotchlands, at Guilford. He spends five or six months a year at Cannes, and has another fine residence at Posilippo, near Naples.
