FIRST DAY—MONDAY, JULY 12TH, 1886.

The Grand Lodge of Ontario will meet in Annual Session at 9 o'clock, a.m., in the Knights of Pythias Hall, Queen St. East, opposite the Metropolitan Church.

Receiving and escorting visiting Divisions to their respective quarters, by Alpha Division, No. 1, of Hamilton, and Toronto Division, No. 2.

The Grand Spectacular Drama of "Damon and Pythias" at the Grand Opera House. Special engagement of the Eminent Tragedian, Mr. Fred Warde, who will appear as Damon.

SECOND DAY—TUESDAY, JULY 13TH.

FIRST—Divine Service in St. James' Cathedral at 10 o'clock, a.m., on which occasion Major, the Very Rev. Dean Whitmarsh, Chaplain of the Illinois Brigade, assisted by Rev. H. P. Hobson, Rector in charge of the Cathedral, will officiate.

The Musical portion of the service will be under the direction of the Organist of the Cathedral.

The Offertory will be in aid of the Boys and Girls Home.

The Illinois Brigade will act as escort to the Supreme Lodge Officers and Representatives. Divisions desiring to take part in the Church Parade will meet on Front St., near the Queen's Hotel, in *Fatigue Uniform*, in time to leave the Hotel at 9.30 o'clock. The Supreme Officers and Representatives are requested to appear in uniform.

SECOND—Escorting the Supreme Lodge from the Cathedral to the County Orange Hall, Queen Street East, opposite the Metropolitan Church.

Addresses of welcome will be delivered by W. H. Howland, Esq., Mayor, on behalf of the city, and Grand Chancellor McKellar, on behalf of the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

Response by the Supreme Chancellor, Hon. John Van Valkenburg, of Fort Madison, Iowa.

THIRD—The Grand Parade will form at Clarence Square at 3.30 o'clock, and march promptly at 4 o'clock, Brigadier-General Jas. R. Carnahan, Major-General of the Uniform Rank, in command.

All members of the Order not connected with the Uniform Rank are fraternally requested to take part in the parade, appearing by Lodges of each State or Province grouped together and each member wearing a badge showing the name and number of his Lodge and the jurisdiction to which he belongs.

FOURTH—Public Reception of the Supreme Lodge at the Caledonia Curling Club Rink, Mutual Street, at 8 o'clock, p.m.

The Grand Chancellor of Ontario, P. D. McKellar, Esq., of Chatham, will preside.

Addresses of welcome will be delivered by Hon. John Beverley Robinson, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, on behalf of the Province; W. H. Howland, Esq., Mayor of Toronto, on behalf of the City; and Supreme Prelate, J. S. King, M.D., on behalf of the Order in Ontario.

Responses will be made by the Founder and Past Supreme Chancellor, Justus H. Rathbone, of Washington, D. C.; the Supreme Chancellor, Hon. John Van Valkenburg, of Fort Madison, Iowa, on behalf of the Supreme Lodge; and Supreme Representatives Judge S. P. Oyler, of Indiana, for the North; R. R. Richards, of Georgia, for the South;

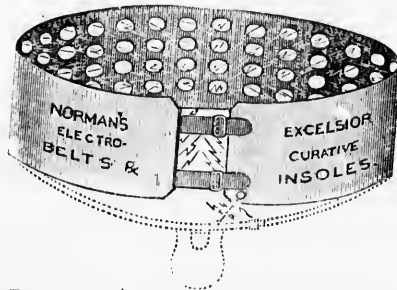

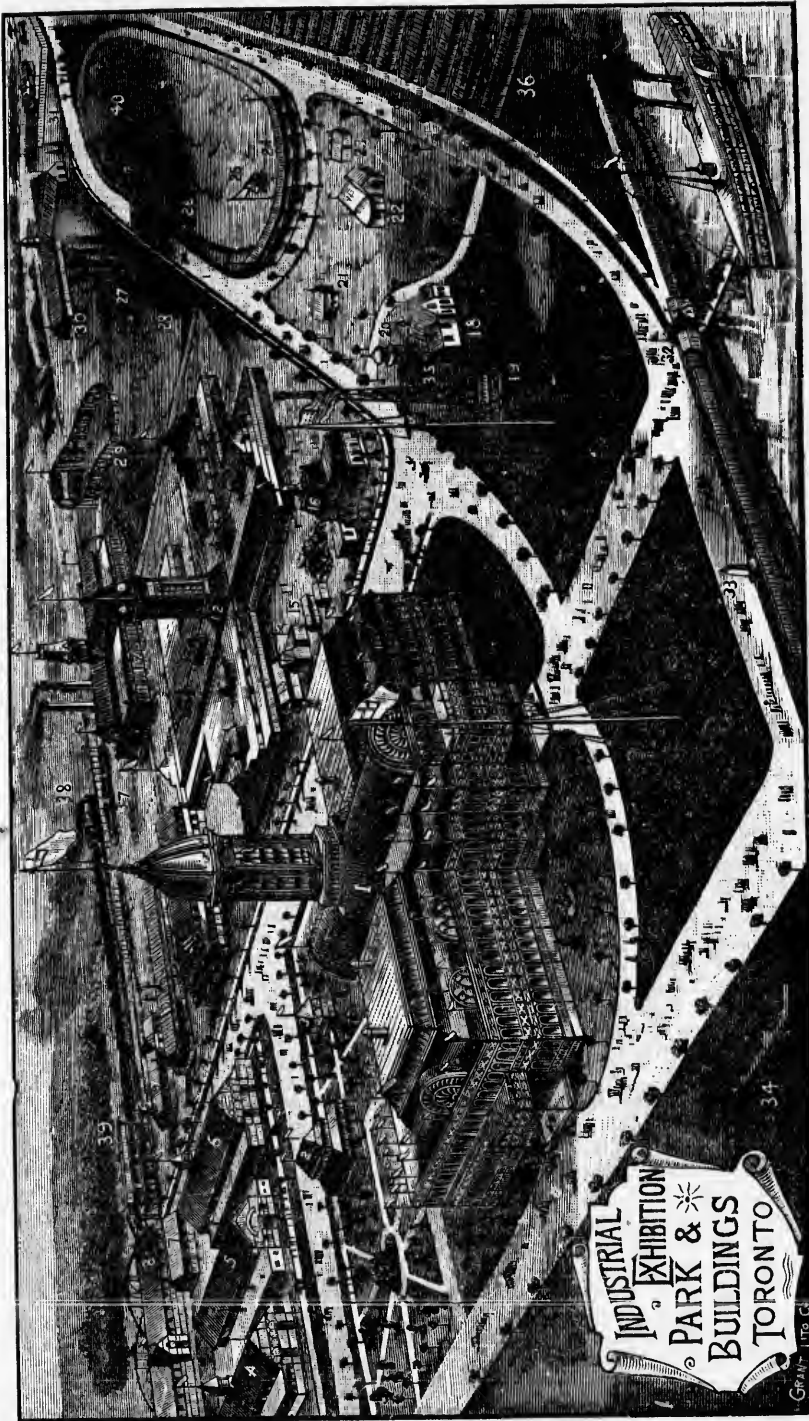

Rules and Conditions of Prize Drill.

CLASS I.—ONTARIO SUPREME PRIZES.

First Prize,	-	-	-	-	-	-	\$1,000 00.
Second Prize,	-	-	-	-	-	-	500 00.

General.—1. This Class is open to any authorized Division of the Uniform Rank, Knights of Pythias.

2. All the "Rules for Divisions," page 215 Carnahan's Revised Tactics, will govern this Class, and will be rigidly adhered to and exacted.

Special.—1. Commanders shall enter their Divisions not later than 10 o'clock p.m. on Tuesday, July 13th, and at the time of entering their Divisions shall also certify the following:—

- a. Date of Organization;
- b. *Bona fide* Membership of the Division;
- c. That it participated in the public parade.

2. The Major-General will, on application at his Headquarters, at 9 o'clock a.m. on Wednesday, July 14th, inform Divisions of the time at which they are to drill.

3. Each Commander will receive the programme of drill one hour before the time fixed for his Division to drill.

4. All movements shall be in quick time and with drawn swords, unless otherwise specified, and shall be embraced in Carnahan's Tactics.

5. Movements shall be governed by Carnahan's Tactics, and rules not here specified shall be those of said Tactics.

CLASS IV.—SPECIAL PRIZES.

A. Sir Knight Commander's Prize.—Medal of Pythian Design (value) - \$50.00

1. This prize is open to all Sir Knight Commanders of competing Divisions, and said Commanders shall be judged at the same time as the Division they command.
2. The qualification shall comprise:—

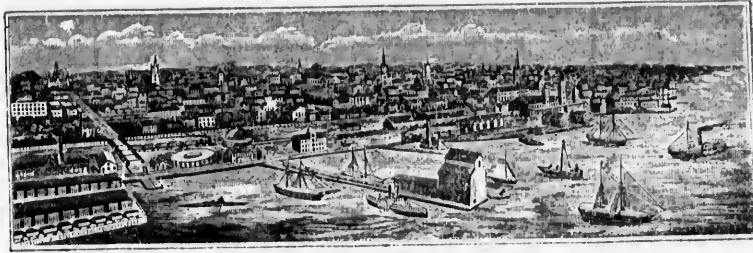

City of Toronto.

Toronto stands upon a site chosen in 1794 for a trading post. Its age as a city is 52 years. It is centrally situated in the Province of Ontario, being located on the north side of Lake Ontario, opposite Niagara River and about 30 miles distant therefrom. It has a water frontage of five miles and is built upon a gradual ascension of land a distance northward of about two and a half miles to an escarpment commanding a fine view of the city and lake. The streets run at right angles to each other. Its present population is about 125,000. It has an assessed value of property of about \$75,000,000. The city is sub-divided into twelve wards, each of which sends three aldermen to form the City Council. The Mayor of the city is chosen by the vote of the entire city. The Mayor and Alderman are elected for a term of one year. The city contains some of the finest buildings in the country. The great majority of the buildings are constructed either from stone (grey or colored), brick (red or white) and rough-cast coated over frame work. Most of the street paving is with cedar blocks on end, a portion is stone blocks, while the remainder of the streets are either macadamized or formed from the natural soil where they exist. The city is protected by as fine a body of police as can be found anywhere, and the fire department is the pride of the city. Toronto is designated the Queen city of the Province; and is the seat of Government; the centre of Education; the situation of the High Courts of

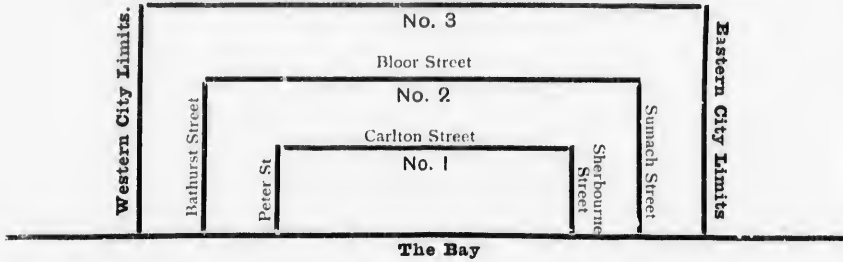

Northern City Limits.



Fare by the hour—1 or 4 passengers, \$1 per hour; over 4 passengers, 25c for each adult per hour. From any one place in No. 1 Division to any other place in the same Division—one person 25c., and each additional person 25 cents.

For conveying one person from No. 1 Division to any place in No. 2 Division—50c. for one person, and 25c. for each additional person.

For conveying one person from any point in No. 1 Division to any point in No. 2 Division, 75c.; for each additional person, 25c.

ONE-HOUSE CABS.—For conveying one person from any one place within the limits of No. 1 Division to any other point within the limits of the same Division, 20c.; for each additional person, 2 c.

For conveying one person from any point in the first Division to any point in the second Division, 30c.; for each additional person, 20c.

For conveying one person in the first Division to any point in the third Division 50c.; for each additional person, 20c.

NIGHT TARIFF.—From 1st of May to the 31st of October inclusive, from 10 o'clock p.m. to midnight, the charge for cabs shall be one-half more than the above tariff, and after midnight to 6 o'clock a.m., double the above tariff.

CHILDREN.—No fare charged for children under eight years, in charge of an adult. Over eight years and under twelve, half price; over that age, full fare.

BAGGAGE.—One trunk and articles that may be placed inside the cab are to be carried free. For every other article placed on the outside of the cab, the cabman is entitled to 5c.

Justice; is recognized as the great financial business centre; and is an important railway centre, some eight lines of railway leading out of it. In the city are located the chief asylums, prisons, reformatories, and hospitals of the province. On Sunday, all business ceases.

Toronto has been designated the "City of Churches," and possesses 120 churches of various denominations, some of them being both architectural and stately in appearance. Its importance as an educational centre may be inferred from the statement that it contains Universities, Colleges, Schools of Science, Public and Separate Schools, to the number of over 70. There are a goodly number of Libraries, Public, Collegiate and special. No less than 75 newspapers and periodicals are published in the city. There are 14 Banks and 12 Savings' Banks. The Asylums, Hospitals, Homes and Infirmaries number nearly 30. It is a city abounding in Secret Beneficiary Societies; nearly every society having representatives here. The city has attained considerable celebrity on account of its promotion and encouragement of sports and games in which some of her sons have won distinguished laurels. It likewise possesses large factories, wholesale and retail stores, splendid hotels, and elegant private residences. The wholesale quarter of the city is that included between Front and King streets, the chief wholesale houses, Custom House and Banks being found on Front, Wellington, Colborne, Jordan, Yonge, Scott and Church streets. The chief retail streets are King, Yonge (north of King) and Queen streets. The streets on which may be seen the most handsome residences are Sherbourne, Pembroke, Jarvis, Church, Gerrard, Carlton, and Wellesley in the eastern division; Simcoe, Beverley, St. George and College in the western division; and Bloor street and Rosedale in the north.

Toronto has been the place of meeting of many important bodies—political, religious, educational, scientific, and beneficiary secret societies.

The city has much to interest visitors, and extends to the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias, and to all Knights and their friends, a generous Canadian welcome.

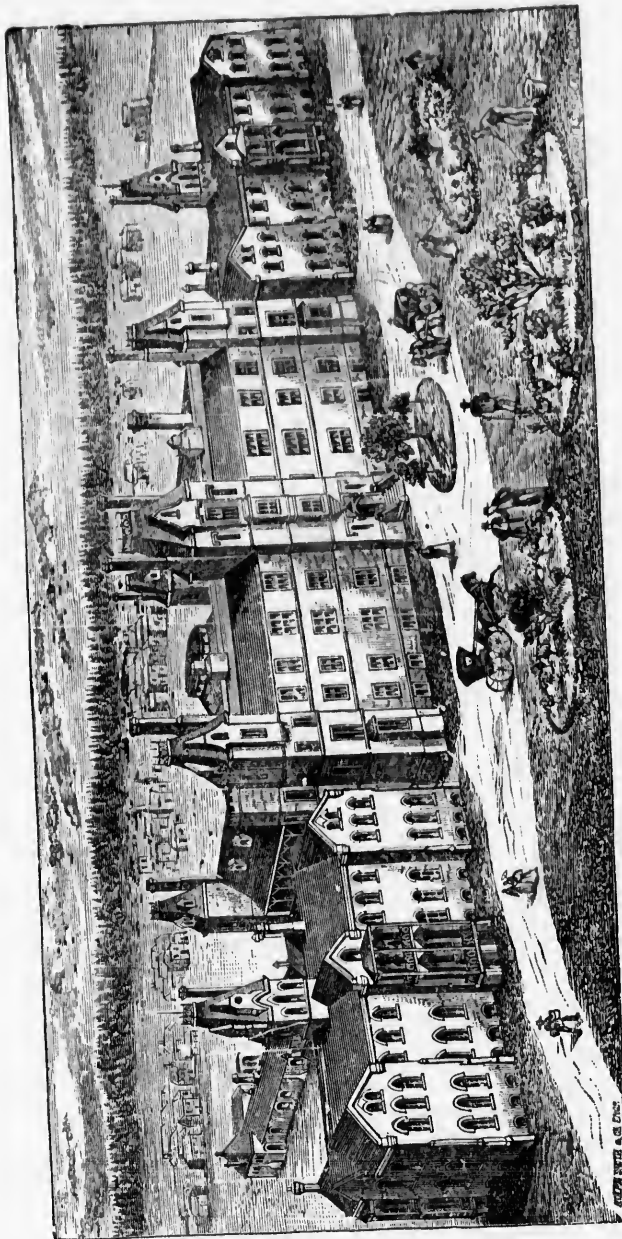

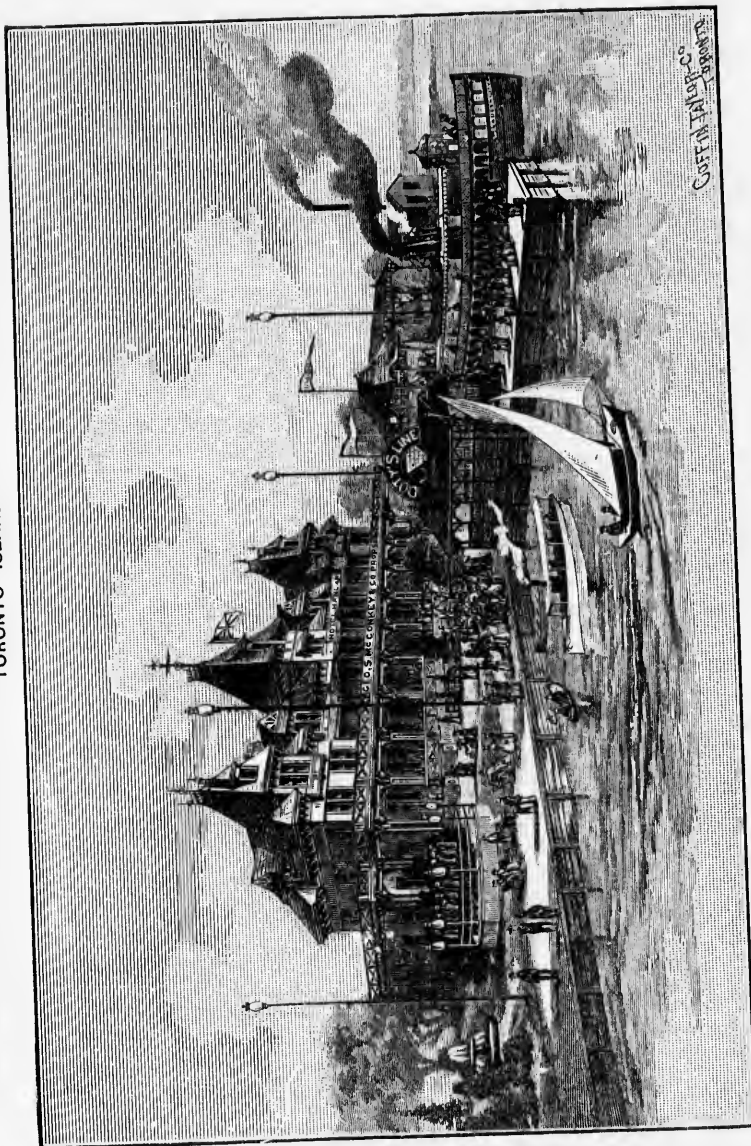

PRINCIPLES AND BENEFITS
OF THE
ORDER OF KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

The Order of Knights of Pythias was instituted February 19th, 1864, and introduced into Ontario on February 22nd, 1872. It has made the most rapid progress of any beneficial society ever organized, having a membership at the present time of about 180,000, and ranks as one of the foremost benevolent institutions, whose common object is the elevation and advancement of the interests of brotherhood, and benefit to a common humanity, through unity of effort well directed. Its motto is Friendship, Charity and Benevolence. Nothing of a sectarian or political character is permitted within its portals, and its cardinal principles are—toleration in religion, obedience to law, and loyalty to the government under which it exists.

The Order is complete within itself, having in addition to the ordinary Lodge and its accompanying benefits, an Endowment or Insurance feature, and the Uniform Rank, neither of which latter features are compulsory; but their advantages are only obtainable by Knights who are in good standing in their Subordinate Lodge.

To become a member of any Lodge of the Order, it is necessary that the applicant be 21 years of age, of good moral character, in sound mental and bodily health, able and competent to earn the means necessary for the support of himself and family, and a believer in the Supreme Creator and Preserver of the Universe. There are three ranks in the Order, viz.—Page, Esquire and Knight, and the admission fee is in Ontario Lodges usually ten dollars, payable as follows:—One dollar with the application, four dollars for Page Rank, three dollars for Esquire Rank, and two dollars for Knight's Rank. The dues in Toronto Lodges are graded according to every five years of age, beginning from 21 to 25 at \$1.60 per quarter. The benefits, in case of sickness or disability, in these same lodges, are free medical attendance and three dollars per week. Each lodge also has a visiting committee, one member of which must visit daily any sick member, and if necessary, sit up with him at night. In cases of contagious diseases, the lodge provides a competent nurse, and the committee are relieved of their duties. Forty dollars are paid on the death of a member, and when a widow or children are left, forty dollars a year are paid to them. These various amounts for fees, dues and benefits may be fixed at a higher figure by any lodge so desiring it.

In the Endowment Rank an insurance of \$1,000, \$2,000, or \$3,000 can be effected. The entrance fee is \$2.00 for every \$1,000 taken, \$1.00 for local Medical Examiner, 50 cents for Medical Examiner in Chief, and \$1.00 for the Secretary-Treasurer. The monthly payments are fixed and graded according to age at date of application, beginning at 70 cents per \$1,000 at the age of 21. A member joining at the age of 30, the cost would be 80 cents; 35 years, 95 cents; or 40 years, \$1.10 per month for each \$1,000. It is at once a safe and cheap form of insurance, and that it has proved to be a boon to many a family and mitigated much distress may be judged from the fact that since its institution nine years ago, over THREE MILLION DOLLARS have been paid to the families of deceased members.

In the Uniform Rank we have the display feature of the Order, and it, as well as the Endowment Rank, is entirely optional. The members of the Division in this city meet for weekly drill, and have adopted a beneficial feature in case of the sickness of any member, whereby a weekly benefit of from \$3.00 to \$4.00 is paid in addition to the lodge allowance.

We ask none to join our Order without first examining its principles, and convincing themselves that its objects are good, and that it in no way conflicts with their religious or political freedom. We do not wish for any but those who are willing to join heartily, hand in hand, with us for the advancement of the objects we have in view, namely, the spread of brotherly love, and the inculcation of true charity.
