UNB Students National Champs!!

Last Sunday, Jim Sullivan's rink composed of four UNB men, defeated Ontario's Wayne Middaugh 6-4 in the final to capture the Pepsi Cola Junior Men's Curling Championship. In doing so, Jim Sullivan along with his fellow UNB students Charlie Sullivan (Mate), Craig Burgess (Second), and lead Danny Alderman have ended a 17 year old curling drought in New Brunswick.

When the Sullivan foursome left for Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, they had anticipated winning five games - a respectable showing for the UNB team. However, the rink curled superbly from day one, and after their round robin play, found their 9-2 record rewarded them with a berth in Sunday's final.

The Sullivan rink did not even think about making the playoffs until they recorded their sixth victory.

"We never talked about it much, but when we were 6-0. I thought we had a pretty good chance to make the playoffs," commented first-year electrical engineering student, Jim Sullivan.

On the other hand, Middaugh's road to the championship game was more difficult. He defeated Alberta in a tie-breaker and then dumped British Columbia in the semi-final game.

Excellent strategies and superb shot-making characterized the final game. The teams exchanged points in the first three ends, but Ontario took two points in the fifth end to grab a 3-2 lead. Sullivan hit and stayed for one in the sixth, while Middaugh, waiting for his chance to score two points, blanked the seventh.

The eighth end proved to be the turning point in the match. With the score deadlocked at three and Ontario having last rock, Sullivan called for several centre-line guards and waited patiently. An Ontario

miss allowed Charlie Sullivan, a first-year business administration student, to curl perfectly behind the guard and set up a dramatic steal of one. The Sullivan rink applied even more pressure in the ninth end, almost stealing more points before forcing Ontario to take one while giving the last rock in the tenth and last end to New Brunswick.

In the tenth end, it was the Ontario skip who was calling for centre-like guards. Both Danny Alderman and Craig Burgess, first-year business administration and physical education students respectively, frustrated their opposition as they successfully peeled off four Ontario guards. As a result, Middaugh's final stone was wide open - barely holding the position of shot or bunting stone.

Jim's final shot was a simple takeout, but the possibility existed that he could drive the Ontario stone onto one of his own rocks at the back. Jim responded to the pressure like a veteran. He hit the Ontario

stone and stayed to score two for the 6-4 victory.

"There was quite a bit of pressure at first, but after a few deep breaths I was O.K.," commented Jim Sullivan.

At the forming of the team last summer, Danny Alderman became aware of the potential that the team possessed. "We felt we had a strong team since Charlie Sullivan was runner-up at the provincials last year and Craig Burgess had been to the nationals before, and I have always been confident of Jim Sullivan's ability. We knew that we had a shot at winning the provincials."

The team plans to curl quite frequently as Danny Alderman points out, "We will be practicing every day and entering a few more cash-spiels. We are going to Scotland in November for an international bonspiel and for training."

These men from UNB will now be representing Canada at the Uniroyal World Junior Curling Championship in Fussen, West Germany during March of 1988.

Two news editors at the University of Manitoba Student Newspaper have been fired after objections to a January 22 photo caption about Rick Hansen. The caption read “Hansen, fuck—again on the cover.”

U of M architecture students who had helped organize Hansen's visit to the campus pulled copies of the paper from distribution boxes and were successful in burning 9,000 of the 12,000 copies.

McDonald's corporate sponsor of the Man in Motion Tour as well as a local mens clothing store have cancelled all advertising for the rest of the year.

The Manitoban's publishing board, The Manitoban Operations Committee, met January 23 and fired news editors John Ehinger and Michael Malegus. Production manager Richard Boulet was suspended for two weeks without pay.

Meanwhile, the controversy continued last week as Manitoban staff submitted a motion challenging the MOC's authority to fire members of the editorial board. Susy Strachan, Manitoban Production Assistant says that they

feel they should be the ones to decide what action to take, not the MOC -and staff feel the MOC ruling is too vague.

“It is unclear because they're using a by-law that defines editors as being responsible for sexist, racist and homophobic content” Strachan said. “The caption was irresponsible. It was a result of a break own in staff democracy. But we're a collective. We should decide how to discipline our own people.”

Whatever Manitoban staff thinks of it, Wanda Felt, a student representative of the U of M Student's Union put it this way; “It's like putting 'slut' under the Queen's picture.

Violent Crimes on the Increase

The recent increase in sexual assault cases appearing before Fredericton Courts is not an indication of an increase in sexual assaults, says Constable Eric Carr of the Fredericton City Police. Rather, it is because "the High Court is now sitting, and people who had preliminary hearings last fall are only now reaching the higher court system."

Carr was speaking in reference to several sexual assault and assault cases in which three men are now appearing before Fredericton courts. One, which occurred last Saturday night at 11:30 PM, put a Fredericton woman in hospital with wounds to her head.

Apparently, the woman was walking at the corner of University Ave and Charlotte Street when she met a man coming towards her on the sidewalk. He passed her, turned around, and ran towards his victim. She anticipated the

assault and began to run away but her efforts were futile as he managed to jump the woman and hit her on the head with what police believe is the bloodied windshield scraper they found nearby.

Some neighbours heard the struggle and came to her aid, but by that time the assailant had fled the scene. However, on a fluke, as Carr called it, someone managed to catch his license plate number as he sped away, and the attacker was apprehended in a lumber-camp outside of Woodstock.

He is now in Jail pending his plea today in front of a Fredericton court, but as Carr reminds us, he could be out on his own recognizance this afternoon. It depends on the show cause hearing in which police must "show cause" that the man is a danger to others. If police are not able to prove that he is capable of more crimes for example, the judge will have to release him until his next court date.

There is no cause for alarm, said Carr, as the cases

do not indicate a corresponding increase in sexual assaults. However, it is difficult if not impossible to feel confident in the city when recent statistics for the last year (1986) prove that crimes of violence are up by approximately 66 percent over past years.

In 1985, for example, there

were 169 crimes of violence in the city of Fredericton. By the end of 1986, that number had taken a phenomenal jump to 2711.

Carr attributes the dramatic increase in reported sexual assaults to the fact that many of the reported cases are family related. "It is an in-house situa-

tion where incest is occurring, which we see more of lately" he commented.

Nevertheless, city women should be aware that the danger of becoming a victim of crimes of violence is there, and precautions should be taken to avoid becoming another statistic.

In a regular session of the UNB Student Council on Monday night newly seated Comptroller Tony Tracy was removed from office.

Councillor Wayne Carson initiated the proceedings for Tracy's removal from office. He stated that Tracy was not acting in the best interests of the Student Union and that he was acting in contrast to the best interests of the Council with respect to the CHSR Board of Directors. The vote to

remove Tracy was carried with two abstentions noted. Tracy was not permitted to vote but he was permitted to remain in good standing with the union. As a member in good standing Tracy will be permitted to vote in upcoming elections.

Student Union President Larry Hansen said that "our solicitor, Peter Forbes has been advised by Tracy's solicitor to await an amendment to their claim that will see them continue legal action against us."

Tracy could not comment without consultation with his lawyer.


You Win Some

Larry Hansen explains...

The following is an interview with Larry Hansen, president of the UNB Student Union. In recent editorials in the Brunswickan, student council and Mr. Hansen in particular have been accused of muzzling former comptroller, Tony Tracy, and bowing to administration pressure with respect to the establishment of the Foundation. Most of Mr. Hansen's answers were taken directly from sworn affidavits.

QUESTION: IS THE STUDENT UNION TRYING TO MUZZLE TONY TRACY'S DISSENTION?

Answer: It is not a question of dissent. By representing this issue as one of dissent is to cloud the issue. The real issue is whether Mr. Tracy has been acting in the best interests of the Student Union or if he is trying to undermine student government.

QUESTION: HOW HAS MR. TRACY NOT ACTED IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE STUDENT UNION?

Answer: There are essentially two areas here. Firstly, has to do with the audit and how Mr. Tracy could have facilitated his seating earlier.

After the audit, which came out after the election, it was learned that Mr. Tracy had received some student funds. There was no documentation to prove the expenditure had been authorized.

Council was faced with the problem of whether or not to seat him. We knew we, as the student government of UNB, had a credibility problem. We needed to show the community we were embarking on a fiscally responsible course.

We offered to seat Mr. Tracy when the matter was cleared up. He just had to meet with us and explain.

Instead of cooperating, he sues us. He begins proceedings for a court injunction that would shut us down the Union. That is an attempt to undermine the Student Union. All he had to do was meet with us.

Secondly, was the issue of the CHSR board of directors. The Student Union, our Union, appointed two people to the CHSR board. At a meeting on Nov. 29, 1986, Mr. Tracy improperly allowed two false appointees to assume those seats on the board.

This seating, with Mr. Tracy's full knowledge that these people were improper, was not in the best interests of the Student Union.

There was also a second CHSR board of directors meeting on December 15. Mr. Tracy voted not to recognize the student government to which he'd been elected in October. This was a recorded vote.

At a subsequent meeting, Mr. Tracy was in possession of the minutes and did not object to anything in them when they were presented.

This is how he has attempted to undermine the Student Union.


QUESTION: WHY WAS MR. TRACY KEPT FROM OFFICE BY COUNCIL OVER \$98?

Answer: Council said they would seat him when the unauthorized funds were explained. He was asked publicly to

meet with the Student Union administrative director to clear the issue up.

If he had met with us the next day, he would have been seated.

At a meeting on Nov. 24, 1986, Mr.

Tracy was asked if he had seen the administrative director. He replied that he did not feel it was necessary.

There was a meeting set but Mr. Tracy did not show up. Although Mr. Tracy feels differently, he was adequately informed of that meeting.

On Dec. 3, I received a hand-delivered letter from Mr. Tracy's solicitor. He threatened legal action. Instead of cooperating and meeting with us, we get a notice of being sued.

Eventually, when he did meet with us, he was seated at the subsequent council meeting.

Tracy's case, all specifics to the charges were brought out at Monday's inquiry and have also been borne out in this interview.

sent and respond in writing.

He did not come and instead Mr. Tracy read a profane letter on his behalf which only made accusations and did not respond to the charges.

Council decided to sustain the charges of the CHSR executive. In Mr.

QUESTION: DOES THE FOUNDATION FOR STUDENTS REPRESENT CONTROL OF GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS BY THE ADMINISTRATION?

Answer: No. The Foundation's job is to ensure that students get proper accountability of student funds.

QUESTION: DID THE ADMINISTRATION INITIATE THE IDEA OF THE FOUNDATION?

Answer: No, the idea came from the S.U. The administration said they had concerns but we were not forced into it. The Foundation also protects students and their student government against legal claims. The Foundation protects funds specifically. All S.U. assets remain with the S.U.

QUESTION: IS CONCERN LEGITIMATE THAT THE FOUNDATION, THROUGH ADMINISTRATIVE DIRECTOR BRIAN WALSH, HAD EXERTED CONTROL OVER STUDENT AFFAIRS OUTSIDE THE ACCOUNTING AREA. (I.E. YEARBOOK, THE 1986-87 BUDGETS, AND THE STUDENT DIRECTORY)?

Answer: Mr. Walsh did an exemplary job here. He arrived at a time when the S.U. was in chaos and he did help us get a number of projects started. It was not a matter of too much power.

Now things are stable and we're completing the process of restructuring by reworking the role of the employed staff. What we essentially need are clerks and bookkeepers and the job of administering the S.U. is, and will continue to be, the job of students.

QUESTION: WHY DOES THE ADMINISTRATION GET TWO REPRESENTATIVES ON THE FOUNDATION?

Answer: The administration is ultimately responsible for those funds, no matter how you look at it. They collect the student fees so they have a trust or banker-type relationship with the students to ensure accountability.

In the past, the administration could at any time say they were not going to turn over the money. Now, the contract stipulates that the money must go to the foundation to be disbursed as

when funds weren't available. We hired a third person as secretary to replace the S.U. secretary now in charge of accounting.

We did this all within the budget guidelines for salaries as approved by council. Council was informed that there would be restructuring of the offices and they have the terms of reference for the new positions.

QUESTION: WHAT AUTHORITY WILL THESE PEOPLE HAVE?

Answer: They are clerks in accounting, receptionists and secretaries. There is

students see fit. That's never happened before. The administration has two votes on the Foundation and students are given three.

QUESTION: WHY DOES THE FOUNDATION GET A VETO OVER SU BUDGETS?

Answer: To prevent what happened last year from happening again: that is, over-expenditure. What it boils down to is that the Foundation has no business as to where the money goes but they have every right to see that the money goes where we say it should go.

It is a trust relationship. The duty of the Foundation is enumerated and is to ensure adequate control of in an accounting sense, to make sure there are adequate records.

We were \$150,000 in debt. The loan creates a safeguard. There has to be a mechanism to account for those funds. If it doesn't work for students, we'll try something else.

QUESTION: HOW WAS IT THAT TWO NEW STAFF WERE HIRED WITHOUT COUNCIL'S APPROVAL?

Answer: The executive committee of council is charged with the general management of the S.U. and when Mr. Walsh left, we promoted the S.U. secretary to take care of accounting. We then hired a bookkeeper that was originally going to be hired in the fall

no administration outside of that. That is the job of the students. If they are approved budget items, they will be processed. If an interpretation of the budget is necessary, it will be reviewed by the finance committee. If there are any doubts, the finance committee will decide. Nobody else.

QUESTION: WHAT IS YOUR RESPONSE TO ACCUSATIONS THAT THE COUNCIL USES "MADE-AS-YOU-GO BYLAWS"?

Answer: Firstly, we stated after the election that there would be a method of removal from office in response to Mr. Bosnitch's accusations that we needed a method of removal to be democratic.

Secondly, during our whole term the bylaws are under revision. That removal bylaw was part of a package. It was not in any way a response to Mr. Tracy.

Likewise, the change of the comptroller to a secondary signing officer was recommended by our auditor, John Weatherhead; our administrative director, Brian Walsh; and the constitutional committee before the Oct 22 elections. The change was not directed at Mr. Tracy or any other individual. This has been sworn in affidavits.

There is no attempt to play tricks with Mr. Tracy. We don't spend 24 hours a day thinking up ways to get him. We are trying to get things back on track for the students.

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
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EDITORIAL

Letter to the editor:

Opinions and commentaries made by staff members of this paper are just that and more, while writers have the right to self-expression they also have the responsibility of properly representing the facts. Too often articles written by the *Brunswickan* staff leave out crucial facts, and tend on the whole to complicate and prejudice student issues. One example of this is The Tony Tracy Affair, which has become a mere media punching bag. One other example is the creation of the Foundation by the University and the Student Union, which has been used to launch the most fallacious attacks against the present student government. What comes from this ill treatment of issues? Nothing at best and non-student participation for the most part.

An important issue, such as the establishment of the Foundation should have been addressed objectively and critically before being pronounced as bad or as being a sell-out by the media. Briefly, the Foundation was created to

serve student needs by assuring the financial accountability of the Student Union. The Foundation has no right to reject any SU request for the disbursement of funds. Its only purpose is to monitor SU spending. The obvious importance of this is to prevent unnecessary spending, by advising council from time to time of its financial position. Its creation is also to prevent misappropriation of funds. In all fairness it seems that a bigger issue of the facts and not of destructive speculation needs to be made.

The same would seem to apply in Mr. Tony Tracy's situation, if it is to be appreciated by students.

Misuse of issues, misrepresentation of facts, and the substitution of malicious personal attacks for facts in the opinion columns and other articles only to a disservice to the student community. When this is allowed to occur students only become uninterested. The media must remain objective and critical in order to foster the confidence of the community of which it is intended to serve. A substantial part of the *Brunswickan* is articles reflecting particular opinions. While this provides an opportunity for self-expression, it must also be informative and should never prejudice people or issues.

Amnesty adopts prisoner

Currently in Fredericton an Amnesty International group has been active to attain the freedom of Prisoners of conscience. They are fighting for the Human Rights of all those suppressed in countries where civil unrest is present.

The Fredericton branch of Amnesty International has adopted Pyoter Rumachik as a prisoner of conscience (an individual imprisoned anywhere in the world, because of his or her beliefs or origins, who has never used or advocated violence).

"Reverend Pyoter Rumachik" is 55 years old and has spent 17 years of his life in-

various prison sentences. His most recent arrest in the Soviet Union was in 1981 when he was tried and convicted of three charges: "circulating anti-Soviet slander;" "violating the laws separating church and state;" and "anti-social activity under the pretext of conducting religious ceremonies."

He was sentenced to 5 years of imprisonment in a strict regime labour colony in the Chita region which borders Mongolia and China. In this type of camp, prisoners sleep in double bunk-beds over crowded barracks, few toilets, minimum heat in the winter and minimal ventilation in the summer.

Pyoter Rumachik suffers



from high blood pressure and heart trouble. He didn't expect to survive his last term of imprisonment.

In addition, just prior to finishing his 5th term, he was re-arrested and charged with "anti-Soviet agitation and propaganda" and sentenced for another 5 years.

Rumachik is the vice-chairman of the Council of Evangelical Christians which refuses to accept government restriction on religious activities such as publishing religious papers and state control over the appointment of clergy and the content of their sermons.

For his appeal toward attaining these rights for the

public, he has undergone imprisonment.

Amnesty International is campaigning for his release on the grounds that his imprisonment is in violation of Articles 18 and 19 of the "International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights" which the USSR ratified in 1973. Article 18 states: "Everyone shall have the right to freedom of thought, conscience, and religion."

Both publicity and letter-writing can have as significant effect on the lives of these long-term prisoners. A number of surprising releases recently have offered new hope for other prisoners and their families.

UNB's Black Bear Wrestling team goes for AUAA gold tomorrow; but, it won't be easy to maintain the dynasty that has garnered 11 AUAA titles in 14 years.

If there is such a thing as home team advantage in wrestling the Black Bears will have it. The competition starts at 10 a.m. in the West Gym and finals are due to begin around 3:30 p.m.

"Of course, the more support the better. A good crowd can really help you out when you need it most in a match," says Bears coach George Multamaki.

Coach Multamaki expects stiff competition from both Mt. Allison and Memorial

University. "It's going to be tough. It will depend largely on our guys who don't win a weight class. If we can get second instead of third or fourth, it won't even be close."

The AUAA's also have an interesting quirk. Because Concordia University is the only wrestling club in the Quebec Conference, they have the option to compete at either the Ontario championships or the AUAA's.

Concordia, whose members make up about half the national team, has opted to com-

pete in the AUAA's but their points will not count towards the AUAA team championship. They will compete in the preliminary rounds but will not wrestle for the gold or silver medals.

Coach Multamaki says at least five UNB athletes have a good shot at winning within the AUAA. Dwayne Wakerall and Don Ryan are both defending AUAA champions and he expects them to repeat if things go well.

Coach Multamaki is quick to point out, however, that the rest of his 11 man roster could also surprise and come up big. "The team's ready and every confident about their conditioning. Everybody's going in thinking we have a very good chance to win again," he said.
