A work has recently been published in England, proving the practicability, and orging the propriety, of constructing a Railroad from Halifax to the Pacific, which it has often been contended would be the cheapest and most direct route between England and the East Indies and China.

The total cost of the road from Halifax to Paget's Sound, opposite the Island of Vancouver, a distance of 2,800 miles, is estimated at £14,000,-000-an average of £5,000 per mile. The construction of the work would afford employment for five millions of poor people from the mother country, who would eventually become useful settlers along the line of road.

How much better would it be, then, to expend the money now paid for saving people from starvation, in such a manner as to secure their comfort and prosperity in another portion of the Empire? The distance between England and China, by the proposed railroad through Canada, is fifteen hundred miles shorter than the nearest route
