Acadia Anniversary.

The closing exercises in connection with Acadia College and the affiliated schools have been held this week.

BACCALAUREATE SERMON.

The exercises began on Sunday morning when Rev. A. C. Chute, of Halifax, preached the baccalaureate sermon to a very large audience who gathered in the Baptist church.

Mr. Chute chose for his text, "So Abraham departed, as the Lord had spoken unto him," Gen. 12: 4. The subject was "Every man's life a plan of God."

(1) Every man's life is a plan of God; not the lives of conspicuous leaders only, but of the rank and file as well.

(2) The loss will be irreplaceable if this is not discovered. That we can find out is certain. God has made a revelation of His will in His word.

(3) Every man should constantly seek help from God in carrying out the plan. The train of cars can only move by being coupled to the engine.

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Canadian poetry is necessarily also a poetry of nature. She concluded by giving a sketch of the Canadian poets, with some critical remarks upon the distinctive characteristics of their productions.

The class valedictory was presented by J. Whitfield Keirstead, of Cole's Island, N. B. This valedictory was in verse and did honor both to the writer and the class, as well as to the Academy.

The diploma were then presented to those who had successfully passed the matriculation requirements—24 in number. The first prize—a trip to Chicago—offered by Mr. H. U. Rhodes for best work in the Manual Training Hall, was declared equally due to Andrew Cobb and Burpee Bishop—each of whom received the above named reward.

At 7.30 o'clock on Wednesday evening the closing exercises of Acadia Seminary began. Notwithstanding the extreme heat of 25 cents, the hall was filled to its fullest capacity.

The first essay was that of Miss Elma Armstrong, of Kingston, who spoke on the subject, "Excavated History." A large part of the history of the earliest civilization has literally been dug out of the earth in which it has so long lain buried.

Mr. J. H. Davis spoke next on "Adam Smith as an Economic Reformer." He referred briefly to the life of Adam Smith, the prince of economic writers.

Miss Ada Marlon Hayes, of Wolfville, discussed "The Silent Forces of Nature." Almost all phenomena of nature are produced by silent forces which have formed our earth and made it beautiful with mountains, valleys and water.

Miss Jessie Blanche Hates, of North Kingston, delivered the valedictory. Her subject was "Revelation of Character."

The first essay was that of James H. Hulmer, of Westmoreland Point, N. B., his subject being "Reading." The benefit of reading depends upon what we read and how we read it.

The next speaker was Miss Jennie Cobb, of Short Hills, N. J., who spoke of the subject, "Domestic Life of the Ancient Romans." Household worship was the foundation of the Roman social system.

The next subject was "Imperial Federation" and was presented by Burpee Bishop, of Greenwick. The colonies now realize their importance and feel that some change must take place in their relations to Great Britain.

The diploma were presented to the graduates with appropriate remarks. The special prizes, offered by Miss Rhodes were awarded: 1st to Miss Mary J. Brison, 2d to Miss Annie M. Parry.

At 10.30 on Thursday morning Assembly Hall was filled with a large and appreciative audience who had come together to hear the graduating essays and other exercises in connection with the closing of the college.

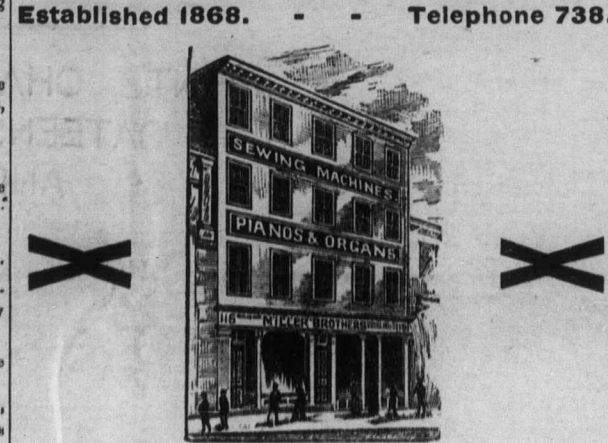
