Maritime Union.

The Canadian Courier of this week publishes a valuable article from the pen of J. B. Baxter, on "Maritime Union," the difficulties and advantages of which are discussed clearly and forcibly. Admitting the strength of the many obstacles in the way, Mr. Baxter strongly favors the union policy, chiefly because of the greater weight it would give to Maritime Provincial influence in the government of Canada. Other advantages immediately accruing from the proposed union, he believes, would be a united administration of the mines, the agricultural department and the technical school system of the provinces.

One system of laws would strengthen the bar and the bench, besides affording great relief to mercantile interests. The policy of immigration could then be dealt with in a systematic way and the effort which is now divided and wasted would become productive of useful result. The east must realize that if she can hold men to her land for a generation the immigrant children will be found either in the cities or in the West. The only successful policy on this subject for the East will be one which treats immigration as a stream flowing through the land enriching it as it flows. Such a policy needs all the strength of all these provinces, not the haphazard efforts of one or two.

There are various ways by which stale bread can be utilized, among which are the following:— Hasty Pudding—Make a batter of one egg, one cup of milk, one table-spoonful of sugar, a little vanilla. Add this to a dish of breadcrumbs, which have been fried in butter, bring to a boiling point, remove from fire at once.

Fried Bread—Cut thin slices of bread, dip in batter made as above, and fry in butter or drippings. Mock Dressing—Make dressing as for chicken or turkey, press into a loaf, bake until brown in oven,asting frequently with water and butter; or, the dressing can be made into thin cakes, like mashed potatoes cakes, and fried the same way.

Coated bread is a good substitute for crackers in the various soups.

Household Mending. In the realm of the kitchen a woman may make herself useful in a mechanical way. To mend a kettle or pot that leaks is the easiest thing in the world with a small household soldering outfit at hand. For mending tinware there is a special form of solder, rolled like a hollow wire, with rosin inside. Rub the punctured part of the pan with a bit of emery cloth, invert it and hold a candle underneath; the heat will soon become great enough to melt the solder if it is held directly over the hole, which fills instantly. To preserve the bottom of a dishpan from wear you can raise it slightly from its original level by putting three round drops of solder near the outer edge at equal distances.

Miss Lawrence's Recital.

Alumnae hall, was completely filled on Friday evening when Miss Joy Lawrence, a pupil of Mr. Emery, gave a most interesting and successful pianoforte recital.

The program was an ambitious one, even for a mature artist, and was calculated to show the versatility of touch and technique of Miss Lawrence as well as her conception of the several numbers of the different composers.

The program opened with the first movement from Beethoven's "Waldstein" Sonata in C, and Miss Lawrence showed herself at once a true lover of classical music. In the "Scenes from Childhood," which followed, one might have supposed a more mature hand were interpreting Schuman's music. The decided contrasts, the delicate shading and poetical, musical feeling gave much pleasure to the attentive audience. The rendering of the "Knight of the Hobby Horse," and "By the Fireside" was splendid. A French waltz by Schuetz followed, perhaps the best modern waltz known. Here the requirements were met in no pupil-like fashion. A group of Chopin she played with ease and power, and as the close of the glorious Scherzo was reached, her hearers were roused to a pitch of enthusiasm. The closing number was Mendelssohn's "Serenade and Allegro Gioioso," all too seldom heard. Miss Lawrence threw herself most freely into the composition and swept over the difficulties with utmost ease, at the same time not neglecting the pure tone which all artists must produce who love Mendelssohn's works.

The orchestral accompaniment was played by Miss Eblitt Woodman, also a pupil of Mr. Emery, and a word of praise is certainly due her, for her rhythmic and responsive playing. Principal DeWolfe has every reason to feel that the musical department of Acadia Seminary is on a high level and that the work done finds appreciative support.

The Lord's Day.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE ACADIAN:—Through the Executive of the Lord's Day Alliance crave space in your valuable paper to lay some things before your readers and in order to arouse their interest and cooperation.

The first thing is to call attention to an evil that could be remedied by the public. We refer to the habit of late shopping on Saturday night. Do people ever think that merchants and clerks are on their feet for fifteen and sixteen hours every Saturday, and boys and delivery teams are kept out till all hours delivering goods just because some people thoughtlessly delay their shopping till quite late. The merchants and their assistants are so thoroughly exhausted that Sabbath morning finds them unable, through their exhaustion, to enjoy the Lord's day. Could not the people see that their business is transacted earlier in the day, and might not the merchants themselves quietly talk this matter over, and for their own and assistants' sakes, agree to close their shops by 9:30 or 10 o'clock. One thing they ought to do, viz., to intimate to all customers that no goods would be delivered after 6 o'clock. We are sure that early closing on Saturday would be a boon to all concerned and the business of the town would not suffer in the least. And the town council would not require to ask the Electric Light Company to run an hour later on Saturday, or rather on Sabbath, than on the other days of the week.

MAYOR'S REPORT 1906.

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF WOLFVILLE. LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—I herewith present for your consideration my annual report of the condition of town affairs for the civic year just ending. In order that the condition of the various departments may be seen and understood at a glance I have thought it best to give in as brief a form as possible a review of the work performed by the various committees, ending up with a general summary of the conditions as a whole.

FINANCE.

It is most gratifying to learn from the report of this committee, as well as the auditors' detailed statement, that the finances of the town are in such a satisfactory state. Commencing on January 1st, 1905, with a small credit balance of \$74.79, we were enabled to give the ratepayers, for the year 1906, a tax rate of \$1.60 per \$100.00, and at the same time appropriate to each committee such sum as they asked for to carry on their work, and in many cases this sum was liberal, more so than usual. On the 1st of January, 1907, we had cash on hand \$1,490.12 and a further credit in good and collectable taxes of say \$350.00. While this may seem a large credit balance, the explanation is simple and is in part due to three known causes, viz:—the payment into general account of \$615.00 from water construction (which sum had been borrowed by a former Council), the prompt payment of taxes by many ratepayers, which taken together would make our actual cash balance about \$600.00. At the time the estimates were made up the Council had no means of knowing that these conditions would prevail. I would, however, be remiss in my duty did I not call your attention to the very large sum in unpaid taxes, and while the town officials and the Council are to a certain extent responsible, they having at their command all the power of the law to enforce prompt payment, and which power has only been exercised in a few aggravated cases in the past, a more general carrying out of the law in this respect will have to occur at an early date if the ratepayers are to be treated fairly, it is unfair that those who pay promptly should have to suffer for the short comings of the few and the town be obliged to pay interest on debit bank balances, even though the interest be but \$17.36 as it was this year. The real trouble, however, lies with the ratepayers themselves, who do not seem to realize the fact that the town requires ready money to carry on its affairs in a business-like manner. Taking the names of those who still owe taxes for 1906, 90 per cent. of them could if they desired pay their taxes to-day, the other 10 per cent., who through no fault of their own find themselves unable at this time to liquidate their debts, will undoubtedly settle at an early date and thus avoid having expenses added to their tax bills. Too much credit cannot be given to the committee for the manner in which they have performed their arduous duties as at every monthly meeting they have presented to the Council a detailed statement, showing the actual financial condition of the town at that date.

POLICE.

This committee reports that the rowdiness on our streets that has at times prevailed in the past, has to a large extent been stopped. Offenders against the law have been promptly dealt with and where the evidence against them was clear they have been heavily fined. Our present police officer deserves credit for the manner in which he has promptly investigated all matters called to his attention and for the faithful performance of his duties; he has dealt with the unruly element without fear or favor, and has stopped the liquor traffic that at one time was notorious. The committee recommend and suggest that the citizens in general aid them in their efforts for good order in the town instead of finding fault, as is frequently the case when the committee in order to bring about a certain result take drastic measures.

STREETS.

After the appointment and organization of this committee they held many meetings for the purpose of deciding as to the best method of improving the streets. It was finally resolved to ask the Council for sufficient money to enable them to hire or purchase a stone crusher, with the object in view of building a sample piece of road on Main St. Upon further investigation the committee found that, while they were able to either hire or purchase a crusher, they were unable to obtain power to operate the same, hence the experiment had to be abandoned for the time being. It is, however, hoped that the incoming committee will carry on the work and lay a short piece of road for the consideration of the ratepayers. While absolutely no criticism is intended for the present or the past street committee, nevertheless it is a fact that cannot be denied, that it is an absolute waste of public money to endeavor to keep up our present streets with the material at hand, and the incoming Council should work along the lines of permanent streets. It is believed by the present Council that the work can be carried on without becoming a burden on the ratepayer. Owing to the fact that the Superintendent of Streets was engaged on water works extension, much of the work provided for on streets had to be neglected, nevertheless many repairs to streets and bridges were completed.

WATER.

A large amount of work was completed by this committee and they in conjunction with the Superintendent of Water, deserve much credit for the manner in which they solved difficult problems with the most economical of expenditure of public monies to effect the desired results. The capacity
